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
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June 26 Special Town Meeting

A Special Town Meeting was held on June 26, 2019 at the Haddam Volunteer Fire Company Station #1 for two central purposes: 1) vote on Town acceptance/spending of a \$225,000 state Brownfield Grant for remediation of the Scovil Hoe (old DOT Garage) in Higganum; 2) vote on transferring \$38,073 from operating to Capital Non-Recurring (CNR) for Capital Reval in 2020.

Tony Giamei was nominated moderator from the floor to preside over the meeting. Town Clerk Scott Brookes read the legal call for the meeting. First Selectwoman Lizz Milardo provided a brief synopsis explaining the context for each item.

In terms of the Brownfield Grant, Milardo said that the Town had applied for a \$1 million grant but that state funding was short. To date, the Town has received \$200,000 for remediating Scovil Hoe, Milardo explained. Over the course of meetings with the Department of Economic and Community Development (DECD), Milardo said that the state indicated "great interest" in remediating the building and urged the Town to write a letter requesting additional monies. The state is now giving Haddam an additional \$225,000. Sally Haase inquired about the Brownfield grant. Milardo explained that there will be phases and steps for the remediation process. To this end, Milardo says she hopes that the money can go not only to the planning of remediation but actu-

al remediation as well.

In terms of transferring \$38,073 from operating budget to capital for 2020 Capital Reval, Milardo explained that the Town had planned to do the reval in-house, as the Tax Assessor at the time was confident in doing so. Milardo said, however, that the Town changed this process and recently accepted a bid from Equality Valuation Services to do the reval. Milardo emphasized that this is "a basic transfer from operating back to capital." This author asked whether the Town had previously done reval inhouse. Milardo said no and that contracting for the reval is going to cost the same amount of money were the Town to do it in-house.

Both items passed unanimously. The meeting adjourned.

Jesus Forgives Sin! He Said,

"GO AND SIN NO MORE"

The religious police arrested a woman caught in the act of adultery. The Law required the death penalty by stoning, and her accusers wanted Jesus to condemn her. Jesus said, "He that is without sin among you, let him first cast a stone at her...9 When the accusers heard this, they slipped away one by one...until only Jesus was left in the middle of the crowd with the woman. 10 Then Jesus stood up again and said to the woman, 'Woman, where are those accusers of yours? Has no one condemned you?' 11 She said, 'No one, Lord.' And Jesus said to her, 'Neither do I condemn you; go and sin no more'" (John 8:7-11).

Jesus healed the sick. "Now a certain man was there who had an infirmity thirty-eight years. ⁶ When Jesus saw him lying there, and knew that he already had been in that condition a long time, He said to him, 'Do you want to be made well?'" After Christ healed the man, "Jesus found him in the temple, and said to him, 'See, you have been made well. Sin no more, lest a worse thing come upon you" (John 5:5-6, 14).

What could be worse than to perish in hell? Jesus said, "God so loved the world that He gave His only

begotten Son, that whoever believes in Him should not perish but have everlasting life. ¹⁷God did not send His Son into the world to condemn the world, but that the world through Him might be saved. ¹⁸ He who believes in Him is not condemned; but he who does not believe is condemned already, because he has not believed in the name of the only begotten Son of God. ¹⁹ And this is the condemnation, that the light has come into the world, and men loved darkness rather than light... (John 3:16-19). "For all have sinned and come short of the glory of God" (Romans 3:23).

Jesus said, "If anyone desires to come after Me, let him deny himself, and take up his cross daily, and follow Me...No one, having put his hand to the plow, and looking back, is fit for the kingdom of God" (Luke 9:23, 62). "We should no longer be slaves of sin... ¹⁴ For sin shall not have dominion over you...²³ For the wages of sin is death, but the gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord" (Romans 6:6-23).

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Seeing Red-

We are getting to that time of year when the red eyes are out! When associated with sneezing or discharges, it usually something that is a momentary attack of allergies or a dip in the not fully chlorinated swimming pool, a quick trip to the doctor is in order. But, because this symptom can be severe it takes a doctor to make that differential diagnosis. Many of the most serious occurrences of red eye do not have a discharge, and typically the presence of a discharge is more an indication of conjunctivitis, which is not life threatening.

Some serious Red Eye Conditions-

- 1) Corneal Ulcers- most commonly occurs in patients who sleep overnight with their contact lenses, but not necessarily. Patients present with blurred vision, pain, and sensitivity to
- 2) Herpetic Eye- This occurs mainly in patients with a history of cold sores, lid vesicles, or in patients on immunosuppressant therapy. The doctor will inquire as to presence of symptoms prior to red eye forming, such as pain, numbness or tingling of the eye.
- 3) Acute Angle Closure- This is a very severe condition that results in very high intra-ocular pressure, which has potential to threaten vision. You might notice that eye feels hard when pressing against it with lid closed.

