Natalie Pontbriand received Honorable Mention All Shoreline Honorable Recognition







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



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
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November 13 Board of Selectmen meeting

The Haddam Board of Selectmen held its November meeting on Tuesday, Nov. 12 instead of Monday, Nov. 11 (Veterans Day). This was the final meeting under First Selectwoman Lizz Milardo's administration. Milardo did not seek re-election after having served two terms. Bob McGarry won the Nov. 5, 2019 municipal race for Haddam's new First Selectman. Kate Anderson and Sean Moriarty will serve on the Board. Larry Maggi and Melissa Schlag did not seek re-election for the selectmen seats.

First Selectwoman Milardo, Selectman Maggi, Assistant JoAnn Ricciardelli were present; Selectman Schlag was absent. The agenda was as follows:

Call Meeting to Order Pledge of Allegiance *Public Comment (Will be kept to a limit of three (3)* minutes per resident). Approval of Minutes (October 15, 2019)

Tax Refunds New Business

Award bid for Chipping of Brush & Wood Pile Public Comment (Will be kept to a limit of three (3) minutes per resident).

Adjournment

During the first public comment section, Clifford Potter of North Branford and a veteran who has been regularly attending Haddam BOS meetings, expressed how Haddam is a "great town here." He encouraged the townspeople to "work constructively" and not to "lose the beauty and culture you've got here. Do the best with what you've got." He concluded with "take care of your veterans."

Minutes from the Oct. 15 BOS meeting were approved. Tax refunds were approved - all Motor Vehicle - totaling \$777.15.

The low bid of \$13,150 was approved for the chipping of brush and wood pile near the Transfer

During the second and final public comments section, Chip Frey said "thank you for two great years" to Milardo and Maggi. Residents gathered gave a round of applause. One resident asked about cell phone towers. Milardo said that she last received an update about two weeks ago, and that "contracts are sitting on Verizon's desk," and that "we are just waiting." A question was asked about the Dublin Hill Bridge. Milardo said that the bridge work is "moving along," and "will be open to traffic in mid-Decem-

Lizz thanked "everyone for their support over the past four years" and hopes that the BOS continue to "move forward." She noted that a lot of "roads were done, bridges, infrastructure, water going to Tylerville, Bill Warner is a great planner...I feel very good as to where I am leaving you." She closed with how she is "in awe of how much people care. I made a lot of friendships...and it was time well spent."

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Bell's Palsy

Bell's Palsy is the most common cause of unilateral facial paralysis worldwide. It is characterized by sudden onset, usually affecting one-side of the face (67% of cases), resulting in facial

nerve paralysis, which resolves in 80-90% of the cases.

Patients with Diabetes have a higher risk of developing Bell's Palsy, and are more likely to have only partial recovery. At the time of diagnosis of Bell's Palsy, many find undiagnosed Diabetes. Bell's Palsy affects men and women almost equally, and it is more common in adults, and slightly higher incidence in people over 65 years of age.

Bilateral Palsy can occur, but does so only 23% of the time, and usually occurs along with Guillain-Barre syndrome and/or Lyme Disease, along with a few other diseases.

Facial spasms are rare, and more likely occur with people in their 50's or 60's, along with periods of stress and fatigue.

Early Symptoms include: Weakness of facial muscles, poor eyelid closure, aching of ear, alteration of taste, tingling of cheek and mouth, eye pain, and blurred vision.

Remember that it takes more than one of these symptoms to cause concern, but if you notice a few, see your doctor immediately!

Treatment includes: Oral Steroids are the first line of treatment in a patient greater than 16 years of age, if a doctor is seen within 72 hours of onset of symptoms. Anti-virals may be added based on the doctor's determination. You can also use topical eye drops or ointment during the day and evening to prevent córneal dryness.

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Getting to know your library: Conversation with the director

Located at 301 Route 81 in Killingworth, the Killingworth Library provides a variety of adult, adolescent, family, and children's literary resources, educational programming, and cultural arts events. As such, it serves as a dynamic hub for people to learn, gather and experience community together. We recently contacted Laurie West Prichard, Director of the library here in Killingworth, to speak more about the role the Killingworth Library plays in the lives of Killingworth (as well as surrounding area) residents and library patrons.

