RSD #17 shuts down indefinitely as precaution

This notice was sent to parents of students in Regional School District #17 by Dr.H Hageman, the Superintendent of Schools.

Friday, March 13, 2020

Dear RSD17 Community,

I am writing to inform you that all RSD17 Schools will be closed until further notice for an indefinite period beginning tomorrow, Saturday, March 14th. There will be no afterschool activities or late buses today. All students will go home at dismissal time. The exception for this, today, is that HK Park & Rec aftercare at BES and KES will remain in place this afternoon. All school buildings will be closed for community use until further notice as of 6:00 p.m. today.

Upon the advice of our local health departments and in coordination with town leaders and emergency medical response providers, school superintendents in southeastern Connecticut have come together to make a regional decision to put the health of our communities (both our school community and the community at large) at the center of our decision to close schools. We have been advised that the implementation of social distancing measures is a critical intervention to reduce the spread communicable disease outbreaks. Although we are not aware of confirmed cases of COVID-19 at this time in the Haddam-Killingworth community, we felt compelled to make this decision to prevent the spread of illness among our students, staff, and our communities.

You should be prepared for this school closure to be for a minimum of two weeks, but it could be for longer, up to four weeks or more. The school days lost due to this closure will most likely need to be made up through June 30th (not beyond June 30th). The last of day of school in RSD17 *Continued on page H4*

Get ready for maple syrup time in Haddam and Killingworth!

Have you seen the buckets on the maple trees as you traverse Haddam and Killingworth roads? It's maple syrup time in New England. Who doesn't love a little maple syrup on their pancakes or waffles all year round? When my children were small, they both had many food intolerances. One couldn't have cane sugar, and one couldn't have beet sugar. What were we left with? Maple sugar. And it was delicious. We used maple cream in cookies or spread on toast, maple sugar crystals in baking, and maple syrup in our baked beans and other recipes. This time of year was great because there were maple festivals that had maple syrup on snow (which is lacking this year), maple cotton candy, and other once a year treats. My kids loved going to sugar shacks in the area to watch the syrup being made.

Maple syrup begins as sap in a maple tree. It runs in the early spring when temperatures rise into the 40s during the day, but cool off into the 20s at night, which usually happens at the end of February. The climate in New England is perfect for maple syrup, but the season only lasts about a month. Trees are tapped, which is usu-

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collect their sap in a bucket, others collect theirs in special tubes that flow to a holding tank. You need 35-50 gallons of sap to make ONE gallon of maple syrup. Then you need to take all of that sap that you've collected, and bring it to the sugar house, where it's poured into an evaporator, where the water is boiled off, and the sap is concentrated into maple syrup. As the water is boiled off and the sugar becomes more concentrated, it moves to the front of the evaporator, where it is drawn off and filtered. Once filtered, it is put into bottles or other containers.

All of the syrup is equally sweet, however the "grades" of syrup denote color and taste, and the grading was changed in 2015. We now have:

Grade A – Golden Color and Delicate Taste (the lightest of grades, and recommended for drizzling over waffles, pancakes, or ice cream)

Grade A – Amber Color and Rich Flavor (a little more flavorful, and works well for cooking and baking)

Grade A - Dark Color and Robust Flavor (stronger in flavor and works well for recipes that require a heavy maple flavor)

Grade A – Very Dark and Strong Flavor (best used as a substitute for molasses)

Maple Cream is made by heating the syrup to 235F, then put into an ice bath to rapidly drop the temperature to 65F, according to Chelsea Cleveland. Then you just mix and mix until you get cream. "You can use it for a spread on toast, apple dip, bake with, make frosting with. It's delicious!" said Chelsea Cleveland.

There are even health benefits to using maple syrup:

Its glycemic index is 54, lower than table sugar or honey.

Maple syrup contains 22% of the daily allowance for Manganese

Maple syrup contains 24 antioxidants that help protect against many health conditions.

