
iday Show at Haddam Killingworth High School this year.



New Board holds first regular meeting of term December 9

The new Board of Selectmen (BOS) held its first regular meeting together on Monday, Dec. 9 at the old Town Hall building. First Selectman Bob McGarry, along with Selectmen Kate Anderson and Sean Moriarty, conducted business. JoAnn Ricciardelli took minutes, the documentation of which will be available for residents to read at the Town website, www. haddam.org. Ed Munster video recorded the meeting, the video of which will be available for viewing on Valley Shore Community Television as well as at their accompanying website, www.vsctv.com.

Nearly two dozen people gathered on the cold, rainy evening. The Pledge was recited. The meeting's agenda was amended to include additional items. The floor was then opened for the first period of public comment. Ed Munster congratulated the Board and wished them good luck. Neal Perron inquired about the possibility of naming the entrance to the Haddam Transfer Station in Gunner's remembrance as well as the possibility of naming the bridge in Higganum Center in Phil Goff's remembrance. McGarry said they will follow up on it and look into it, that the state legislature heads that as well. The Board approved minutes from a November meeting, to which none of the current members were a party; however, Moriarty said that he was in attendance, and that the minutes were accurate as he recalled. The Board approved six motor vehicle tax refunds, which totaled \$1,163.54.

The Board then made motions to continue the composition of various boards and commissions. First, McGarry said that there were two long-standing vacancies for abandoned vehicle hearing officers. He indicated that a notice will be put out to the two town party committee chairs as well as on the town website for any vacancies, so that a "wide a number of candidates" can be cast as possible. The Board approved among a variety of boards and commissions, the following: Animal Control Office Daun Kowalski to another two-year term; Assistant Director of Public Works Chris Corsa; Economic Development commission; Gateway commission; Merit Service Retirement Board, which oversees pensions for the two fire departments; Street Naming committee to prevent duplication in street names throughout town; Charter Revision commission; Sustainability committee; and the Board of Finance alternate Prem Aithal to fill the vacancy made by the recent election. McGarry noted that an e-mail had been sent to all currently serving members of boards & commissions to see if they were still interested in serving and unless they expressed otherwise, those individuals would be asked to continue serving. As another point of information, McGarry said that committees formed by the BOS expire and cease to exist 30 days after a general town election. Accordingly, McGarry recommended not continuing the building committee or infrastructure committee; if a need arises to re-institute them, then that would

occur, McGarry explained. In terms of the openings on the Economic Development Commission, Anderson urged residents to "please come in first and see how it operates." She indicated that Town Planner Bill Warner "has expressed that EDC will be taking on significant action items" from the Higganum Center charrettes results – and that residents should see what "they could be getting into" being on the EDC. The Board also approved to continue the Town's legal representation with the labor firm and general town business firm. Moriarty indicated that he believes "we could find a better town attorney." McGarry and Anderson voted to continue the town's legal representation with the same firm; Moriarty voted against.

The one new business item before the Board was a request from Chris Corsa to transfer \$50,000 into the tree removal fund to allow Haddam to continue removing hazardous trees. According to McGarry, the town "has been hit hard, as has the whole state, with drought, gypsy moths, the emerald ash borer, two line chestnut borer." In addition, this is work that the town can typically not do and so is contracted out "to a number of tree services." The proposal at this point is to take money from a couple of lines, Outside Contractor and Materials (\$25K from each) and put it toward tree removal. This request, if approved by the BOS, would then go to the Board of Finance (BOF) for approval and possibly a town meeting. Moriarty said that while he believes the work does need to get done, budgeting can be more concise and accurate on this front. Anderson asked if there was additional information on what work can be expected from this transfer. McGarry said that Corsa has a list of the trees and their locations.

Finally, The Board set the 2020 meeting schedule. McGarry proposed sticking to one meeting per month, explaining that based on his examination of the meeting durations in the past year, he believes that one regular meeting per month is sufficient. He added that he is open to the idea of holding them more frequently should the need arise. Moriarty thanked McGarry for considering holding more than one meeting per month, commenting that more frequency would reduce a need for special meetings. A second meeting could be time for representatives from different committees to give information to the public. McGarry found this to be a favorable suggestion.

During the second public comment period, Mark Lundgren suggested that some meetings be held in Haddam Neck, noting that the last meeting in the spring was well attended. Stu Gilmore asked about the process of street naming. McGarry said that those meetings should and would be open to the public.

The meeting adjourned.

The next regular meeting is scheduled for the second Monday of January: Monday, Jan. 12, 2020.