How did you come to call Killingworth Library your home?

Prichard: I was working as Assistant Director for the East Haddam Library System when I learned of the opening at Killingworth Library. The position seemed like a good fit, but before applying I decided to visit the library to meet the folks working there and take a look around. I walked out of the building saying to myself "this is the one – it's perfect". Almost 2 years later I still feel that way. Both the library and the Killingworth community are wonderful.

What is your background? Please provide a bit of biographical as well as professional information.

Prichard: I grew up in Clinton, Massachusetts and graduated with a BA from Clark University in Worcester before moving to Connecticut with my

husband Paul more than 30 years ago. Our daughters are both in college, the oldest is a senior at Eastern CT State University, and the younger is a junior at Bryant University in Rhode Island. I usually tell people that I took the long and winding road towards becoming a librarian. While I was with the East Haddam Library System for 7 years, prior to that I spent 25 years working for a large insurance company in Hartford in a variety of administrative and management roles. So, this is definitely my second career - even though it took a while, I feel that I found the work I was meant to do.

How do you see your role not only at the library but in the community?

Prichard: Killingworth Library has a unique history of both volunteer and community involvement, and I feel that it's essential to maintain those ties by promoting a friendly, welcoming, patron-first culture. We are here to serve the entire community, and my goal is to make sure that the community knows about the many services we offer, both onsite and online.

What are some of your favorite aspects of your job?

Prichard: I love meeting and assisting our patrons – it brightens my day when I know that I've helped someone. Then there's the people I work with - we have 22 wonderful volunteers who generously donate their time to staff our circulation desk, plus an involved and caring library

board. When you add in the staff, it's a pleasure to come to work.

What are some goals/objectives/vision(s) you have for the library?

Prichard: We've already made some significant changes in the last 18 months – our refreshed book sale area has transformed our lobby into a much more welcoming space, and in September we successfully migrated to the Bibliomation Consortium, which has greatly expanded both our online e-book and e-audio offerings and improved our interlibrary loan service to our patrons. Our website has also been redesigned and includes a new calendar where residents can sign up for programs themselves online. While some adjustments are still underway, many of our services have been moved right to the home page for easier access. We will be looking at ways of improving the flow of space in the children's room during 2020.

Any other thoughts to share with residents, patrons?

Prichard: I am working with our Killingworth Library Board as they develop a strategic plan for our future, and as part of that we will be reaching out to Killingworth residents for their input on what services they value most, as well as to identify any future changes they would like to see. Please keep an eye out for our Community Survey, which will be available both online and in paper in the very near future!

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Getting to know your library: Conversation with the director

Located at 920 Saybrook Road (Rt. 154) in Haddam, the Brainerd Memorial Library provides a variety of adult, adolescent, family, and children's literary resources, educational programming, and cultural arts events. As such, it serves as a dynamic hub for people to learn, gather and experience community together. We recently contacted Tom Piezzo, Director of the Brainerd Memorial Library here in Haddam, to speak more about the role BML plays in the lives of Haddam (as well as surrounding area) residents and library patrons.

How did you come to call Haddam Brainerd Memorial Library your home?

Piezzo: In 2016 I was fortunate to be interviewed for the position of library director, which led me to reflect on my professional priorities as I presented to the board of trustees. In Haddam I found a nearideal combination of rural and village, of an historic library with a progressive governing board and staff, a library which is part of an excellent consortium but retains its local identity. When I was offered the job I knew we had a firm foundation on which to serve today, and build for coming generations.

What is your biographical as well as professional background?

Piezzo: I have a degree in English and was for a short time a teacher on Long Island, but changed directions early on. In December 1993 I received my Masters in Library and Information Science, and started as a librarian in Queens, New York City. I eventually became the Branch Library Manager in a series of larger and busier libraries, until 2004 when I moved to Connecticut. I worked at home as a custom cabinetry and furniture design draftsman,

while also staying in the library field along the shoreline, until resuming an administrative role in Haddam. I am presently a member of the LION consortium Finance Committee, chair of the Valley-Shore Public Library Directors Roundtable, and am the Vice President/President-elect of the Connecticut Library Association.

