The BOF meeting on April 15 was held at the Annex Building 11 Jail Hill Road starting at 6:30 p.m. In attendance were Chairman Joseph Centofanti, Harlan Frederickson, Robert McGarry, Mark Lundgren, Sean Moriarty and Alternates Joanne Nesti, Dave Challenger and Wayne Rutty. Challenger was seated in place of Cheryl Haase who was absent.

During Public Comment Board of Selectmen member Melissa Schlag brought to the attention of the BOF that at a recent meeting of the RSD #17 Board meeting, Superintendent Howard Thiery made statements that Haddam did not want the HES property (the building and the 10 +/- acres) as a donation. Schlag went on to say that three times during this BOE meeting Thiery said that Haddam did not want HES for free. First Selectwoman Lizz Milardo pointed out that she was not at the meeting in question. Schlag had brought this same question up at the BOS meeting 3:00 p.m. this same day. At the BOS meeting Milardo denied that she had made such statements. Milardo then stated that since today's BOS meeting she has emailed Thiery to get a clarification on what was said.

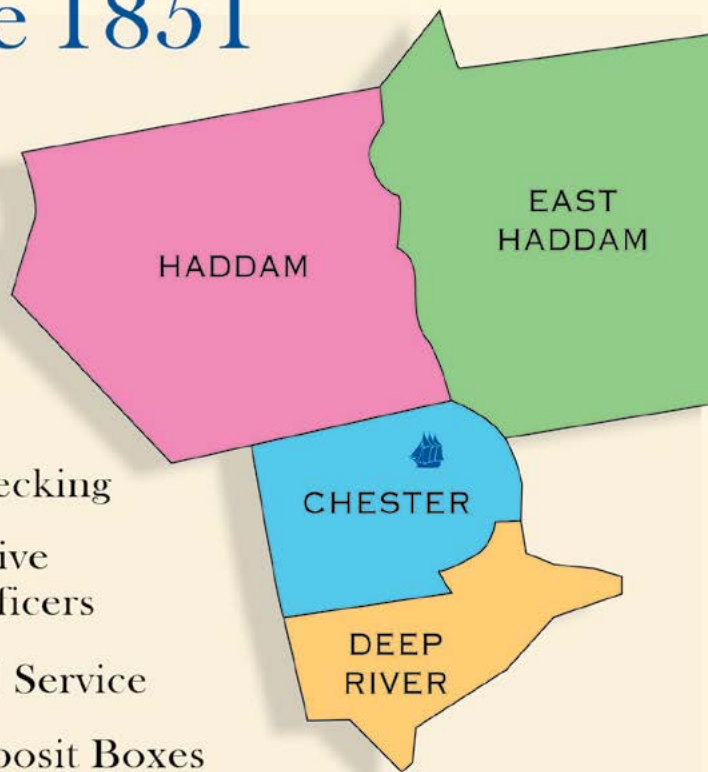

In & About the Haddams: April 1919 National News

Selected from the pages of The Evening Press and lightly annotated by Sally Haase

French Soiled Greatly Damaged.

Paris, April 1: Over 3,000,000 acres of French farming soil have been so badly devastated by the war that it is absolutely non-productive reports an inquiry into war damages. This land has not been workable for four years as it lies in the zones of northern and eastern France over which the contending armies surged to the grapple of death. The desolate conditions suggest that it will be many years before the soil will yield crops again. Another cause of damage is the bombardment or the cutting up of the land for defensive purposes. Equally serious is the loss of livestock. The Germans drove all of the cattle into Belgium and then when the fighting was over they were left to starve by the thousands.

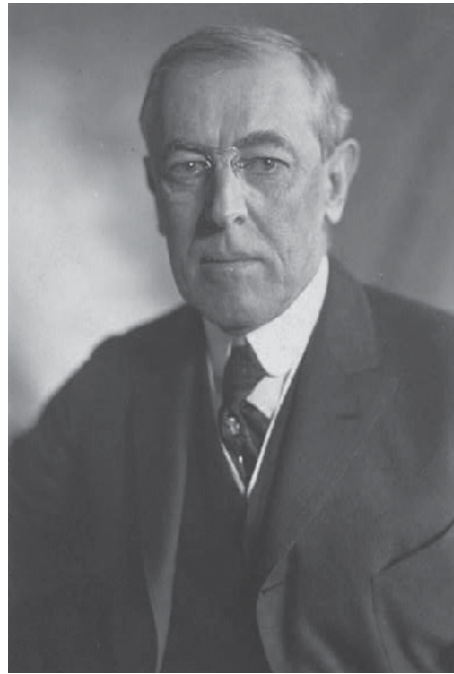
High School Military Training.

