Information about upcoming Haddam primaries, RSD#17 budget referendum

Haddam's next voting sessions will be the Democratic Presidential Preference Primary and the Republican Presidential Preference Primary both on April 28, 2020. The Regional School District #17 School Budget Referendum will be one week later on May 5, 2020.

January 28, 2020 was the last day to switch from one party to another to vote in the Democratic Presidential Preference Primary and the Republican Presidential Preference Primary. However, this does not apply when

switching from unaffiliated to party membership. If you are unaffiliated and want to vote in the Democratic or Republican Presidential Preference Primary you can switch up to 12:00 Noon on the last business day before the primary, which is Monday, April 27, 2020.

To register to vote: The Registrars' Office is open on Wednesdays 9:00am to 1:00pm or register at Haddam Town Hall, Town Clerk's Office (see Town Hall hours below). HKHS Boys win Shoreline, Runner Up at States; Girls 2nd at Shorelines, 7th at States

On Saturday, Feb. 8, the 12-team Shoreline Conference held its Indoor Track and Field Championship meet at Floyd Little Athletic Center in New Haven.

In recent years, the Old Saybrook Girls team has dominated the Shoreline Conference and this year was no exception as the Saybrook girls accumulated 164 points to win easily. What was different this year was the performance of the HK girls. For the previous two years, HK had placed third in close competition. The team's scoring had come from a handful of girls who did a great job, but they had moved on. This year's team was for the most part, young and inexperienced. Yet as the season progressed, the team started to develop. As they entered the league championship, it wasn't clear

where they would end up. Much to the surprise of many, the girls earned 96 points to outdistance East Hampton which had earned 72 points. It was a total team victory. Based on a scoring system of places 1-8, With the exception of the 4×400 relay, which HK did not enter, HK had one or more scorers in every event entered. In addition; over the course of the meet, HK relays and individuals achieved their personal best performances in more than 20 instances. Both of these statistics are testimony to the progress and effort of the girls collectively.

That being said, two individuals stood out for their first place finishes. One of the best performances of the meet was that of Kedarjah Lewis who won the 300 meter dash with a time of 42.67 which was fractions of a second from both the meet record

and HK's school record. Kedarjah also placed second to Cromwell's Andraya Yearwood in the 55 meter dash with a time that was 1/100 of a second from

the school record. HK's other gold medalist was Gabby Lester who won the Shot Put with a toss of 30'7". HK's top relay of the day was the 4×800 team of Isabel Beradino, Julia Callis, Charlotte Selmer and Ali Twachtman which finished second.

In recent years the boys' competition has seen a close battle between HK and Old Saybrook. This year there was no reason to expect otherwise, as the Rams had several outstanding athletes returning. However, the result demonstrated both the quality and depth of HK as the boys pulled away from the Rams

scoring 170 points with Old Saybrook scoring 108 and the third place team, East Hampton 80. As with the girls, it was essentially a total team effort with HK placing at least one or more ath-

Kedarjah Lewis.

The meet began with HK's 4×200 relay team of Dalton Modehn, Dmytri Mallon, Aidan Coleman and Seth Regan winning a time of 1:35.46. In addition, Dymtri and Seth were joined

by Luke Sodergren and Max Cozean to win the Sprint Medley Relay. The members of those two relays were able to collectively provide 46 points from individual events, for a combined 66 points towards the team total. In the process, Seth Regan won the 55 dash and Luke Sodergren won the 55 hurdles.

Also, Matt Jennings repeated his remarkable feat from last year winning all three distance races, the 1000M run, the 1600M run and the 3200M run. Matt's 1000M time of 2:32.94 broke the meet record demonstrating why the HK Junior is recognized

as among of the better distance runners in the State. Joining Matt in the 1000, 4th and the 3200 2nd was Sophomore Caleb Freeman.

Still another first place finish was provided by John Bruder in the Shot John was joined in the Shot put by Colin and Jaden Mack and Dylan Champagne who contributed 8 additional points to the team score. Without diminishing the efforts of the remainder of the Cougar Boy's performances, one last individual contributor to HK's scoring was Eamon Sweeney, Earlier in the season he demonstrated his overall talent and skills placing third in the CT HS Pentathlon, where he also met the State individual qualifying standards in four of the five events contested. His versatility as a jumper was demonstrated in the Conference Championship as he was able to place second in the high jump and fourth in the long jump.