How do you see your role not only at the library but in the community?

Piezzo: The library's role is to identify community needs, typically informational, cultural, social, and recreational, and then meet them with our resources in whatever formats and methods we can. In the library that means seeking to balance the work of our excellent staff, our supportive Friends group, and the active board of trustees. We also stay abreast of local and national trends and issues, assessing which ones could or should play out locally. Being a busy hub for the community, we offer many services available uniquely from our institution, and strive both to publicize our offerings, and also respond to requests. Sometimes that takes the form of support for area organizations and departments, other times, it means a new partnership. Most often it is simply being an open and accessible place where everyone can count on respect and inclusion regardless of their economic status, age, ethnicity, identity, beliefs or education.

What are some of your favorite aspects of your job?

Piezzo: Watching the myriad children attend programs: singing, reading, crafting, interacting. Seeing someone come for tech help with a troubled expression and leave confident and happy. Hearing "yes!" when a patron finds the perfect book. Seeing the seats fill at a concert — for free. As I say time

and again, I get to work where people come to learn, connect, pursue leisure and culture, and enjoy themselves. We measure our success by how much we give, not take. That's a pretty good gig.

What are some goals/objectives/vision(s) you have for the library?

Piezzo: I'd love to see our plans for renovating the library come to fruition in the next few years. We are very close to starting the first phase, which will create 17 new parking spaces, upgrade exterior lighting, improve the rest rooms, and importantly, make a truly accessible lower level entrance. But as the way libraries are used has changed drastically since our 1996 renovation, we need to make a more efficient apportionment of interior space by rethinking the main desk, installing small study rooms, restoring the original 1906 History Rooms, lowering the stacks, formalizing a dedicated teen and tween space, and re-working the children's library. Down the road, more hours of service would be a welcome bonus

Any other thoughts to share with residents, patrons?

Piezzo: Thanks are due to our patrons for embracing Brainerd Library, to the Town for its ongoing financial support, to our donors, volunteers, staff, board, Friends, and fellow Haddam organizations and town departments. Anyone who comes through our doors or uses our online resources is considered a patron. All of our materials, programs and services are free. (We don't even tell you how much to pay for fines on our materials. Just leave whatever small donation you like in the jar, and we'll waive late charges.) Stop by and visit — tell us what you like, and what you want. We may be running it, but ultimately it's your library.

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November 13 town meeting

A Town Meeting was held on Tuesday, Nov.12 at the Haddam Volunteer Fire Company Station #1in Higganum for the purpose(s) of approving certain budget transfers to the Capital Improvement Budget. Per the legal notice, as provided in part below:

"To consider, discuss and vote to approve the Budget Transfers in the amount of 1,122,000.00 to the Capital Improvement Budget.

To consider, discuss and vote to approve the transfer request to fund (2) off road utility vehicles for Haddam Neck Volunteer Fire Department and Haddam Volunteer Fire Department from HVFD replacement truck. Budget transfer request form 2020-3

To consider, discuss and vote to approve transfer request to fund HES operating costs in the amount of \$127,853 form 2020-4."

This was First Selectwoman Lizz Milardo's last Town Meeting. Bob McGarry will be Haddam's next First Selectman; joined by incoming Selectmen Kate Anderson and Sean Moriarty.

The Pledge was recited. Tony Giamei was nominated from the floor to be moderator, and Town Clerk Scott Brookes read the legal call of the meeting. The call was accepted. Milardo provided a brief explanation for each item. In terms of moving the \$1,122,000 into the Capital Improvement Budget, there were extra assets that the Board of Finance (BOF) received. The vehicles purchased for the Public Works department will be funded by these monies, as Milardo explained that the Town now has the "funds to do that," instead of bonding for the vehicles as previously anticipated. Such a move was already approved by the BOF and BOS. Residents at the meeting voted to approve the transfer.

