

It was a beautiful day in Haddam on Monday, May 27, 2019. Veterans, Haddam Volunteer Fire Company & Auxiliary, the Haddam Killingworth High School band, Scouts, Little League, and other sports organizations all marched down Route 81 through Higganum Center to the Higganum Green to pay tribute to Haddam's lost heroes.

After the parade, Rick Annino led the ceremony in front of Haddam's Veteran's Memorial. Rev. Madsen-Bibeau of the Haddam & Higganum Congregational Churches led the crowd in a prayer at the beginning of the ceremony, Julia Favalora, the 8th grade winner of the annual Memorial Day essay writing contest, read her essay, "The Cost of Freedom," and Steve Abbatello, Higganum resident and Navy & Air Force veteran, read his speech. Steve joined the US Navy in 1997 where he served on four aircraft carriers. He then joined the US Air Force Reserves in 2006. He has had six combat deployments overseas, with 22 years of service (and counting). At the end of the ceremony, there was a 21 gun salute, the laying of wreaths, and Taps, played by two members of the HKHS band. It is always moving when they read the list of those we have lost in the various wars around the world. They also read off the names of the veterans who passed away since last Memorial Day. Eversource replaces wood transmission structures in area

Eversource is replacing existing wood transmission structures in Haddam, Deep River, Chester, Essex, and Old Saybrook. "Maintaining the infrastructure that supports electric lines is one of the many ways Eversource ensures the safe, secure transmission of electricity throughout the region," says Brian Ragozzine, of Eversource.

Crews from Heritage Consultants LLC, JHD, BluRoc, and PAR will be working in our area. In case the project involves work on your property, here is

important information about how they will be working in your neighborhood:

The work will not interrupt electric service to your

All people working on this project carry identification. Eversource contractors will occasionally be in your neighborhood to tell you what to expect. They may leave an informational doorhanger at your home or knock on your door to talk to you about the project work.

Construction will be taking place within the existing right of way (transmission corridor) in Haddam, Deep River, Chester, Essex, and Old Saybrook.

The hours for construction are 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. Monday through Sunday.

Because construction vehicles and equipment must be able to access each transmission structure, Eversource may be building or enhancing gravel roads to provide access to those structures. They may also install level work pads to create a stable work area for equipment. Eversource uses timber mats to protect environmentally sensitive areas, as well as soil erosion and sedimentation controls such as silt fences and straw bales to protect areas. When required, drilling activities usually take place for a few days at each location where structures are being replaced. Depending on soil conditions, the drilling may last longer. At the end of the work day, any open foundation holes will be safely covered and secured. Once Eversource completes the foundation installation, they will assemble and install the new steel structures, which are set into position by cranes and/or bucket trucks. The existing structures will be taken apart and removed from the site, and Eversource will recycle or properly dispose of all material removed from the site.

Eversource expects all work to be complete by the Fall of 2019. In late Fall, crews from Creative Surveying will be working to conduct drone inspections of all existing transmission structures and wire in this right-of-way.

This is all "part of our everyday effort to deliver reliable energy to our customers and communities," says Ragozzine. "Eversource is committed to being a good neighbor and doing our work with respect for you and your property."

Higganum Landing now on registry of historic places

The Higganum Landing District was an important New England shipbuilding community between 1752 and 1865. The subtle bend of the Connecticut River at this location created and still creates a natural harbor which was once a center for shipbuilding, trade, and other related activities. Over 150 vessels were built at the Landing and were used in river and coastal trade, as well as international voyages. Ships traveled to the West Indies, Europe, South America, China and participated in the economic growth of the area and nation. A number of

these ships were used as warships and played a role in the country's fight for independence. Following construction of the railroad, Higganum's industrial center shifted inland and shipbuilding declined.

The district is architecturally significant because of the buildings constructed during the late 1700s and early-mid 1800s. The period of architectural significance extends from 1768, or the construction date of the earliest house in the district, through 1870, or the date of the establishment of the first railroad. This period saw the greatest amount of homes built at the Landing. "The district's architecture reflects the wave of prosperity during the late eighteenth through mid -nineteenth centuries" says Lisa Malloy, Director of the Haddam Historical Society.

Current residents of Higganum Landing, together with the Haddam Historical Society thought this enclave deserved special recognition because of its historical and architectural significance. So, they worked closely with the Connecticut State Preservation Office to complete the National Register Nomination. The Higganum Landing National Register District stands as a community that developed as a direct result of the shipbuilding and shipping industries along the Connecticut River. The district's architecture reflects the wave of prosperity which began during the late nineteenth century.

The National Register is the Federal Government's official list of the Nation's historic places. The list contains significant sites or places that tell the story of American life. This designation recognizes the significance of Higganum Landing in American history because of its architecture, history, and integrity of location. The district is also associated with events that have made a significant contribution

to the broad patterns of our history, including the American Revolution and the beginnings of international trade. It has now earned the honorific title to the satisfaction of residents and the Haddam Historical Society.