Boston, April 2: Military training in high schools of the county, as well as in colleges, is planned as part of a war department's program. Any college,

preparatory school, or high school which agrees to enroll 100 boys over the age of 14 years in military training may apply to have a unit of the reserve officers' training corps established and an army office to give instruction.

Lenine's Reply to Pope. Rome, April 2: A sarcastic reply has been received at the Vatican, to a note addressed to Nicolai Lenine, protesting against brutalities inflicted upon Russian churchmen. The Bolshevik foreign minister declared the "all Russians are equal, regardless of religion," and charged the Russian priests with hoarding food while the people were starving. The Pope's protest stated that churches were being destroyed by the wholesale and 20 bishops and hundreds of priests had been murdered.

50,000 For Occupation Army. Washington, April 3: General Pershing was informed of the decision to enlist 50,000 volunteers for overseas service. With the arrival of each detachment of 1,000 he was to return an equal number of men who had enlisted for the period of the war.

Grey Hound Of The Air. London, April 3: Now comes the grey hound of the air - 800 feet long to carry 110 passengers, with saloon, smoke room and an elevator. Great airships and airplanes have been overcoming the terror of the air with as much reliability almost as the ships that cross on the surface.

Wilson Confined To Bed. Paris, April 4: President Wilson was unable to take part in the peace conference discussions today because of a bad cold which compelled him to stay in bed. The president has been suffering from a cold ever since his second arrival in France. Furthermore his vitality

is taxed by the enormous amount of work accumulated in Washington.

Filipino Appeal For Independence. Washington, April 4: Manuel Quezon, president of the Philippines, presented to Secretary Baker a formal request for independence. He said Filipinos found inspiration and justification for our decision to appeal to the government of the United States for granting of our independence in the declaration of principles of which America in the recent world war held life and property. America fought for 'the liberty, self-government and undictated development of all people and assumed her full share in the war for the liberation of people everywhere.'

"Mr. Secretary," he wrote, "may I be permitted to recall at this juncture that in fighting for so high and noble ideals, the Phillipino people have stood by you during the gigantic struggle. Sir, when our national independence shall be granted us, the world will know that the people of the America are indeed bearers of good will ...and it was our liberty, not your power, our welfare, not your gain, you sought to enhance in the Philippines." [Ceded to the U.S. after the Spanish- American War in 1898, the U.S. did not grant independence to the colony until 1946.]

tary affairs committee will visit American battlefields. While abroad they will confer on the plan of a "field of honor," in which it is proposed to bury all American dead who fell on the fields of France.

Wilson Will Leave France. Paris, April 7: President Wilson has ordered the ocean liner George Washington to proceed from the United States immediately. The George Washington is the ship in which the president has been traveling back and forth between the United States and France. The president, who has been suffering from a severe cold, worked in his bedroom inspecting reports on conditions in Germany. The State department offi-

cial made no attempt to interpret the significance of the president's decision to summon the ship.

Poland Fears Russians. Paris, April 7: A constant stream of fugitives is pouring into Warsaw with fresh tales of bolshevik horrors. One half of the 600,000 people left in Petrograd are starving with great numbers dying daily. The wood pavements of the former Russian capital are being torn up for fuel. Even books in the libraries are being burned. People are being shot on the least provocations. Dead bodies are left lying in the street in heaps. Aristocrats in Russia have accepted degradation or death with complete fatalism. Everywhere moral anarchy is rife.

Make Korea Christian. Washing-

ton, April 7: It is the intention of the leaders of the Korean provisional government in Manchuria to make a Christian country of Korea, once the country is free from Japan, thus making it the first independent country in Asia to become Christian. "The Koreans would not stand for any autocratic government like that of Japan. They have been trained under American Christian influence and the leaders are imbued with the American democratic ideas," said Dr. Rhee, newly appointed secretary of state.

Notes from the Peace Conference:

Apr. 8: The diplomatic battle has reached such a stage that everyone's nerves are on edge.

Apr. 9: A French newspaper complains today that "President Wilson's order for the return of the liner George Washington was used to intimidate France to make concessions. It is high time to tell President Wilson that France's demands are no more than just."