HK Co-Coaches, Sean Gallagher and Dick Dupuis wish to congratulate all of the girls and boys for their performances . They also wish to express their gratitude to Assistants Kristie Kaminski and Evan Woicik for their contributions to the success of the team.



All of these scholarships (except Shoreline Arts and Haddam Neck Fair Association) are listed in Naviance, which is what Haddam Killingworth High School uses for college applications. 

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What Should You Do If You Are Stopped By the Police?

Getting stopped by the police can be a nerve wrecking and stressful experience. In order to ease the stress, here are some helpful tips:

- 1. When you see the police car's overhead lights and/or hear a siren, slow down and pull over in a safe location to the right.
- 2. Roll down your window, so you can communicate with the officer.
- 3. Stay in your car unless the officer advises otherwise. Encourage any passengers to remain calm and cooperative.
- 4. Stay calm and keep your hands on the steering wheel so the officer can see them.
- 5. Wait until the officer instructs you to hand over your license, registration, and insurance information. Then give the officer the documents. Connecticut law requires you to carry these items with you in your car.
- 6. Do not become argumentative. If you do not agree with the citation or violation, you will have an opportunity to address the matter in court.
- 7. If you feel your rights have been violated, write down everything you can remember, including the officer's name and/or badge number.
- 8. If you were given a ticket or arrested, call Dzialo, Pickett & Allen. You may have certain rights. We can tell you what to expect in court and how to build a strong defense.

The staff and BOD of Youth and Family Services are ready to dive into a new year that will be busy and support our mission. The agency served a number of families, a total of 52 children. The generosity of our communities is such a blessing and the appreciation of the families is heartwarming.

We are so grateful for the financial support of the towns of Killingworth and Haddam. YFSHK is not a town agency. We are a non-profit 501-C3. The agency also receives support from the United Way and the Salvation Army. The Killingworth Lions Club has also been a great supporter. Many local businesses and individuals have also donated to YFSHK. Since the beginning, we have been the grateful recipients of Federal and State grants. These have been so well run by dedicated YFSHK staff for many years; resulting in renewals, whenever possible. However, our last one finishes up at the end of June 2020. Federal and State grants are no longer available. Consequently, we must generate other funding.

We also need the help of the communities at large. That help might be financial donations; attendance at our events such as a recent and timely one,

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done in conjunction with the library: "Vaping-What Parents Should Know" on Jan. 16, at the Brainerd Library. Grandparents, guardians and caregivers are welcome at all our events. They are open to Haddam, Haddam Neck and Killingworth families and other events through the school year and summer. We will be having a Family Olympics event during May. Watch for info on the 2nd "Run A Muck" to be held neat the end of the school year. Movie nights during the summer, in our office yard, are great fun for families and they are FREE! Of course there is also our annual 5k Pumpkin Run, our largest fundraiser for the year, in the past. Keep an eye out for some new changes to make the event more attractive and excite new interest in it.

Our Counseling Department, directed by Katy Kennedy, LMFT is fast becoming self-supporting. Katy has increased the numbers of folks receiving counseling and has enabled us to collect more from insurance carriers. No one is turned away. We have a sliding fee scale down to zero, for those who have no coverage. She is able to see people in a room at Killingworth Town Hall. This was enabled by First Selectwoman, Cathy Iino. Katy is also able to see clients in an accessible room in the Haddam Social Services Building. That was enabled by former First Selectwoman Lizz Milardo and the town Social Services Director, Jessica Condil. We are very grateful for all of their help. Anyone needing a counseling appointment may call the agency at 860-345-7498.

During the school year, our Prevention Coordinator, Lindsey Lehet has been running after school groups at the Intermediate, Middle and High Schools. These groups are all focused on helping students make good decisions and become giving, kind members of our community. Some of our high school students have given presentations around the State. They have attended National and State level conferences on leadership in these areas.

Lindsey, along with Michele Ouellette, is the leader of the Healthy Communities-Healthy Kids Coalition. This is a group of adults and students who are trying to stem Alcohol, and other Drug Abuse. Lindsey will stay actively involved with the Coalition. This is such an important mission in these days of the Opioid crisis and the Vaping Crisis among our young people, as well as older members of our communities. Suicide prevention is another issue we need to address. None of these issues affect just teens. The Coalition is an area we can use help from concerned citizens. Please call the agency (860) 345-7498, if the Coalition interests you. You do not have to be a parent or connected to the schools. Being a concerned young adult to a senior citizen is the only qualifier. In an effort to reach a greater number of folks, we have switched meeting time to third Thursday EVENINGS, at 5:30 p.m. at the Haddam Killingworth Middle/Intermediate School library. Please join us at the next one, Feb. 20, 2020.