So by now, you should have made the mental note. If you get red eye-good opportunity to see the doctor, but remember the symptoms.

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

Fun in the Summer Sun

After a long, rain-filled spring, who isn't excited to feel the heat of the summer sun?! We encourage you to get out there and enjoy it, but while having fun in the sun, keep these summer safety tips in mind:

Stay Hydrated– Drink up and don't wait until you feel thirsty to do so; you're body won't always let you know when it's time to rehydrate. As a general rule of thumb, it is suggested that you drink a minimum of 8 eight ounce glasses of water a day. Thirst quenchers such as Gatorade provide health benefits as well. Avoid drinks containing caffeine or alcohol.

Elderly Nutrition Program

The Haddam Senior Center is fortunate to offer the Elderly Nutrition Program by serving as a Community Café through Community Renewal Team (CRT). This program is a federally funded Title III grant that is administered by Senior Resources. As the grant does not cover all of the costs involved (i.e. product, preparation, distribution, service), a donation of \$2.50 per meal is requested; however, no senior will be denied a meal if they are unable to pay. To participate in the nutrition program, you must be 60+ and have a current Consumer Registration Form (Form 5) on file. Meal reservations should be called in to the Center's main phone line, or you may sign up at the Center in advance. Registering early will guarantee your meal, as we are not always able to accommodate last-minute requests. Please note that the nutrition program will be modified for the summer months, beginning June 1st through August 31st. Meals will be served only when the Center is open (Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays); therefore all meal requests must be made a minimum of 48 hours in advance.

Meals on Wheels: Homebound seniors can receive healthy meals delivered right to their door. If you are interested in learning more about this program or you believe you may be eligible, please contact the Senior Center or the Social Services office.

Senior Van Transportation

If you have difficulty driving or limited transportation available, we encourage you to take advantage of the Senior Van Services. The Senior Van is available to those 60 and older. In addition to weekly shopping trips, the service provides door to door transportation to medical appointments. Please note that we have expanded our services to include transportation beyond Middlesex County.

For more information or to schedule a ride, please call Jessica Condil at the Social Services Office (860-345-4621). Rides must be booked no later than Friday the week prior, though keep in mind that availability is first-come, first- served, so we encourage you to call well in advance. 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Agendas and antiagenda toddlers

In watching my son develop into his own person, I realize that toddlers are the most anti-agenda being on this planet (except perhaps for dogs). What I mean by this is young children are averse to their millennial parents' approach to life which is to overthink the meaning of people's words and intentions; underestimate the importance of individual freedom and autonomy; and hyper-curate one's image on social media for personal indulgence and others' consumption.

Toddlers are allergic to agendas – political or otherwise. All toddlers want to do is love, be loved, imagine, play and laugh – without regard for cultural censorship programming (hate speech laws, I'm looking at you), communist yearnings for an all-knowing state (Alexandria Ocasio-Cortes, I'm looking at you) or the number of likes one's Facebook profile photo receives (millennial peers, I'm looking at us). I take each point in turn.

Overthinking the meaning of people's words and intentions

Millennials enjoy parsing one's intent the way a grammarian parses syntax. This can be both a desirable and an undesirable trait. On the one hand, understanding someone's intent motivating words or actions is valuable if the objective is to discern truth and genuineness. On the other hand, plumbing the depths of someone's words or behaviors in order to achieve a moment of: "Gotcha! You're racist, sexist, and bigoted because of all of the micro-aggression-y things-you're-engaging-in-even-though-you-weren't-even-aware-of-it-but-now-you're-being-tried-in-the-court-of-political-correcness."

If a male cashier at a grocery store says to me "Have a great day, miss!" choose the correct answer below for how a millennial-in-good-standing ought proceed: a) excoriate him for using the sexist designation "miss"; b) stipulate that he should have used the term "Ms."; c) inform him that the phrase "Have a great day, miss!" is in command form and therefore has an embedded power imbalance, especially because the speaker is male and the addressee is female (as savvy millennials know, gender is a marker of inherent inequality); d) all of the above. Did you choose your answer? Ding! Ding! It is: d) all of the above. Millennials are sensitive to dynamics of power and inequality. We must rid language of their oppressive invocations – including "have a great day."

Now, from the anti-agenda viewpoint of a toddler, the above scenario is ridiculous (worth ridiculing). A toddler would just say "hi" or "bye bye" and be happy that there are other friendly, kind people in this world who wish others a "good day."

Underestimating the importance of individual freedom & autonomy

Political luminaries of my generation include new kids on the block such as Alexandria Ocasio-Cortez. 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

This distinction exemplifies Middlesex's 20-year commitment to interprofessional collaboration and excellence in patient care. Each Magnet designation


