Higgies to open June 29

On June 9, Higgies' Facebook page announced, "After 3 LONG years, the MUCH anticipated RE-OPENING of a Connecticut staple has FINALLY come!! We're excited to get Higgies up and running again and we hope you're just as thrilled as we are!! We're aiming for a tentative opening date of Monday, June 29th so spread the word, come hungry and bring your family and friends!!"

Since it was shared 188 times on Facebook, it sounds like people are definitely excited to have Higgies back open. Higgies, which is located at 236 Saybrook Road, Higganum, has been a food/ice cream stand since the 1940's. Higgie's was opened around 1947 by the Smigel brothers, according to Elizabeth Malloy, Executive Director of the Haddam Historical Society. "The eatery catered to travelers along Route 9 (Saybrook Road) which was the main road between Hartford and the shoreline. Higganum resident, Dan Clifford remembers summer traffic backed up from the YMCA light in Middletown all the way to Higganum," she explained. "The Clifford family operated Higgies in the late 1950s through the 1960s. In the

summer they served hot dogs, hamburgers, French fries, milk shakes (with real ice cream), Undina soda, and ice cream. They were known for their secret BBQ sauce. The restaurant has passed through several owners since then including local resident, Bill Distefano, who operated it in the late 1980s and early 1990s."

Rebecca Rossitto, who is from Portland, and her husband Michael Otlowski, who is from Middletown, are "concessionaires" in the carnival business. Unfortunately, due to COVID-19, many events in their industry were canceled

for this year, so they needed to make alternate plans. They started looking for a location in Middlesex County to set up one of their concession stands. They weren't having much luck, but were reminded that Higgies were closed and had a great location.

They called the town, and got in touch with Dan Still, the current owner. "We talked for a few minutes about the possibility of us setting up our stand in his parking lot," said Rebecca, "and he had the AMAZING idea of us re-opening the building instead."

Plans for 2020 HKHS senior activities, events

The last few weeks have included a whirlwind of emotion as Governor Lamont declared that schools would not reopen for the end of year. While many of us anticipated that this might happen, it did not lessen the impact of learning that it is a certainty.

As you would expect, the HKHS family has been working hard behind the scenes not only to continue the distance learning initiative which is new for all of us, but also to plan for our seniors in the event that we could not come back together for June 15th. These are not decisions we want to rush, as they are too important to rush. Rather, we are taking a careful and thoughtful approach and including seniors and a wide representation of faculty and staff in our planning. As parents and educators, we share in the seniors' disappointment and grief over the loss of these last few weeks together. I know families are sad, frustrated, and unsure of how to move forward; we are all, essentially, trying to "stick the landing" in a new dance we've never practiced. It is important that we are patient with each other and come together as a community to support our seniors. We all love them and care deeply about the rites of passage that bring closure to this chapter.

While we are still very much in the planning stage, I would like to update you on where we are in the process regarding senior celebrations. We are

planning for the following:

Mid-August Commencement: We are tentatively scheduling our graduation ceremony for a mid-August date. (We will release the date as soon as it is officially approved.) We know how important a traditional ceremony is to our senior families and are in communication with seniors about their specific priorities and wishes. While this event is subject to the State of CT social distancing guidelines at that time, our intention is to host either a traditional graduation ceremony or some variation on the traditional ceremony to the extent the State allows. If we are unable to hold a graduation ceremony in August, we will hold a virtual graduation ceremony instead. Please note that this would be our last resort, but it would be important to give our seniors some sense of closure before they all move on to their next endeavors.

Senior Prom: We have scheduled a NEW date for senior prom in August at St. Clement's Castle. We are cautiously optimistic that we will be able to preserve this important event for our students. If we are unable to host the event at that time, due to social distancing or other restrictions, the money for prom will be refunded to the students/parents who have paid class dues.

Scholarship Night: We will be featuring our senior

scholarship winners through a recorded video production which will be aired on HKTV and posted on our website for seniors and families to enjoy at their leisure. Award presentations will be made by community groups, individual benefactors, and school administration and include the senior photo of each award recipient. This presentation will also include celebration of the top 10 students from the Class of 2020.

Project Graduation: Our Project Graduation committee is working to host a celebration for students the night of graduation. We are so grateful for this wonderful group who are working tirelessly in this entirely unfamiliar landscape to provide a safe party for our graduates. More information to follow.