Maple Weekend in CT is March 21-22, 2020 according to the ctvisit.com website. It says to visit sugar shacks all over the state.

Local farms:

Parmelee Farm Sugar Shack (Killingworth) - They are open on weekends for syrup sales and tours from 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. And weekdays from 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. for boiling and collecting. They are taking part in

Maple Weekend.

Higganum Cover Sugarbush (Haddam) - Dale and his son Jeremy DeCarli make their syrup in their sugar shack. Most weekends during the season, they are in the shack boiling on weekends, and people are welcome. Their syrup can be found at Fork in the Road and Red Barn Feed Store. They can be reached at higganumcovesugarbush@ gmail.com.

Cleve's Giants Sugar Shack (Higganum) – They began making syrup about three years ago for themselves and a few friends, but as time passed, and word of mouth more and more people are wanting to try their syrup. They are not participating officially this year in Maple Weekend, however, they do welcome visitors at their sugar shack any time. To purchase their maple syrup or maple cream, you can contact the Clevelands at clevesgiants@gmail.com.

Sunnycrest Farm (Killingworth) -They have been making maple syrup since about 1996, with a few years break. This year they are not selling to the public due to low production. But next year they should have up to 200 taps.

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Summary of February BOE Meetings

School Educational Activities:

Cougar Pride- Eighth grader Jonah Keithan-Resnick was recognized as the first RSD17 student to win the Patriot's Pen Competition in Connecticut. As the Connecticut representative, Jonah's essay "What Makes America Great" will compete against students from each state for the national prize. Recognition was also given to the Haddam-Killingworth High School Girls Cross Country Team for winning the Class SS State Championship. The Board congratulated teammates Meara Bodak, Julia Callis, Lauren D'Amico, Ava DiMatteo, Isabel Berardino, Ali Twachtman and Brianna Minervino for their achievement.

Community Mentoring Program- Principals at the Elementary Schools approved a partnership with HK Youth and Family Services for a new School-Based Mentoring Program. The program would run during the school day and details will follow on how community members can apply to become a mentor.

Effective School Solutions- In a Special Meeting, the Board addressed the increase in Special Education Outplacements, the related costs, reasons, and outlook for RSD17. This elevation in Emotional and Behavioral Disorders is consistent in school districts across the state. In response to the marked increase, Effective School Solutions (ESS) was proposed by

Administration as an effective and less expensive alternative that provides clinical services inside our schools instead of sending identified students to expensive specialized schools outside of our District. The Board gave consent to contracting with ESS beginning in March to implement at our High School and Middle School.

Math Program- The Superintendent introduced, and the Board discussed, the merits of a new math text and computer program with assessments, problem solving and testing for Kindergarten through 8th grade. The Board will consider and vote on its adoption at the next regular meeting of the Board.

Capital Improvements:

KES Roof - The Board approved immediate replacement on a section of the roof at KES, directly over the kitchen, after a failure caused damage inside the building. Construction was completed over Presidents' Day weekend and will be paid entirely through the Capital Improvement Fund.

HKHS Field House Project: The Board reviewed and approved final recommendations from the Public Building Committee on renovations to the Field House. Remediation and replacement of the Field House floor will commence in late April. Additionally the gym will be updated with new backboards, gym dividers, a center lift practice cage, paint and window tinting. Improvements will also be made

to existing lighting, speakers, emergency evacuation systems and the bleachers. The approved project will cost just over \$1 million. State reimbursements are expected and the remainder will be paid through the Capital Fund. Administration has plans in place for activities that will be displaced due to the construction, such as the Project Graduation Celebration which will be moved to HKI/MS.

Other Business:

Budget Freeze- Due to more than expected outplacements, the Special Education Tuition line is significantly over budget. As a result, the Superintendent has frozen all but critical expenditures in an effort to offset the costs. The BoE Finance Committee and the Superintendent continue to monitor the situation and are cautiously optimistic that we will come in just under budget for the year.