For our younger population, our Early Education Coordinator, Karen Pasiuk, will be having some educational playtime events for parents and little ones. Watch for announcements of her activities. The Killingworth Lions

work with us and the school nurses, to do special vision screenings. It is a valuable program to pick up possible vision issues, early.

Youth and Family Services also runs the Juvenile Review Board for our communities. It is a diversion program designed to give school age people who are arrested, an alternative to appearing in court. An intake interview of the student and their parent/guardian is done. Their cases are presented to a panel of volunteer members who ask questions of the student and parent/guardian and talk about what the offense was. The panel deliberates and comes up with recommendations for consequences. These must be completed satisfactorily within a certain amount of time. There is another appearance before the panel. If the plan has not been completed satisfactorily or the student has another offense, he or she will go before the Court. There is only one chance before JRB. Our JRB works on a Restorative Justice model. If you might be interested in serving on the JRB, call Laurie Ruderfer at the agency office. Obviously, this is a position that requires extreme confidentiality.

YFSHK is working on bringing back a mentoring program to our District. It is a work in progress. If you might be interested in becoming a mentor, please call the agency and one of the folks involved will get back to you.





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Dementia

Dementia is the loss of cognitive (thinking) functions, along with decreased behavioral abilities that affect daily life and sociability. The most common forms are Alzheimer's Disease, Vascular Dementia, Frontotemporal Dementia, and Dementia with Lewy Body (DLB), but in most cases, there are combinations of

Daily functions such as language, problem-solving, memory, visual perceptions, and elements of self-management, where emotional control can be difficult and lead to personality changes.

Alzheimer's Disease (AD) is most common, and more common in black individuals versus white individuals, and in the population greater than 71 years old, the incidence is almost 2 to 1 compared to younger persons. Women have a higher risk than men, but we have to also factor in longevity, but this only pertains to AD. In 2017, 6.08 million Americans have been diagnosed with AD. It is a progressive deterioration of episodic memory, and no specific therapy has been proven to delay this progression.

Risk Factors to Alzheimer's Disease:

- 1) Advancing Age
- 2) Hypertension
- 3) Obesity
- 4) Insulin Resistance
- 5) Dyslipidemia
- 6) Down's Syndrome 7) Familial History- but this only represents 15-25% of late onset cases

Vascular Dementia has a greater amount of Severe Depression compared to Alzheimer's. Treatment of Vascular dementia involves prevention of new strokes, therefore Anti-platelet drugs are used, and it is also the only dementia where aspirin is recommended.

Dementia with Lewy Bodies (DLB) has more hallucinations and agitation, which is especially troublesome in DLB. Treatment with this type of dementia utilizes Anti-cholinesterase inhibitors such as donepzil, rivastigmine, or

In all instances, the care of a physician is necessary, and care should begin as soon as symptoms begin.

Many who leave animal products in the dust, begin eating lots of pre-prepared soy products, like soy cheese, burgers, hot dogs, and soy-based protein powders. Generally, these pre-packaged foods have too many shady ingredients and are really not good for you. If a product states "soy protein isolate" don't eat it! Of course, if you are allergic to soy, avoid it all together and be careful about reading labels, as it is added to many products.

- 2 T olive or avocado oil
- ½ t paprika
- ½ t allspice
- 1/4 t cloves

- 1 T pure maple syrup
- 4 stalks of celery chopped
- 1 small onion chopped
- 2 T Worcestershire sauce (I use a vegan and GF brand)
- 2 cups water
- 1 bay leaf
- 1 sweet potato chopped, with skin on if organic
- 1 white potato chopped, with skin on if organic
- 2 carrots chopped, with skin on if organic

Place the flour, oregano and sea salt in a bowl and mix. Toss in the chopped tempeh to coat. Heat the olive oil over medium heat and sauté the floured tempeh, celery and onion until lightly browned. Add all other ingredients and simmer for 45 minutes, or transfer to a crockpot and leave on low for 5-6 hours, or until the potatoes are tender. This is wonderful reheated and freezes well!

