Former State Trooper and life-long Higganum resident Jack Calhoun has devoted his time to many causes in town from the Lions to serving on Capital Planning Commission and the Haddam's Zoning Board of Appeals. He is extremely active with the Higganum Congregational Church and volunteers for many local fundraisers including Grimm's Haunted House. He has been the Haddam Historical Society's liaison with the Haddam Shad Museum over the past few years to ensure the museum remains in town. He is a wonderful story-teller and resource of local history and tales.

His talent to fix or figure anything out was a gift, and the Society frequently called on Doug to help us with minor to major problems. # **HKYFA** in Championship Semifinals

The #2 seeded Cougar A squad traveled to Pierson Park in Cromwell to take on the #6 seeded Cromwell Lions. In week 7 the Cougars prevailed by a 32-7 margin but this time the stakes where much higher with a chance to advance to the title game on the line.

After a pair of fumbles on the first 2 series of the game by HK, Tate Callender ripped off a 62 yard run up the visiting sidelines for a touchdown. Cavin Napolentano split the uprights with authority and the Cougars drew first blood with an early 8-0 advantage. An interception by Cromwell late in the first half deep in Lion territory gave the visiting team a chance of running out the clock and preserving an 8 point deficit but a Cary Harwood tackle at the line of scrimmage and a tackle for a loss and sack by Ben Cozean forced a Lion punt. With Cromwell pinned deep in their own end of the field the HK defense overpowered the offensive line and blocked the punt into the hands of Orion Inkel who ran in for the score with 24 seconds left on the clock. Napolentano kicked the extra point and HK took an 18-0 lead into the break. The HK defense allowed the Lions a 10 play 38 yard drive on their first series of the game but locked out the visiting team for the remainder of the half, allowing only 5 additional yards of total offense.

In the 2nd half the Lions closed the

gap to 18-6 with a pass completion in the end zone but the Cougars would answer with a pair of scores by Callender and extra-point kicks by Napolentano to notch the 32-6 win. Callender racked up 188 yards rushing on the day behind stout blocking from the HK offensive unit both at the line of scrimmage and in the open field. Lee Harwood (27 yards) and Orion Inkel (19 yards) contributed on the ground for the Cougars.

The defense was led by Ben Cozean who delivered an impressive performance with 7.5 tackles and a sack. Also contributing on defense where Carey Harwood (3 tackles, 1 sack), Lee Harwood (2.5 tackles), Vincent Scileppi (2.5 tackles) and Nick Fox with 1.5 tackles. Jaden Fulton, Aiden Griswold, Kevin Harrison and Bryce Anderson each contributed one tackle



and Anderson had an interception. The defense held Cromwell to 83 yards of total offense on the day.

The win sets a week 1 rematch with East Hartford for the championship. The Hornets beat HK 12-7 at East Hartford in week 1.

The undefeated and #1 seeded Cougar B squad played the #4 seeded Bloomfield Raiders in the early game at Pierson Park.

HK jumped out to an early 12-0 lead but Bloomfield rallied to tie the game before Michael Seward broke

free for a 60 yard touchdown run and with a successful extra point run the Cougars went into the half with a 19-12 advantage.

On the first play from scrimmage in the second half Seward found running room to the outside and dashed up the sidelines for a touchdown. Bloomfield battled back with a pair of scores to tie the game at 25-25 with 5:56 remaining. A tense final

minutes of play resulted in a deadlock and the game moved to sudden death overtime. HK won the toss and took possession on the Raider 25 yard line but fumbled and Bloomfield recovered the ball. The Raiders would rush into the end zone 2 plays later for the winning touchdown.

Although not the desired result, the team should be proud of their season. No doubt the boys will be back next year looking to build on this year's success.

# **Know Your Cardiovascular Risk Factors**

In the US cardiovascular disease, CVD, kills 600,000 people every year, and is the leading cause of death in the US and the world. Understanding the risk factors helps to reduce morbidity, and reducing the chance of mortality (death), due to cardiovascular disease.

Some things such as age and gender (men over 45, women over 55, and family history) we cannot change, but we can modify a number of risk factors: high blood pressure, high cholesterol, diabetes, smoking, lack of physical activity, obesity, sleep disorders, and depression.

High blood pressure is the number one risk factor that we can change in order to make a significant impact on reducing our chance of death from cardiovascular disease. Blood pressure readings taken daily in your home are a more accurate prognosticator than blood pressure readings taken at the doctor's office. The ways to reduce high blood pressure should first start with diet, lowering fats to 10% of daily calories, reducing salt to less than 2.4 grams/day, reducing sugars, and being more active! Being active does not mean you have to get on the treadmill 40 minutes a day, 5 days a week, although that would be a great goal. But, you can at least attempt to get in 10,000 steps a day!