Board Resignation- Haddam Board of Education Member Gerry Mathews submitted his resignation and a grateful Board thanked him for his service. The Town of Haddam will hold a town meeting to replace Gerry's position for the remainder of the term.

Red Yeast Rice- A Homeopathic Answer to Your Elevated Cholesterol

Red yeast rice, also known as Went Yeast, has been used for centuries in China, as a food and a medicine. It is made by fermenting a type of yeast called Monascus Purpureus over red rice. Chinese medicine has used red yeast rice to lower cholesterol, improve digestion, and blood circulation.

Red Yeast Rice is certainly a consideration, if you cannot tolerate the statins, or with your doctor's input, you choose to start with a homeopathic option.

I'll never forget the look on the staff's faces when a child was lost or the screams from the parents. I cannot imagine their pain." She is very grateful that her story turned out okay. "When my son was 20 months old, he was finally cleared from all of his health issues and has no complications today. To celebrate his victory, I wanted to do something to give back to help families with children who have life threatening diseases. This is why I am choosing to raise money for St. Jude Children's Research Hospital."

Parmelee Farm's 2020 truncated Maple Syrup Season

Blame it on climate change, global warming or just plain bad luck, but a mild winter in Killingworth has claimed its first victim.

No, the house isn't going anywhere. But a cache of machinery to boil, process and bottle maple syrup is. Volunteers at the Farm this week started pulling taps and shutting down the operation, with their final sale this weekend. That's not only earlier than last year when the Sugar House began selling maple syrup; it's two weeks earlier.

In 2019 volunteers collected and processed sap from the Farm's sugar maple trees into late March, with the last batch bottled on March 25. Twelve months later, however, they shut down the second week of the month for a reason all too obvious to Killingworth residents.

"Unusually warm weather for this time of year," said Tim Gannon, chairman of the Parmelee Farm committee.

Rewind the videotape to 2019, and you'll find nearly a foot of snow on March 4. Now fast-forward to this year, and there wasn't a foot of snow the entire winter. In fact, the temperature last Sunday ranged in the mid-50s before soaring into the mid-60s the following afternoon. Worse, at no time this week are temperatures expected to drop below freezing.

While that's good for hikers and dog walkers

who frequent the 132-acre Parmelee Farm, it's not for denizens of the Sugar House. The combination of warm days and nights slows the flow of sap and signals the end of maple syrup season, with empty-to-near empty white buckets the evidence. And they are everywhere at Parmelee Farm.

So is Gannon, who oversees the army of volunteers who process the sap and produce the syrup. He conceived the idea of starting a Sugar House over two years ago, then approached Parmelee problem-solver John Byrne ("I present the problem," said Gannon, "and he solves it") about constructing it. When Byrne said the building could be done at minimal cost, the project

was launched. Funding was sought through public contributions, grants were secured, construction services were donated and labor was performed by –

who else? - volunteers.

Construction began in early July, 2018. It was completed on Aug. 24, just seven weeks later.

"One of our missions at Parmelee Farm is educa-

tion and agriculture," said Gannon, a former teacher. "(Producing syrup) is something that was done here at one point by farmers, and we just figured it would be natural fit."

He was right. In its first year of operation, the Sugar House's 110 taps yielded 41.8 gallons of syrup, and every bottle was sold. That provoked Gannon to raise the bar in 2020. Two-hundred taps were installed, nearly twice the number of 2019. A vacuum pump was introduced to connect 72 of the taps to the Sugar House through an extensive network of plastic tubes. There were more volunteers, with 20 regulars available to collect,

bottle and label the syrup. And there were more trees, tapped at remote loca-

tions in Killingworth and transported to Parmelee. The idea was to double production from 2019,

but that didn't happen. While Parmelee produced *Continued on page H12*

Apostles of the Sacred Heart of Jesus of Higganum

As a newbie in town (we came in 1970), whenever I travelled along Candlewood Hill Road, I was always curious about the beautiful estate there and would take a glimpse of it as I rounded the curve at the end of Brainard Hill. It's been years of taking glimpses as we all know that you should really keep your eyes on the road at that point. A few years ago it was opened to the Haddam Historical Society as part of a tour of the mills along Candlewood Hill Brook and then again last fall as one of the properties in their house tour.