Tempeh Chili

- 2 T olive or avocado oil
- 1 package of tempeh, crumbled
- 1 small onion, chopped
- 6 sundried tomatoes, soaked and chopped
- 1 garlic clove, minced
- 2 T chili powder
- 1 t cumin powder
- 1 t onion powder 1 t turmeric
- 1 can BPA-free red kidney beans
- 1 large can BPA-free chopped tomatoes, or 6 fresh, organic tomotaoes, chopped
- 1 T pure maple syrup (optional)
- 1 T port wine (optional)

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In and About The Haddams: February 1920 National News

Selected from the pages of The Middletown Press and lightly annotated by Sally Haase

President Escapes the Flu. Washington, Feb. 03, 1920: President Wilson just escaped the "flu." During the past two weeks while Washington was in the grip of extreme cold weather, the president contracted a cold and Dr. Grayson insisted upon his remaining indoors. Dr. Grayson virtually mounted guard over the doors leading to the president's apartment, permitting no one to enter who sneezed or showed symptoms of influenza.

France Wants Babies. Paris, Feb. 04, 1920: "After five years of devoting all our energies to the destruction of life, France is now going to devote the next five years to the creation of life," stated France's first minister of hygiene and health. France proportionately had a higher toll in lost lives than any other country involved in the conflict. "We must endeavor...to make girls realize the nobility of motherhood: we must adopt measures to counteract infanticide and willful abandonment; we must also care for unmarried mothers while they are unable to work."

Per Capita Wealth. Washington, Feb. 07, 1920: The United States treasury figures that your share, based on the amount of cash in circulation is \$54.77. [Note: Feb. 12, 2020 per capita cash in circulation, reported by the Federal Reserve is \$5,352. So what's in your wallet?]

A Women's Party? Washington, Feb. 09, 1920: A women's party will be in the field after the ratification of the suffrage amendment, feminists here announced. Leaders, known as "extreme feminists," strongly advocate that the new party stand for "women only" as political candidates. They are in favor of placing women candidates in the field for every office from president on down.

Spanish Flu In Poland. Washington, Feb. 11, 1920: Spanish influenza, in a form so virulent that it is baffling medical authorities by the suddenness of its attack and its almost certain fatality, is swooping through Poland. This is the third influenza epidemic that has swept over Poland in the past year and the most severe. Patients seldom live more than 24 hours after they have contracted the disease and complications that bring on hemorrhage of the lungs. Warsaw is given over to continuous processions of funerals.

Lansing Resignation Astounds Congress. Washington, Feb. 14, 1920: Official Washington was astounded by Secretary of State Lansing's resignation following a sharp rebuke from President Wilson for having called cabinet meetings during his illness. Certain members of congress have already suggested that there should be an investigation as to the conduct of the government during these months. There was also considerable curiosity as to whether other resignations would follow. Secretary Lansing split with the president at the Paris peace conference and...was submitted to considerable embarrassment because he felt constrained to support the president's views. While his staunch supporters declared it was simply the climax of personal differences, there were others

who were bitter in their denunciation of the president's action.

The president's physician, Rear Admiral Grayson, had been invited to the first meeting for the purpose of determining the real condition of his patient. Informed of the meeting by Dr. Grayson, Wilson asked him to ask by what authority and to what purpose the meeting was called.

Villa Holds American For Ransom. Washington, Feb. 18, 1920: The Mexican bandit, Francisco (Pancho) Villa, is holding Joseph Askew, an American, for payment of ransom of \$20,000. Villa maintains that \$20,000 is an old debt owed by the state department by aiding an American mining concern to get a large amount of silver bullion out of Mexico during one of the periods of civil warfare and he was to receive \$40,000 for his service. He will hold Askew until the state department pays the remaining \$20,000.

Socialist Not Bolsheviki. Albany, N.Y., Feb. 18, 1920: A sweeping denial that the socialists of America are bolshevists or that they foster the adoption of a soviet government was made by Morris Hillquit, the party leader in America testifying as an expert in the proceedings against five suspended assemblymen. "We socialists in America are not bolsheviks," declared Hillquit. "We are in reality social democrats of the Marxian type."

Power To Decide Incapacity of President. Washington, Feb. 19, 1920: The cabinet is made the judge of the "physical, mental and moral inability of the president to perform the duties of his office, and upon a majority decision by the cabinet that there exists inability on the part of the president, the vice-president shall assume charge of the presidential office, by the provisions of a bill introduced in the house by Rep. Madden of Illinois. [Note: The issue was settled by the 25th Amendment in 1967.]

