Food for Thought: A Healthy Heart

As I sat down to write about a Healthy Heart, I struggled a bit with where to begin, as there is so much contradictory information out there. This can certainly leave you feeling a bit confused and maybe even overwhelmed. There are theories that tout adding a spoonful, or two of coconut oil to smoothies and those who say stay away from saturated fats all together. There are diet regimes that suggest eating lots of animal protein and no grains and those who say animal protein is a bad thing for the heart and to consume more vegetables. Believe it or not, nutrition is still a fledgling science and it is ever evolving as the latest research points us in a new direction.

Having studied integrative nutrition for many years, I consistently see that all the experts agree on consuming more leafy greens and seasonal veggies; reducing or eliminating sugar from your daily diet; avoiding overly processed pre-packaged foods and preparing more whole foods at home; and to stop being a couch potato and to keep your body moving. I agree with the experts, but will add my two cents below. As always, before starting any new diet or lifestyle change, be sure to consult with your doctor.

In previous columns I have alluded to overall inflammation in the body and how to reduce it and without sounding like a broken record, this is critical for a healthy heart. I believe it begins with a healthy, loving attitude towards life, which includes reducing day to day stress; to stop worrying over every little thing; to rephrase negative chatter to positive thinking, and to live from a place of gratitude & love. Fear and worry erodes health and hope leaves room for doubt that things will get better. When we believe in our ability to heal that is when the magic happens! I speak from personal experience on this front.

Once you have shifted to a positive mindset the rest is a piece of cake, or should I say "leafy green" ... I'm actually a big fan of many of the concepts in a Mediterranean diet, which include healthier fats like olive oil and avocado oil; lots of leafy greens and veggies; anti-inflammatory herbs like oregano, thyme, sage, & rosemary; organic nuts, seeds, and beans; less refined whole grains like sprouted whole wheat, quinoa, amaranth, & millet; wild caught fish from time to time; along with foods rich in polyphenols like organic berries, coffee, green tea, and even a little red wine & dark chocolate as tolerated.

I'm not a fan of dairy and feel this, for many, can trigger lots of inflammation. I will occasionally enjoy goat or sheep cheese, but avoid it otherwise. I believe some folks need a little animal protein in their diet and others do better being totally plant based. If you are a "meat" eater try reducing the portion size, keeping it lean, grass-fed, free-range, and making it less often and as a side dish to your veggies. Avoid those overly processed foods, especially those with sugar, bad fats, and yucky chemicals. Foods that sit on that fence of heart healthy or not, like coconut oil, butter, coffee, etc., I'm a big believer in moderation. It's kind of that 80/20 rule – if 80% of the time you eat/live a heart healthy lifestyle, then the 20% is just part of living all in!

Some of my go-to superfoods include fermented vegetables; nut milk yogurts; chia, fax, & hemp seeds; fermented tempeh; green juices and nutrient dense smoothies; ginger & turmeric root in teas or stir-fries, and living foods like sprouts and microgreens. These are all super heart healthy and will support reduced inflammation in the body.

What I have consistently witnessed is when folks make these changes and are consistently practicing a heart healthy lifestyle (80% of the time) their doctors begin either reducing or even eliminating blood pressure, cholesterol, and blood sugar medications. As I like to say, LOVE yourself enough to _____ (you fill in the blank)!

Some Heart Healthy Recipes:

Berry Nutty Smoothie:

1 cup frozen berries of choice ¼ cup of mixed soaked/dehydrated nuts & seeds (chia, hemp, pumpkin, walnut)
Juice of ½ of lemon

Organic almond milk or water

Drops of stevia or pitted date for added sweetness (optional)

¼ avocado and or banana (optional for a creamy texture and added nutrients)
Blend on high until well mixed.

Walnut Tacos

3 cups walnuts (soaked & dehydrated)

1 tsp. garlic powder

2 T chili powder

1 tsp. cumin

1 tsp. paprika

½ tsp. turmeric powder

Dash of pink sea salt

Place all ingredients in a food processor and pulse until chopped. Wrap in collard greens or romaine lettuce, top with sprouts and shredded & chopped veggies of choice



February 11, 2019 meeting recap

The Board of Selectmen (BOS) held its regular meeting on Monday, February 11 at 6:30 p.m. All members of the BOS were present: First Selectwoman Lizz Milardo, Selectman Larry Maggi and Selectwoman Melissa Schlag. Assistant to First Selectwoman, JoAnn Ricciardelli, took minutes.

Residents filled the Old Town Hall building to the brim. Schlag said that she would like to add discussion of Haddam Elementary School in light of the "RFP" (Request For Proposal). Discussion ensued regarding the Request For Proposal (RFP) that the Regional District 17 Board of Education (BOE) received on Wednesday, Feb. 6. Milardo said that she "does not mind" doing so, but that she "did not have a copy of the RFP." Milardo continued that she "is happy to discuss HES" but that she could not answer "questions about the RFP" and had been informed that while a copy of the RFP was distributed to members of the BOE, the contents thereof were to remain "confidential" until the BOE members held their meeting on Feb. 26. During this discussion, Milardo and Maggi indicated that they had not yet received a copy.