The sign at the end of the driveway reads "Apostles of the Sacred Heart of Jesus." While we know that the place was once mill

No.2 of the D. and H. Scovil Company, I wondered about the transition from factory to a Catholic order of Sisters. And so, I sat down with Sr. Doretta D'Albero to learn a little more.

Sr. Doretta is an energetic lady who has a wealth of knowledge about the Scovil properties and a love of history. But first let's begin with asking who the Apostles of the Sacred Heart of Jesus are?

In 1861, Clelia Merloni (Clay-lee-a) was born in Italy into an extremely wealthy family and whose father expected his educated and gifted child to follow him into the world of business. Instead, through the religious values and love of God instilled in her by her grandmother and her step mother, she chose a life of devotion to God, the poor and the oppressed. In 1888, Sr. Clelia was "dressed in the religious habit." Soon after, she opened an orphanage for girls, unwed mothers and elderly women. In 1894, she founded an order dedicated to The Sacred Heart of Jesus.

When her father died, she inherited his estate intending to use it for the benefit of the unfortunate. However, a greedy, incompetent administrator squandered the funds. So began a period of humiliation, slander and suspicion.

When all the money was lost by 1899, Bishop Scalabrini helped the Order financially and they helped him by sending Sisters to Brazil and the US to help the Italian immigrants who were seeking a new life abroad. In 1902 six sisters arrived in Boston. But again, a series of misunderstandings drove the order to where? – New Haven, CT in 1906, Hamden, CT in 1948 and eventually Higganum.

In Higganum, the old Scovil Mill #2 sat quietly, no longer manufacturing hoes for southern plantations or ramrods for the Civil War. In the early thirties, Mr. and Mrs. Earl Benham, Broadway actors from New York, purchased the property of 50 acres which included two lakes, a dam and a waterfall surrounded by woodland. They called it Juniper Ridge. The Benhams gutted the interior of the far building and remodeled it for their country resort. Next to it, most of the second factory building was demolished by the Higganum fire department using high pressure water hoses. What was left of it became a garage. The Benhams owned the property for some 30 years, entertaining actors

and show business greats. Both Benhams (she was Christine Mangasarian) were Broadway musical actors during WWI and the twenties but Earl Benham also was a costume designer, a respected tailor to the stars and who wrote WWI ballads such as "Curly Locks" and "When." One can only imagine who their visitors might have been: George M. Cohan, Jerome Kern, Victor Herbert, or Ed Wynn?

In 1964, the Benhams sold the property to Mount Sacred Heart of Hamden, CT for the use of the Sisters of the Apostles of the Sacred Heart of Jesus, for \$78k. It was used by the order as a place of spiritual renewal. And so it still is. Now it is used as a spirituality center for religious organizations such as priests and religious congregations. One group has been coming on the first Sunday of the month for forty years.

The sisters live on the property, tending to the grounds and managing the events. They are associated as parishioners of Higganum's St. Peters Catholic Church, although Sr. Doretta teaches 7th grade catechism. Their calling, however, is their devotion to the values and ministries of their foundress, Mother Clelia. Sr. Dominic Joseph, for instance, is a pastoral associate at St. Patrick Church in East Hampton whose duties include visiting and bringing Communion to the homebound and convalescent homes. Sr. Jerilyn is a CT Department of Correction Religious Service Chaplain at the Hartford Correctional Center. Sr. Karen is the Faith Formation Director at St. Junipero Serra Church in South Windsor. Sr. Doretta works in her office on the property, occasionally taking time out to run the lawn tractor to

work on the grounds. She has a Master of Science in Liberal Arts with a concentration in Biology from Wesleyan University and is proficient in spoken and written Italian. Her current mission is translating documents related to Mother Clelia and the process of her beatification from Italian to English for all to share. In Sr. Doretta's words, she is "excited to know her more personally" through the documents, letters and testimonies she translating.