Lastly, Nicotine replacement therapy has been shown to increase the rate of quitting smoking by 50-70%, but you have to stay on for greater that 90 days, to break the habit.

# A short history of St. Peter's Roman Catholic Church

The first Roman Catholics to put down roots in Haddam were three Acadian families in 1756. The Arcadians were French Roman Catholics who lived in what is now Nova Scotia or New France then. The Acadians under British rule refused to honor the Protestant English king. When the French and Indian War broke out, the Acadians again refused allegiance to the crown. So began the Great Expulsion by the British of Acadians to France, Britain, the Caribbean Islands and all along our East Coast. They were pretty much dumped off. The Connecticut legislature assigned three families of several hundred to Haddam. Without the comfort of a Catholic church and after ten years, they returned home to Nova Scotia.

A century later, the great migration from Europe began; first the Irish in the early 19th century, followed by Germans, Italians, Poles and other eastern European Catholics. Requests were made to the Diocese of Boston (yes, Boston) for missionaries in light of the increasing Catholic population in Haddam. Indeed, the bishop did send missionaries to tend to his flock in Haddam, but it wasn't until the establishment of the Hartford Diocese in 1843 that more priests were sent from area churches to minister to the Haddam Catholics.

It is thought that the first Mass in Haddam was said in a private residence in 1876 by Father Phillip Sheriden of the St. Joseph's Church in Chester, who also served Old Saybrook and Essex. A piece of land was acquired on Saybrook Road with the intent of building a church. While funding for the church was procured the parish rented Brainerd Hall for its services. In 1887 St. Peter's Mission was dedicated.

At first the Mass was celebrated only once a month, again by the pastor of the Chester church. By 1911 the mass was offered every two weeks and not until 1919 was a weekly service offered. It was not until 1958 that the bishop of Diocese of Norwich elevated the mission church to a parish, allowing its own priest. [Image: St Peters 1878-1960]

Father Norman St. Martin, the first pastor of St. Peter's Church, set out to raise funds for a new church to serve the growing parish. His plans called for a church hall, a rectory, a convent and classroom for cate-

chism. With Father St. Martin's dedication and enthusiasm a new church was dedicated on June 19, 1960. Interestingly, the old wooden church on Saybrook Road with its Gothic window and a bell tower was converted to a private residence and stands today.

Above the tabernacle hung a metal sculpture created for the new church by the award winning artist William Bowie. Bowie, a mid-century contemporary metal sculptor, is best known for using industrial materials. St. Peter's wall sculpture, a cross of gilded nails, is a representation of the Resurrection of Jesus Christ. Along the way, it was replaced by a painting of the Devine Mercy. The sculpture, recently found in storage, will hopefully find a new place of honor for parishioners to admire.[Image: St Peters Art Cross]

Adjacent to the church property, on Maple Avenue, a grand turn of the century home was purchased by the diocese for the Motherhouse, a convent. When these sisters moved to a new congregation, sisters from the Apostles of the Sacred Heart of Jesus, from the retreat on Candlewood Hill Road and

Brainerd Road, stepped in to help the pastor with teaching catechism to the children. The sisters of the Apostles of the Sacred Heart of Jesus will be the subject of another article in the near future.

Several pastors have served St. Peter's Church since Father Martin died in 1965 that most of us can remember: Father Thomas W. Ahern, Father John

B. Ramsey, Father Edward M. Konopka, and Rev. Jan Swiderski, and Father Peter B. Lizewski. Currently Father Joseph DeCosta, pastor of St Lawrence Church in Killingworth is serving as pastor of the two churches as they have been "yoked" by the diocese. Parochial Vicar, Father Martin J.W. Jones will serve both parishes but reside in the Higganum parish house.

Today, there are about 500 families in the parish. Religious education is an integral part of the church community and the future of the Catholic Church. Catechism is no longer rote memorization of church curriculum as it had been in the past. Rather, Trish Crete, Co-Director of Faith Formation, tells us that children and teens now learn with the help of videos/media in their classrooms as educating youth has changed in our modern world. Teens in Action present teens with the opportunity to travel each summer to "camp" where they help the elderly, and disadvantage with the upkeep of their homes. From the very young to the elderly parishioners, St. Peter's encourages life-long learning and service to their faith and the community. After the three Acadian families came to Haddam 256 years ago, St. Peter's has grown to become a substantial presence in the town of Haddam.

At the twenty-fifth anniversary celebration of the new parish, Father Konopka wrote, "A church would be merely a lifeless concept and a physical structure that would have no real purpose if it did not draw and nurture people – people of God who seek to know Him more intimately and to praise Him worthily."