Get Down To Business! Washington, Feb. 23, 1920: Progressive republicans in congress made known their demands for immediate action for domestic legislation. The first open expression of the desire to speed up domestic legislation and do away with investigations and probes of the actions of the democratic administration insofar as they affect the passage of legislation for the future was from Senator Capper. He said, "While we have been probing, investigating and rambling over everything that was done or was not done during the war, including frauds and scandals, meriting the fullest publicity and promptest and most punishment...we have given scanty attention to such urgent and momentous matters as the railroad problem, reduction of government extravagance, the opening of European







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More Hitting To Pep Up Baseball. New York, Feb. 23, 1920: Fandom's plea for more "hitting" in the major leagues has been heard at last. The "Powers That Be" in baseball lent their ears to the cry of the fans some time ago and took heed. They have paved the way for freer hitting by curbing the pitchers. The decision of both big leagues to abolish the various freak deliveries by means of which the pitchers kept down the hitting was halted with satisfaction by the fans. No more shine ball, no more licorice ball, no more emery or talcum powder ball! And no more spitters after this season. Pitchers like Eddie Cicotte and Harold Carlson who have gained reputations for the use of the "shiner" or other freaks will have to get along without them next summer.

As Little Legislation As Possible. Washington, Feb. 23, 1920: Never in the history of the nation has the individual Congressman been up against it quite so hard as now [and the June conventions.] He admits he has no idea what the public wants. So he intends to be very circumspect lest he offends by stepping upon unsuspected corns. Damned if they do, and damned if they don't, members confess they are in the position of the little boy who was warned to run away if he saw a snake. Instead, he began jumping up and down. "Why didn't you run?" he was asked. "I didn't know which way to run!" he protested. "Then what made you jump up and down?" asked again. "To keep him from biting me standing still." There you have Congress.

100 years ago, much has changed and, then again, nothing has changed.

Shad museum opens April 5



Summary of January 2020 Board of Education Meetings

Capital Improvements:

Recognition of HKHS Public Building Committee: A grateful Board recognized the work of the HKHS Energy Project Public Building Committee for their years of service overseeing the multi-faceted project. Thank you to Eric Couture, Joanne Nesti, Colleen Fitzpatrick, Karen Perry, Sue Williams, Bill Leahy, Robert Braren, Chip Frey, Rob Albert and Tom Hogarty.

Formation of a Standing Public Building Committee (PBC):

A Standing Public Building Committee has been formed with community members Graig Judge, Sean Donlan, and Jim Duffield, and Board members Eileen Blewett and Peter Sonski. First projects outlined are the HKHS Field House Project and the Oil Tank Removal and Replacement at both Burr and KES.

HKHS Field House Project:

The PBC evaluated two architect firms that responded to an RFP and recommended Hibbard and Rosa Architects, LLC of Middletown to provide design and construction administration for the potential Field House Project. The Board approved the recommendation and a timeline has been projected for the potential project. In February, the Board will consid-

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the scope of the project. If approved, work will begin in late April. More information will follow when it becomes available.

Joint Meeting: BOS/BOF/BOE

The Board hosted a pre-budget conversation to discuss the state of the schools and towns. It was shared that District enrollment continues to decline greater in Killingworth than Haddam. Thus Haddam's portion of next year's budget allocation will increase from 58.95% to 61.40% and Killingworth's decreases from 41.05% to 38.60%. The Board shared general information regarding the State Partnership Plan's impact to the District and employees, continued increases in Special Education costs, and the desire to continue to keep buildings maintained. Towns expressed a desire for the Board to constrain costs and the challenges with supporting an increasing District budget.

Other Business:

Introduction of New Administrators: The Board welcomed Ann Adrianni as the new Director of Fiscal Operations for RSD17, Jennifer Beermuender as the new Curriculum Coordinator for Literacy/Humanities, and Heather Rigatti as the new Curriculum Coordinator for Math, Science and Technology. The Curriculum Coordinator positions replace the Assistant Superintendent position (and their former positions will not be replaced), making the hires cost neutral to the District.

2019-20 Calendar Revision:

An update was made to this year's school calendar making June 10th the last day of school. In the event that there are further snow days, updates to the last day of school can be found on our website under "School Calendar."

Search Institute Survey:

HK Youth and Family Services requested, and was granted, Board approval to administer it's bi-annual survey of 7th-12th graders to gather valuable data on our youth, which is shared with the schools and community. The survey will be conducted this Spring.

Curriculum Update:

Two new courses to next year's High School Curriculum were approved: Beginning Spanish Conversation – fulfills a new State World Language requirement, and The Modern Novel – a reading-intensive course studying literature from the last ten years.