HKHS has purchased personalized lawn signs for each graduating senior that will be incorporated into our June 15th celebration. They will then be gifted to the seniors and their families by the school. These are not the same as the Project Graduation lawn signs which are sold each year as a fundraiser. We encourage you to still purchase the Project Graduation signs, as they are very different from the school signs and create a unified celebratory display throughout our community.

I hope that you and your loved ones are healthy and safe. Let us count our blessings and get through this together.

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Seeing Red-

We are getting to that time of year when the red eyes are out! When associated with sneezing or discharges, it usually something that is a momentary attack of allergies or a dip in the not fully chlorinated swimming pool, a quick trip to the doctor is in order. But, because this symptom can be severe it takes a doctor to make that differential diagnosis. Many of the most serious occurrences of red eye do not have a discharge, and typically the presence of a discharge is more an indication of conjunctivitis, which is not life threatening.

Some serious Red Eye Conditions-

- Corneal Ulcers- most commonly occurs in patients who sleep overnight with their contact lenses, but not necessarily.
 Patients present with blurred vision, pain, and sensitivity to light
- 2) Herpetic Eye- This occurs mainly in patients with a history of cold sores, lid vesicles, or in patients on immunosuppressant therapy. The doctor will inquire as to presence of symptoms prior to red eye forming, such as pain, numbness or tingling of the eye.
- 3) Acute Angle Closure- This is a very severe condition that results in very high intra-ocular pressure, which has potential to threaten vision. You might notice that eye feels hard when pressing against it with lid closed.

So by now, you should have made the mental note. If you get red eye-good opportunity to see the doctor, but remember the symptoms.

"We are super excited to be able to provide these bags to area families and their young children," said



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Living Wills Versus Do-Not-Resuscitate Orders

A Living Will is a document intended to convey a patient's preferences regarding end-of-life healthcare decisions when the patient cannot express them personally to a healthcare provider. A Living Will, often in conjunction with an appointment of Health Care Representative taking effect upon the patient's incapacity, directs healthcare providers about the types of medical care the patient wishes to have provided or to forgo at the end of life, consistent with the patient's values and autonomy.

A do-not-resuscitate (DNR) order is an order issued by an authorized medical practitioner that directs clinicians not to provide cardiopulmonary resuscitation in the event of cardiac or respiratory arrest. A DNR order, by itself, may not address the withdrawal/withholding of any medical care other

The COVID-19 crisis has revealed that healthcare providers, as well as patients and families, may not understand the differences between Living Wills and DNR orders. Misinterpretation of Living Wills and DNR orders may inadvertently result in the provision of unwanted care or the withdrawal or withholding of otherwise appropriate interventions. Accurate interpretation and implementation of these documents, in addition to effective planning and communication, are essential to ensure that a patient's end-of-life preferences for medical care are honored.

A patient's choice in selecting a Health Care Representative (usually a close family member) is also very important. In addition to being familiar with the patient's health care preferences, the Representative needs to be able to process often complex medical information in stressful situations, and help build consensus within the family regarding medical treatment.

Does your child stutter?

Parents eagerly anticipate the moment when their child first begins to talk. But for some parents, it is a time of anxiety because their child struggles to get words out. As many as five percent of preschool children nationwide have repetitions and prolongations of sounds severe enough to be of concern to their parents.

The DVD in English and Spanish, Stuttering and Your Child: Help for Parents, helps parents detect stuttering and take action toward helping their child and is available at most public libraries. Some libraries have an older video format.

Produced by the 73 year-old nonprofit Stuttering Foundation, the film describes what kinds of stuttering young children may exhibit, how parents can help at home, and the role of a speech pathologist in evaluating and treating children who stutter.

"Stuttering typically begins between the ages of two and five," says Barry Guitar, Ph.D., professor and chair of Communication Sciences at the University of Vermont in Burlington. "It may begin gradually or suddenly, and many of these children outgrow their disfluencies naturally. However, if a child continues to stutter for several months, or appears to be frustrated by it, parents should seek assistance."

Guitar appears in the DVD with other nationally recognized experts in stuttering: Peter Ramig, Ph.D., of the University of Colorado at Boulder, Diane Hill, M.A., of Northwestern University, Patricia Zebrowski, Ph.D., of the University of Iowa, and Kristin Chmela, M.A., also of Northwestern University.

These experts address common concerns that parents have about their child, such as how to help the child at home and whether to seek the advice of a speech pathologist. Strategies parents can use to help reduce stuttering are given throughout the DVD and include reducing the number of questions they ask the child, focusing on taking turns during conversations, and making time to read or talk with the child in a relaxed manner.