Apr 10: Much speculation was caused here by the announcement that two noted surgeons had been ordered to

proceed to embark on the George Washington at President Wilson's order.

Apr 11: In addressing the League of Nations committee, President Wilson made an impassioned plea for the adoption of the clause specifically exempting the Monroe Doctrine, to avoid any misunderstanding and because of public sentiment in the United States.

Mutiny Of U.S. Troops In Russia. Washington, April 10 & 11: Senator Hiram Johnson related the hardships of our troops in a letter from an officer in Russia. It tells of "terrible suffering of American boys, of their fighting in the snow with a temperature of 32 degrees below zero, of the wounded falling and freezing to death; of poor rations and lack of clothing; and of their harsh British commander. The war department tells of the refusal of an infantry company to go to the front lines and demanding an explanation of their being held in Russia. Details of the mutiny of American troops in Russia are in the hands of Secretary Baker who is enroute to Europe.

100 years ago, much has changed and, then again, nothing has changed.

HKHS update: March/April

March has seen a flurry of activity at Haddam Killingworth High School with April promising to be just as eventful! Spring sports have started, as has preparation for the spring musical. Seniors are making decisions about which colleges they will attend and the administration is putting the finishing touches on the 2019-20 master academic schedule. A few of our current highlights are featured in this article:

THE HKHS STUDENT TUTOR CLUB IS UP AND RUNNING! We have over a dozen student tutors who have been meeting with peers to help with their classes. Students are available to tutor a variety of subjects including math, history, science, and languages. We also have several upperclassmen who are willing to peer edit papers written for English and history classes. Students who are interested in meeting with a peer tutor for help in one or more of their classes can sign up for tutoring in room C213. Any questions can be directed to Fijare Plous or Mrs. Adamczyk.

M3 Math Challenge

At 7:00 a.m. on Sunday, March 3, 2019, ten dedicated HKHS juniors and seniors arrived at the school to participate in the 2019 M3 Mathworks Math Modeling Challenge. Through participation, students experience what it's like to work as a team to tackle a real-world problem under time and resource constraints, akin to those faced by professional mathematicians working in industry.

This year's challenge problem, "One is too many and a thousand is not enough: Substance Use and Abuse," prompted students to research how the financial and non-financial consequences of substance abuse ripple through society and affect more than just the user. Students were challenged to provide a mathematical model to help predict the spread of nicotine use due to vaping over the next 10-years, to analyze the numerous internal and external factors that contribute to substance abuse, and to develop an "impact of substance abuse" metric to help illustrate the influence of various substances on society.

By 9:00p.m., both solution papers were submitted. Now...students wait, with fingers crossed, for

the results of the review of their papers by the more than 125 PhD-level applied mathematicians who serve as judges throughout three rounds of judging. If the team's submission is chosen as a winning solution paper, the team can earn up to \$20,000 in scholarship money...Go Cougars!

HKHS Enjoys a New Instructional Model

This year, we have enjoyed piloting a new instructional model for some of our courses. Blended Learning is a mix of traditional in-class instruction, independent online learning by students, and collaborative learning among students and/or experts in the field. Mrs. Ritter has used this model for one of her U.S. History classes and Mrs. Zukowski has employed the model for her UCONN Horticulture class. In this first year, students and teachers have learned alongside each other as Google classroom has been introduced and as new and exciting instruction and assessment features are shared. For example, students often take their assessments online, getting immediate feedback and saving classtime for person-to-person discussion, labs, and other more meaningful activities. Students report enjoying more independence and teachers report the benefits of working more personally with smaller groups of students while other students are working online or with their peers. As news of the pilot success spreads, we have several other classes queued up to be taught in the blended model next year including: Physics; UCONN Environmental Science; Early Childhood Education Lab; and Select Choir.

HK Student Work Featured in Shoreline Arts Alliance Future Choices Art Show

Now in its 35th Year, Future Choices recognizes and celebrates the talent and passion of our region's high school students. Open to grades 9 through 12, this competition and exhibition are adjudicated by a panel of fine arts professionals.

Students whose work is selected will have their

pieces displayed in a gallery show at the Sill House Gallery of the Lyme Academy College of Fine Arts for three weeks. Categories that are judged are Ceramics, Drawing, Mixed Media, Painting, Pastels, Photography, Prints, Sculpture, and Video. The exhibition is free and open to the public. High schools are recognized for their efforts in keeping the arts a vibrant part of the curriculum.