There are two other National Register Districts in Haddam, Conn. They are the Haddam Center Historic District and Camp Bethel Historic District. The only non-district or isolate landmark in Haddam

is the Hazelton-Hayden House on Hayden Hill Road.

The National Register Nomination is an honorific designation and encourages the current owners to continue thoughtful stewardship of the landmark. Historic building owners may donate historic artifacts and qualify for state or federal historic rehabilitation tax credits. They can also receive maintenance assistance and purchase plaques that identify the building's significance. There are no restrictions on a property listed on the National Register, but listing does provide protection from unreasonable

destruction and the like. If you know of or live in a place that you think may qualify for such a designation, listed below are the criteria for listing on the National Register of Historic Places.

Criteria for listing on the National **Register of Historic Places:**

The quality of significance in American history, architecture, archeology, engineering, and culture is present in districts, sites, buildings, structures, and objects that possess integrity of location, design, setting, materials, workmanship, feeling, and association, and:

that are associated with events that have made a significant contribution to the broad patterns of our

that are associated with the lives of persons significant in our past; or

that embody the distinctive characteristics of a type, period, or method of construction, or that represent the work of a master, or that possess high artistic values, or that represent a significant distinguishable entity whose components may lack individual distinc-

that have yielded, or may be likely to yield, information important in prehistory or history.

Properties that are less than 50 years of age, or moved or reconstructed buildings are generally not eligible for National Register listing unless exceptional significance can be shown.

Haddam WWI Veteran: Harry Severen Nilsen

Harry Severen Nilsen was born May 5, 1890 in Manhattan, on East 22nd Street; two years later he was joined by a sister Ellen Emelia. At about 10 years old he was with his step dad, Otto Nilsen, in Greenpoint, N.Y. This was an area where a lot of Scandia's settled, as well as those involved in seafaring activities. At age 22 we find Harry in Hartford, CT. Otto liked CT also, so he bought a farm in Haddam Neck. That farm would later be Harry's homestead when he returned from the war and married Ruth Dreilick in 1920.

On June 5, 1917, shortly after World War I broke out, he "joined up to go over there" with many of his Hartford buddies. Initially he was part of the Army's 309th Field Artillery, Battery A in New York City, and stationed there through January 29, 1918. Then Corporal Nilsen was shipped overseas to became part of the American Expeditionary Forces / Occupation Forces, that were stationed on the coast at Verdun, France. He was then in the Ordinance Division repairing trucks, tractors and the like, and remained there from July 9, 1918 through March 31, 1919. The war ended in Germany with the signing of the Armistice on November 11, 1918.

When his discharge was imminent, he requested a six month extension to visit the Rhineland and hopefully to locate his friend Nils who was with the Army's 3rd Division there. He managed to get a ride as far as Koblez, Germany and then made out on foot for the last 20 miles to Mayes (Mainz), Germany. Near the end of his journey, he was offered a lift in the sidecar of a motorcycle. It was a wild ride because the driver was in a hurry, and the roads were in poor shape. This forced Harry to keep his eyes closed most of the way to shield them from the wind. He had little

trouble finding Nils and spent some time with him, including a trip to the Neuschwanstein Castle in Bavaria. There you were allowed to tour that castle, but first had to remove your shoes. For those who don't recognize this castle by name, it was featured in the movie "Chitty Chitty Bang Bang." Toward the end of his extension he returned to his Division in France and was shortly shipped home in September of 1919.

For the second consecutive year, five Haddam-Killingworth High School seniors have been named recipients of Killingworth Ambulance Association scholarships.

EMILY JENNINGS - Emily will attend Rivier University, where the second largest major is nursing. And that's precisely what she intends to pursue. A member of the Haddam-Killingworth volleyball team, she says that during her high-school career she recognized the importance of obtaining a health-care degree in college. And so she will pursue a Bachelor's of Nursing,

BRIANNA LIVINGSTON - Brianna plans on major-

MIKAYLA NUHN - Mikayla also accumulated over 300 hours of community service and plans to major in nursing at Endicott College. That should come as no surprise to anyone who knows her. Hospitalized as a child, Mikayla remembers how patient and compassionate nurses were - saying that they "inspired me not only to go into nursing later in life ... but to aspire to be just like them." Mikayla wants to have the same impact on children, mostly because she said she knows — first-hand — what they're experiencing.