"Parents are relieved to discover that they are not alone and that other parents share their concerns," says speech pathologist Kristin Chmela. "Stuttering remains a mystery to most people," notes Jane Fraser, president of the Stuttering Foundation. "Watching a young child struggle to speak can be devastating. This DVD is designed to reassure parents and families that many preschoolers stutter, that they can be helped, and how parents can play a vital role in this process."

7 Tips for talking with your child:

Speak with your child in an unhurried way, pausing frequently.

Reduce the number of questions you ask your child.

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Are drive-in theaters making a comeback?

A chemical company executive named Richard Holingshead opened the first-ever drive-in theater in America 87 years ago this year in Camden, NJ, during the Great Depression. Within 10 years, hundreds of drive-ins opened across the country, particularly after the most vexing problem — that of an adequate sound system — was solved by RCA in 1941. RCA had the brilliant idea of setting up individual speakers mounted on posts to provide adequate and timely sound for each car. As long as patrons remembered to unhook the speaker from their car before driving off, there were few problems and drive-ins flourished.

The new form of entertainment, however, was not without other problems. Religious groups complained that drive-ins were immoral because the privacy of being in a locked car or van in the dark provided ample opportunity for sexual encounters; thus, drive-ins came to be known as "passion pits." Another issue centered around the underage drinking of liquor, as it was easy to conceal alcoholic beverages in the trunks of vehicles. It was also possible for people — especially teenagers — to smuggle in their friends in the trunk!

Weather was another problem, particularly in Connecticut and other New England states where evening thunderstorms often arose. Daylight-saving time was also an issue, as movies sometimes couldn't begin until 9:30 at the peak of summer. Despite these drawbacks, drive-in theaters experienced explosive growth during the postwar period.

To lure patrons to the theaters before dark, theater managers introduced a number of gimmicks such as playgrounds for kids and live music concerts before the show. The largest drive-in theater in Connecticut, the Meadows Drive-In in Hartford, for example, actually had motorized rides for kids in their playground. The Meadows



claimed to be the largest drive-in in the world! The facility, opened in 1955, covered 32 acres, could hold over 2,500 cars and had 6 concession stands. The space is now known as the Comcast Theater (formerly the Meadows Music Theater) and claims to be the country's largest open-air music venue with a capacity of over 30,000 people. The Meadows Drive-In was also the first outdoor theater to show professional boxing matches live. It closed in 1975.

Not far from the Meadows was the Hartford Drive-In on the Berlin Turnpike and the East Windsor Drive-In on Route 5. The East Hartford Drive-In was also located on Route 5. Southington and Middletown also had long-lasting drive-in theaters. In fact Southington is one of the 3 drive-ins left in Connecticut. The Southington theater re-opened in 2010 with help from the town. It is located at 935 Waterbury-Meriden Road in the Plantsville section of town.

Another survivor is the Mansfield Drive-In, located in Mansfield, CT at the intersection of Routes 31 and 32. The Mansfield theater doubles as a giant flea market on weekend days, a strategy that has helped it and other drive-ins to survive. The largest current drive-in in the world, the Fort Lauder-

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dale Swap Shop, also doubles as the single-largest outdoor flea market in the world.

The third Connecticut drive-in still operating is located in Barkhamsted and is called the Pleasant Valley Drive-In. Pleasant Valley has been in the news lately, as a movie industry technological changeover to a digital projector system has endangered its existence. Beginning in 2014, the movie industry will no longer make movies available in a 35 mm film format. The problem is the

cost of the new projection system, estimated by some reports to be in the \$80,000 range—a steep price for a seasonal momand-pop business. Incidentally, the old speaker-on-a-pole system at Pleasant Valley has been replaced with the more technologically savvy FM radio speaker. Simply tune your car radio to 87.9 FM and listen to the show.

In 1965, drive-ins accounted for over 25% of the movie screens in the United States. Now they constitute just over 1%. A number of factors over the years have conspired to put the drive-in theater business into decline. Among the most significant factors is the price of real estate. Often, strategically located drive-ins became more valuable as real estate for other purposes. The Hartford Drive-

In on the Berlin Turnpike, for example, is a great location for the condominiums that now are located there.

Advances in home entertainment options for movies such as the VCR and DVD plus huge projection screen TVs have also contributed to the demise of the drive-in; nevertheless, there are many people alive today with happy memories of attending many a drive-in movie during their teenage years in the 1950s and 1960s.

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
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