In November of 2018, Sr. Doretta traveled to Rome for the Beatification of Mother Clelia. The process of becoming a saint in the Catholic Church is not easy. It starts five years after the death of the person in the diocese in which the candidate was born or died. The bishop will then gather evidence as to the life of holiness and virtue of that candidate. If he is satisfied with his findings he petitions the Congregation of the Causes of Saints to begin its deliberation. If they are in agreement they will pass their recommendation on to the Pope. If the Pope finds that the candidate has led a "heroic life" in holiness prayer, and work, the Pope will bestow the title "Venerable." This means that the candidate is on the list and is waiting for a miracle attributed to their intercession. A miracle then shows that the person has the ability to intercede with God on another's behalf through prayer. The celebration at this point is called Beatification ("to make blessed") and the candidate is given the title "Blessed." It means that the candidate is truly in Heaven with God. The final step to sainthood requires a second miracle.

And, what was the miracle attributed to Mother Clelia? In 1951 a Brazilian doctor was at the edge of death with paralysis from Guillain-Barre syndrome. He had great difficulty breathing and swallowing. His wife was told he would not make it through the night. The wife sought out a Sister to ask for prayers. The Sister recommended prayers to say to Mother Clelia and gave her a relic (a thread from her clothing.) The relic was placed in a spoon of water to be given to the patient. While he had not been able to swallow, he managed to take a sip. Suddenly he was able to drink from a cup and then was given custard to eat. Within weeks, he was walking and never showed signs of the disease again.

Sr. Doretta will tell you that Blessed Mother Clelia was "pure in faith and hope, generous beyond words, and always sacrificing for sinners."

The sisters are good stewards of the Candlewood property, respecting its history when they repair and renovate. If this special place is opened for a public tour again, don't miss the opportunity to visit it. Until then be advised that it is private property. Just take a quick glimpse as you go by.

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more syrup than the previous year, it wasn't much more – with 56 gallons bottled before an early spring ended operations.

"Under normal circumstances," Gannon said, "if we had two more weeks – which is what we had last year – and if the weather cooperated from a freeze/ thaw standpoint, we would have done it. It's the type of thing where you're at the mercy of the weather."

Nevertheless, he and his volunteers -- some of whom worked all week -- consider the season a success, and it's easy to see why. The vacuum system saved on labor. More persons pitched in to help. Fifteen boys and girls from Haddam-Killingworth Middle School formed a Sugaring Club, working twice a week at the Sugar House. And local groups like the Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts and a photography club took weekend tours.

More to the point, the demand was as strong as it was a year ago. Eight-and-12 oz. bottles of syrup sold out four consecutive weekends ... including last weekend when the Farm limited customers to two bottles apiece. "Other than the weather," said Gannon, "we're pleased. We had more volunteers this year than we had last year. More new people signed up. The people who volunteered on a regular basis were here on a regular basis. And people who were willing to collect, as well as let us tap, made a big difference." That's the good news. The better is that as operations wound down this week, the Farm set aside bottled syrup for the state's first Maple Weekend, scheduled for March 21-22. But officials on Thursday canceled the event because of the coronavirus outbreak, so Gannon and Co. will make the last batch - a collection of 69 12-oz. and 48 8-oz. bottles - available for sale this weekend (10 a.m. - 4 a.m.)But that's it for the winter. The next time you'll see Parmelee Farm syrup marketed will be September at the annual Artisan Market. "I want to say thanks to all our volunteers who came out this year," Gannon said. "More people know the process now."