Bites & Stings- A Summertime Thing

You are going out to have a great time, or playing in the garden, when suddenly you get stung by a bee or wasp. The local reaction you can expect is pain immediately after being stung with the area swelling to 2 1/2 to 3 inch circumference. The area will become warm and itchy, and some people become nauseous

Further reactions really determine the course of treatment. Fatal reactions can occur after the first bite, but it is more likely that severe reactions occur after the person has been stung previously with a milder reaction. The shorter the interval between being stung, the more likely a severe reaction can take place. Rapid onset of symptoms is the rule–50% of the deaths due to bee/wasp sting occur within 30 minutes of the sting, and 75% occur within 4 hours.

Fire Ant Bites are becoming an increasingly important health concern in the United States. Skin lesions caused by fire ant bites cause two small hemorrhagic punctures, initially causing a welt. Then, in 8-10 hours, a pustule develops on top of the red, hot, inflamed base. The pustule can last for several days, but will eventually rupture, crust up, and then form a skin scar. Oral antihistamines and topical steroids are recommended in most patients with multiple bites. Larger bite areas may require prescription oral steroids. Please see your doctor if the reactions to these bites become too severe or infected.

to search for an end. The point at which no other white stone lies; where an open field begins. But I cannot seem to find it. The names of soldiers engrave each stone. Not a single man or woman here forgotten, each one loved by more than they would have imagined. I wish they could see what their sacrifice has done, the nation they have helped to build. But now they rest in the hands of God. Memorial Day is a day of honoring the fallen soldiers who granted our country freedom. A day to remember our brothers and sisters who no longer stand beside us. To them the freedom of their country was worth risking it all.

On our recent visit to Washington D.C, my peers and I had the chance to visit the Korean War memorial. There, four words engraved in dark grey granite, spoke out to me. "Freedom is not free." In America, many of us overlook the word freedom. We don't understand the number of lives it cost, or the amount of bravery it took to attain it. Those in service believed the power to act, write, or speak without hindrance was worth sacrificing everything. We believe we are touched only by the loss of those we have kept close, when really, each and every fallen soldier has impacted us greatly. To me, Memorial Day is a day of honoring these brave souls who risked their lives to protect our freedom. We owe it to them to take time out of our busy, self-absorbed lives, to stop and realize who gave us all these privileges we get to enjoy. It is the least we can give back to those who deserve so much more."

The cost of freedom is something we should never overlook. It was protected by brave hearts who understood they would sacrifice all they had for you and me. Memorial Day is a day in which Americans come together to respect

those who fought for our freedom; those who lost their lives in doing so. Whether we knew them personally or not, they influenced our lives greatly. The greatest dishonor we could give to these brave souls would be to not remember. The freedom we have been granted was nev-

Steve Abbatello's speech

"Thank you for coming out to honor and remember this Memorial Day. My name is Steve Abbatello and I live right around the corner from here. I'd like to share with you Memorial Day through my eyes. Memorial Day used to mean just another day off to me when I was a kid. I knew it was related to military service somehow but that was about it. From a young age, I had an interest in military history. As I got older, I felt obligated to serve and joined the world's greatest Navy at the age of 17. Throughout boot camp, I learned more and more about military history. Now I'm starting to understand it from a different perspective. It starts to make more sense to me operationally.

Most of you may not be aware but in the latter half of the '90s, things were getting heated with Iraq and we actually had regular engagements with them during Operations Southern and Northern Watch. This would be my first foray into combat. It was exciting and from an operational standpoint, easy, as it surprisingly went as planned the majority of the time. Then the Fall of 2001 came and everything changed. Suddenly, I gained a much deeper understanding for the value of life. I started to see that combat does not always go the way I had experienced it previously in the '90s. I started to see various units take large losses. It had hit me that these are units no different from my own, and these are regular guys no different than myself. I'm a regular person, no

different from any of you here today. As I mentioned earlier, I live right around the corner from here.

So a few years later, I've left the Navy to join the Air Force. Now we've been at war for years with no signs of slowing down. Every day for years and years, I'm losing brothers and sisters to the ugliest actions man is capable of producing. Eventually, I find myself back in the desert yet again enduring miserable conditions. Wishing I was back in Higganum standing around a bonfire having a beer with the people I care about. Now I'm realizing that all of these wars prior to my generation were being fought by guys just like me. Guys that lived right around the corner from here. Guys who endured miserable conditions, who wished they were home

with the people they care about.

To the men and women who serve this country, there is no better feeling than being home with our loved ones. There is no greater honor than to serve and protect the sanctity of our homeland and the safety of our loved ones. Sadly, so many of our brothers and sisters have

not and will not be afforded the simple act of returning home to their friends and families. It is for this reason that we gather here today to honor them. To pay tribute to the men and women who are not just footnotes in history. These are regular folks just like you and I who lived around the corner. These are people who gave everything to ensure you and I could be free. Free to come togeth*er like we have here today.*

This is why Memorial Day is so important to me. So please remember them with me. Honor them with me. And know that you can sleep soundly in your beds because rough men stand ready in the night to visit violence on those who would do you harm. May you go in peace. Thank you."