For nearly two hours, numerous residents voiced opposition to the Regional School District 17's

planned closure of the Haddam Elementary School (HES) in Higganum Center. Based on the public comments, there appeared to be four categories or groupings of views/opinions: residents who want more data and information in terms of the cost-benefit analysis of said closure; residents who want the closure process paused for at least a year; residents who want the Town to purchase the school building and property from RSD17; residents who accept the closure while desiring the guarantee that the building will not be empty and that it will be part of development for Higganum Center. This latter genre of views also included a position that the Town consider purchasing the Swan Hill portion as open space for use by residents, as well as those who argued that development would bring in more families with children, necessitating a school after all – and that it would cost more money in the end. Members of the Save HES movement spoke about wanting to work with the Town to correct the "mistake" of the planned closure and that they want the Town to "work with us," according to resident Katie Packtor. Christine Palm, State Representative of the 36th District, spoke about wanting to assist with respect to this matter, noting that she has reached out to the Board of Education via e-mail and would send another.

There was mention by resident Ross Hanson of pursuing the possibility that the State Board of Education investigate the local RSD17 Board of

Education. There was also mention by resident Erik Hesselberg that he could look into the Towns of Haddam and Killingworth having first right of refusal for the property. Milardo indicated openness to exploring the facts where they lead on these fronts.

Throughout and in response to various public comments, Milardo emphasized that the Town has no legal mechanism by which to intervene or stop the RSD17 BOE's plan to close HES (Editors Note: HES is not Town-owned; it is owned by RSD17). Milardo iterated that she has sent a letter to the BOE, that she has sat down with the various individuals involved, but that "legally" she does not know what else "we can do." Selectman Maggi said that "we are here because we don't want to close the school...that is what it boils down to."

The next BOS meeting is scheduled for Monday, March 11, 2019 at 6:30 p.m. Hope to see you there!

February update

Haddam News recently caught up with First Selectwoman Milardo on various matters throughout Town.

MP: Tylerville Water status?

LM: Coast Line Construction has begun laying the pipes for the water mains. The company has done this work on Eagle Landing, South Side Bluff, Brookes Court and Camp Bethel Road. There are a few easements from property owners the company is in the process of obtaining. We are making great progress and are moving right along. There are some areas that Coastline cannot move into quite yet, as they have to wait for the greenlight from DOT once the asphalt plant opens for the spring season again, as some roads require digging up. Finally, we are running into an issue at Little Meadow. and Coastline is stuck in terms of not being to lay the pipe down there, due to two property owners who are concerned that the Town is seeking to take over Little Meadow Road and make it a town road. However, that the Town has NO interest in doing that. As it stands, the Town has difficulty maintaining over100 miles of road we maintain already. This hold-up will affect construction of the main in that area, possibly delaying the work until the prime summer season, when more people come to Haddam, and this disruption will impact more people. Moreover, the ordinance time frame in which property owners could file an application with the State Department of Public Health to opt out of the water main is over.

MP: Update on Cell Phone Tower(s) coming to Town?

LM: The carrier is currently reviewing contracts to place two towers in the Tylerville area of Haddam.

MP: Update on road work throughout Town?

LM: The pattern of horrible rains and wetness from 2018 seems to be sticking with us into the new year, but the crews are ready to continue road work as soon as the weather allows. We are calculating how much of the road bond has been used to determine what other roads can be done this upcoming season based on the road study conducted last year. In addition, I am happy to report that Haddam has received a \$2.9 Million grant (\$2,938,600) for roadway reconstruction. The Town had applied for this Local Transportation Capital Improvement Program grant (LOTCIP) via the Lower Connecticut River Valley COG (Council of Governments). Gregory M. Doro-

sh, Manager of Highway Design in the Bureau of Engineering and Construction of the State Department of Transportation (DOT) notified me of the good news at the end of December. Moreover, this is funding that the State has committed to us. In other words, regardless of what occurs with the State budget, this grant mony cannot be rescinded. Finally, we received word that Haddam is also the recipient of a separate grant of \$400K, the "Community Connectivity Grant" (through the state DOT), which will help cover the costs of repairing sidewalks on Route 154 near Brainerd Memorial Library.

MP: What about work on the Dublin Hill Bridge?

LM: Arborio will begin work on the bridge within the next month or so. This was the same company which built the beautiful bridge in Higganum Center. The Dublin Hill Bridge will also feature an arch design. They are in the process of coordinating work details with the DOT. A detour has already been planned in conjunction with all public safety/emergency entities in Town. We have all of our ducks in a row and are set to go as soon as the weather allows.

MP: How is budget season going?

LM: Budget season is in full swing. The BOS has finished drawing up its operating budget and it has been forwarded to the Board of Finance (BOF). The BOF is in the process of finalizing the capital budget; this will be completed by the end of February.