Next, Milardo explained that there were "so many moving pieces" with respect to Fire Department vehicles – both in terms of maintenance and repairs. Originally, it was thought that replacing Truck 713 was necessary; that is no longer the case. There was an excess of \$49,506 in the Capital plan already. The

idea is to re-allocate monies to fund the two lines within the Capital plan. Residents voted to approve the transfer.

The final item centered on HES. Milardo explained that Haddam voted to purchase HES in June. Simultaneously, the Town budget was being approved, and work was being done with RSD #17 to understand operating costs for the building. The amount of \$127,853 is the estimated operating cost to the townspeople for HES from October 2019 (when the purchase became finalized) to June 30, 2020. A resident inquired about insurance for the building. Milardo noted that it cost an additional \$2,500 to add the building onto the Town's insurance. The estimated operating cost includes the insurance, software which runs the heating/cooling system, and security upgrades. Milardo said that the idea is to do "minimal maintenance" as needed at this time, and that the Town is to keep the building "safe and secure." In response to a question from the floor about current usage of the building, Milardo said that there is a pop-up market happening there Wednesdays-Sundays; charrettes for communal input on future usage of the building were held at the end of October/beginning of November; and that the Recreation Department (HK Rec. Dept.) is interested in using the building. The Haddam Junior Women's group has also indicated interest in utilizing the parking lot for their town-wide tag sale in April. Milardo emphasized that P&Z (Planning & Zoning) is going to be "driving that," with respect to "what happens next" with the building. To this end, she noted that Town Planner Bill Warner is "also working on that." Moreover, she expressed enthusiasm for the pop-up market, saying that she "was thrilled when Terri [Everett] and Janet [Verney]" wanted to use the space for the market. Milardo says that it is a "great thing," and that there are a "lot of people in and out of there" - that "life is in that building." Milardo did express caution, however, that the school district was not completely forthcoming in terms of telling the Town the full costs of the maintenance entailed in the building.

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Pitch Pine Trees, Fire, and Millennial Culture Byproducts

November is one of the most beautiful months here in New England. Your response, understandably so, might be: "Are you joking?"

It is past peak. The leaves are down on the pale ground; or the lonely remaining ones in the trees have become a putrid brown. What am I talking about? The woods look sparse and desolate.

This is precisely why I embrace the mid to late-autumn months. After the gorgeous foliage has exited nature's stage, no other distractions take attention away from the trees. Specifically, November ushers in a beautiful, extended study of THE TREE. Exquisite, ordinary, narrow, thick, tall, short, dying, alive. The bare tree stands – in its own spotlight.

Recently, a relative noticed that I was staring at the trees in our now-exposed woods (remember, no more leaves to distract the eyes!) and asked me, "Do you know the story of the Pitch Pine Tree?" The look I made gave my answer away. I did not know the story. But I needed to know it. "Well," this relative said, "Pitch Pines can only release seedlings after they have been exposed to fire." I was hooked. Life born of fire? Quite a concept: the arbor version of the mythological bird, the Phoenix. I did some research on the Pitch Pine, the *Pinus rigida*, and here is what I found according to a New Jersey Forestry information guide:

Pitch pines are dependent on fire and must be carefully managed with fire to assure that the ecosystem provides habitat. Prescribed fire is an important management tool for healthy, productive and safe pitch pine forests.

Pitch pine...has evolved the unique ability to survive fire even if all of the needles are destroyed by the fire. It withstands fire because of its thick protective bark; its ability to re-sprout rapidly; its wide-spreading root system; and the buds lying dormant in the trunk that are stimulated to grow by fire. Even when all of the needles on a pitch pine are burned, the crown can recover and be almost back to normal in just a few years.

As a millennial and part-time observer of my peers, I am intrigued at the idea that growth and life can occur as direct results of something as awe-inducing and devastating as fire. Fire is something that can destroy; it is something that can kill. But it is also something that can offer warmth ("chestnuts roasting on an open fire...") or provide a necessary reme-

dy (cauterizing a wound to stanch bleeding).