HVFC responds to five emergency calls in one day

Haddam Volunteer Fire Company responded to five calls for emergency services on Friday, Dec. 6, including two structure fires and one motor vehicle accident.

At 5:10 p.m., HVFC was requested as part of a mutual aid task force to the town of Old Saybrook for a multihome structure fire. Crews responded with Rescue 5-13 and staged at Old Saybrook High School with other de-

At 6:15 p.m., crews were dispatched to the intersection of Little City Road and Killingworth Road for a two-car motor vehicle accident. Firefighters used hydraulic tools to help extricate one of the patients, who was later transported to Middlesex Hospital via Haddam Ambulance Service. Firefighters blocked one lane of traffic during the incident.

At 7:40 p.m., HVFC, along with multiple mutual aid companies, responded to a reported structure fire on Wiese Albert Road. The two-story home was unoccupied when neighbors from across the street noticed a fire burning inside a plastic garbage container. The neighbors called the homeowners and 9-1-1, and attempted to extinguish the fire themselves using water and snow.

Upon arrival, no flames were showing, and Haddam command canceled all mutual aid companies. Firefighters used a water can to extinguish what was left of the melted trash container and smoldering debris. They also examined a section of the home where the fire had begun melting the siding and used a thermal imaging camera to check for any hot areas under the siding. The cause of the fire is under investigation with the Haddam Fire Marshal.

Crews also responded to two medical calls, one at 9:10 a.m. on Little City Road, and at 7:00 p.m. on Saint Peters Lane.

I've had a busy month since assuming my duties as First Selectman. I'm sure most of you have experienced starting a new job and feeling that trying to take it all in was like drinking from a fire hose. It's exciting and daunting at the same time! As I said during the campaign, one of my first priorities is meeting the important people I'd be dealing with during my term. To that end I've met with town employees, first selectmen from other towns, business owners, and engineers working on the Tylerville water project, Dublin Hill Bridge, roads and other infrastructure improvements.

As of my writing this letter:

- Tylerville water The water main is in and has been tested. Hook ups of businesses and residences are on-going. Final paving and finish work will be completed in the spring.
- Dublin Hill Bridge The bridge should be open to traffic by the end of December. The road surface may not be paved but it will be passable. Pav-

ing may have to wait until the spring.

Route 9 signs – DOT will be replacing all of the signs along route 9. The signs are being replaced because many are in poor repair. The exits will be renumbered to meet federal standards. Instead of being sequential, the exit numbers will be the mileage from the exit to the beginning of route 9 in Saybrook. For example, exit 7 becomes exit 10. There will be destination signs on the highway

for Higganum. The project will take two years to complete. While it's expected to start in the fall/ winter of 2020, we probably won't see any changes before the spring/summer of 2021.

I attended a Committee on Aging meeting and I'm impressed with the dedication of its members. They want to increase services to our seniors and I'm happy to work with them to that end.

A couple of exciting things happened this month. Brainerd Library held a ground breaking for their renovations. A new parking lot, first floor entry and community use space are coming! The Higganum Center Study, documenting the results of the public charrettes on the future of the center, was released. Over 250 residents worked together to develop strategies, goals and action plans for the center's future. Exciting changes are coming!

I want to thank the Economic Development Committee and all the volunteers who decorated the town for the season. As I've said many times, our town couldn't run without all of our volunteers. Again, I wish you all a happy and safe holiday season!

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Children's Higher Education Costs in Divorce and Custody Cases in Connecticut By Attorney Makana A. Ellis

In Connecticut, a family court judge can enter an order of educational support requiring a parent or guardian to provide support for a child to attend an institution of higher education, including college and vocational school. The educational support order can be for up to a total of four full academic years so a child can obtain an associate's degree, bachelor's degree and/or vocational training. The order is also for a child who has not yet turned 23 years old. The order would also end when the child turns 23 years old.

The order of educational support can occur when a custody or divorce judgment is entered, or before a judgment is finalized in family court. If a divorce or custody case has gone to judgment, a court will not enter an educational support order for a child retroactively. It is important to have the court enter an order of educational support before or during a judgment, so that if and when your child wants to attend college or vocational school in the future, the court can determine college or vocational costs at that later date.

Certain factors that the court will consider to determine who pays what for your child's higher education

- 1. Any information about the school the child would attend, including proof of acceptance or enrollment,
- 2. The parents or guardians' income, assets, and other obligations,
- 3. The availability of financial aid, including grants, scholarships, and loans for the child,
- 4. The child's need for support to attend school, including the child's assets and earning capacity, and
- 5. The child's academic record, preparation, and commitment to higher education.

Make sure you are fully aware of your options for your children's higher education costs during a divorce or custody case.