MP: What are your thoughts on the HES closure, the Save HES movement and other related matters?

LM: Our recent BOS meetings have been organized to encourage public comment on the subject, yielding hours of input by residents. The BOS has listened

carefully to the concerns of the Friends of HES and other residents which the folks have shared with us. While I am very sympathetic to the opinions and concerns shared by our residents, Haddam has no legal jurisdiction over the closure. Haddam Elementary is owned by RSD17. This is a decision that the Regional School District has made and one over which the Town has no control. I am not aware of any change in the direction by the District. Assuming that the RSD is going ahead with its plan, we as a town need to come together and focus on the future of Higganum Center and work together to make the very best out of this situation that we can. To that end, it is my belief and goal that the Town would like to retain Swan Hill on the HES property for enjoyment by the people of Haddam.

MP: Finally, you met with the new Governor, Ned Lamont, recently. How did that go?

LM: We had a great visit with Governor Lamont. I spoke with the Governor for more than 30 minutes and shared with him my concerns on a range of issues including: Scovil Mill; financial oversight and checks & balances with the Board of Finance in terms of the Regional School District and their budget; pursuing more opportunities for tourism in Haddam such as utilizing Eagle Landing State Park; concerns about where we send our waste to Hartford; considering the Lower Connecticut River Valley COG as a "county" in order to secure federal dollars (not just state dollars which is what has always been done) for road work in Haddam; and infrastructure in Higganum Center. It was an extremely productive meeting. There is so much in store for Haddam. Let us continue to work together to make this Town that we love and cherish the best that it can be.



VAPING

Grain-Free Crackers/Crust

1 T ground chia seeds

1/4 C water

1 T olive oil

1/4 t baking soda (non-aluminum)

1/4 t pink sea salt

1/2 C ground flax meal

1 C ground almonds

A pinch of rosemary, oregano, & sage

Whisk the chia seed with the water until it is "egg-like." Add oil, baking soda, and sea salt and whisk until well blended. With a wooden spoon, stir in the flax meal and then the ground almonds. Mix until dough forms.

Place dough between two pieces of parchment paper and roll flat. Slide the dough that is between the parchment paper onto a large cookie sheet. Sprinkle with the spice blend. Bake at 350F for 15-20 minutes, or place in the dehydrator for 24-36 hours, or until crisp.

Can be used as a pizza crust or broken into small pieces for dipping or spreads.

Hemp Hearts

6 large Medjool dates, cut in half the long way and pitted

3 Tbs. melted dark chocolate, preferably 85% dark 1 Tbs. hemp hearts

Cut a small triangle at the top of each date half and pinch the lower portion to make the shape of a heart. Place on a cookie sheet lined with wax paper. Spoon about ½ tablespoon of dark chocolate on each heart. Sprinkle with hemp hearts. Set in the refrigerator until set. They make a wonderful holiday or hostess gift. Great to have a batch in the refrigerator for when you just need something a little sweet and chocolaty.

Proposal to create Central CT Loop Trail

By State Senator Norm Needleman, 33rd District

At a public hearing, the General Assembly's Transportation Committee held a public hearing where constituents and senators supported legislation that would not only create a new trail snaking from East Hampton through to Portland, Middletown, Meriden and Cheshire, but would create a connection between two additional trails as well, giving our region access to more than 100 total miles of interconnected paths.

Senate Bill No. 775, "An Act Concerning the Creation of the Central Connecticut Loop Trail," introduced by State Sen. Norm Needleman, State Sen. Matt Lesser (D-Middletown) and State Sen. Mary Abrams (D-Meriden), would start work on creating this new connection if approved.

The bill would require the commissioners of the Department of Transportation and the Department

of Energy and Environmental Protection to fund and coordinate the planning, design and construction of a trail starting in East Hampton, the western-most point of the Air Line Trail, and moving west through Portland, Middletown, Meriden and Cheshire. Eventually, this trail would connect to the Farmington Canal Heritage Trail in Cheshire. That trail runs north-south from Suffield to New Haven.

This represents a fantastic opportunity for our district, as it wouldn't just create a new trail for recreational use but create a link between two of the state's largest trails in the process, creating a loop between them that would stand at more than 100 total interconnected miles. In effect, the loop would connect a good portion of our state, expanding trail access for many.

My constituents would be able to run, walk and bike along the trail, whether they simply want to go for a mile or two or try to ride as far as they can across the state. It would represent opportunities for exercise and provide options to walk or bike to work or school instead of driving, providing increased freedom of choice while increasing time in nature and reducing pollution. It could even expand economic development, and not just from the shops that could fix riders' bikes and serve hungry walkers. Having a trail like this would undoubtedly also increase regional tourism. When folks from around the state and beyond come to visit, they'll be minutes away from our Main Streets and our town centers, where they can enjoy shopping and dining. I'm happy to support this worthwhile endeavor.