BOF takes action on HES, bonding plan

The Finance Director Barbara Bertrand was not present but there was a brief discussion of spending in this year's budget and what, if any, surplus might there be at the end of this fiscal year. With many things in flux Chairman Centofanti said that no solid surplus figure could be determined at this time.

HES Purchase sent to Referendum on June 4 by BOF and BOS

Next the board moved on to the First Selectman's report. Milardo reported that the town was receiving a state grant of \$175,000 with no match required from the town to be used on the Scovil Mills. Milardo reported that the RSD#17 has decided to directly donate Swan Hill to the Haddam Land Trust. Because of this, there will not be a need to hold a town hearing/meeting on the Swan Hill property. Originally the BOE was going to donate Swan Hill to the town of Haddam and then Haddam would donate the property to the Land Trust. Milardo pointed out that our Town Planner Bill Warner is determining the boundary lines in consultation with the Land Trust, to assure that public access to Swan Hill and its trail system will be available. Regarding the Haddam Elementary School and the surrounding 10 acres (approximately), the RSD#17 Board has offered that property to the Town of Haddam for \$450,000 which matches the proposal which the BOE received from a developer as a result of the November RFP. If the town voters approve the purchase, payments from the town to the BOE would be made over three years starting July 1, 2020. The Board of Finance agreed with the BOS proposal to have a public hearing on the subject on May 1 and a Town Referendum on June 4, 2019.

\$7 Million Bond Financing Plan Approved by BOF

For discussion purposes, Centofanti handed out a proposed bond financing plan which would involve bonding \$7,007,250 over 20 years at a bond rate of 3.25% and would

require \$572,000 in additional debt servicing. The money would be spent during the period of 2019 – 2022.

Projects to be undertaken with the bond money include specific items needed by the Haddam and Haddam Neck Fire Departments and equipment needs of Haddam's Public Works Department.

Infrastructure projects scheduled to be paid for with the bond include sidewalks, Dublin Hill Bridge renovation, Candlewood Hill Road reconstruction and the culvert on Beaver Meadow Road for which the town is getting grants totaling \$6,781,520 and the bond would finance \$1,010,250.

Road Reconstruction and Repair Included in Bond Proposal

The largest single infrastructure item in the bond proposal for \$3,675,000 involves additional repair and reconstruction of roads which are part of the road evaluation survey conducted by Vanasse Hangen Brustlin, Inc. (VHB) in 2018. Readers will recall that the town previously approved bonding \$6,480,000 for road repairs which are currently near completion. The new bond money would allow the town to continue to work on the VHB list of roads which need repair and reconstruction.

After considerable discussion the BOF voted to approve \$572,000 in additional debt service with Mark Lundgren abstaining. Next the BOF approved a Capital Plan of \$7,592,250 with \$7,007,250 coming from the bond and \$585,000 from the general budget. This motion was made by Harland Frederickson and seconded by Robert McGarry. The vote was 7-2 with Mark Lundgren and Sean Moriarity voting nay.

During the Public Comment period at the end of the meeting resident Ed Schwing spoke against the bonding in the Capital Plan. Resident Jeff Sturges expressed concern about the carrying costs of owning HES and correspondingly what would be the costs if the restructuring plan fails and renovations to Burr School would be needed. Sturges felt that this information would be important for people to have before voting on the referendum to purchase the property.

HVFCo. helps with response to Killingworth fire

Members of Haddam Volunteer Fire Company provided mutual aid to Killingworth this morning, April 15. At 3:14 a.m., crews were dispatched to a reported structure fire in the 800 block of Route 148.

Upon arrival, firefighters encountered a working fire in a 2.5 the story home with exposure to a detached garage. Crews immediately made an initial attack on the exterior fire then entered the structure to extinguish fire that was within the structure. All occupants of the home were able to escape safely upon discovering the fire, thanks in part to working smoke alarms in the home.

Killingworth Engine 3 deployed a 5-inch water supply line from Route 148 up the driveway to the involved structure which was approximately 1,500-foot away. Tankers from Haddam, along with Killingworth, Durham, Madison, North Madison, Haddam, Clinton, and Deep River, shuttled water from pond on Route 148 to a fill site near the end of the home's driveway. Mutual aid companies also assisted with