My generation neither likes nor handles well the uneasiness, challenges, difficulties, obstacles and tests that litter life like an obstacle course. Millennials have a hard time dealing with life's fires. Millennials do not want to experience one iota of discomfort. They believe that life can - and should - be purged of its tribulations, its offenses, its irregularities, its lack of clarity. Why? Because millennials have been raised on what I call the "doctrine of grievance." Have an issue with someone? Label them a racist, misogynist, bigot. Have an issue with a viewpoint? Label it offensive or hateful. Have an issue with an organization (private or corporate; governmental or non-profit)? Critique it for not being sufficiently diverse. These responses are constitutive elements in the "doctrine of grievance," whereby any hint of discomfort, challenge, or difficulty requires disposal in order to preserve the acutely sensitive sensibilities of the millennial human.

It is, therefore, fitting that the millennial generation has earned the title of "The Most Anxious Generation." Millennials are anxious about everything and everyone they encounter in life. At any point in life, there is the potential fire, calamity, crisis which needs to be immediately eliminated – no…prevented. Such anxieties come to fruition as illustrated below:

You cannot hold a class debate among millennials or, for that matter, today's college students (Generation Z) because anxiety levels are at such a point that contact with ideas, facts and truths they find troubling will lead to cognitive and emotional discrepancies (that is, what they hear and see in life is not what they have been taught) they cannot bear.

The idea that millennials and their younger cohort cannot hear, see or experience anything slightly difficult, as doing so will result in greater anxiety, overwhelming worry, and personal paralysis.

The idea that college campus guest speakers or comedians get disinvited because their personas or personal belief systems are potentially offensive. Recently, comedienne Sara Silverman (herself no enemy of the millennial liberal mainstream) recently described social conditions as "the cancel culture."

Such instances have less to do with laziness than they do with the unrealistic desire of avoiding the fires of truth – of experiencing and facing facts in their de-foliaged form. For the millennial specimen, it is less about the fear of taking offense than it is knowing at one's core that truths, stripped of their

saccharine rallying cries – "Girl, you're amazing! Man, you rock! You've so got this! You got this thing on lock!" There are times when we do not "so got this." There are times when we do not "have this thing [life] on lock" (translation: we "get" it; we know how to live our life). There are times when we are not amazing and when we do not rock. Recognizing, understanding, and indeed owning up to, these personal lows are vital for improvement, growth, and the pursuit of thinking, doing, and being better.

Millennials fear truth's fires may one day destroy and render unusable their highly-manicured belief system that, to no fault of their own, has been stylized for them in great part by permissive yet neglectful parents; indulgent yet totalitarian educational curricula. And so millennials have constructed the cancel culture in tandem with the grievance doctrine. The grievance (based on perception of racism, bigotry, misogyny, sexism, and the like) necessitates cancellation of the speaker and speech. Again, this cancel culture is less about being offended - despite justifications citing sensitivity concerns. Instead, this millennial culture centers on the fear of being wrong, of having tempting falsities vanish as quickly as a status update on Facebook. If we as millennials were really candid, we would say that our anxieties are not about the unknown. Rather, they are about the certitude of truth and not knowing what to do with it.

The above-described cultural byproducts are what we obtain when a generation of adults (now themselves becoming parents) is raised on a highly processed conceptual diet of "Everyone is a star and gets a star." "Diversity is an end in and of itself – diversity is amazing because diversity is amazing" (the tautological fallacy inherent to an illogical, circular premise). Millennials have been educated to care about how we look (are we able to check off the gender identity/expression, sex, race, ethnicity, victim, socioeconomic box?) more than about what we do.

Maybe the realities and travails of life necessitate a little fire now and then. Recall the Pitch Pines: "Pitch pines are dependent on fire and must be carefully managed with fire to assure that the ecosystem provides habitat. Prescribed fire is an important management tool for healthy, productive and safe pitch pine forests."

Perhaps the Pitch Pines have it right: rejuvenation, growth - life itself - follow fire. As you enter this cool season, enjoy those festive fires. They may just be the thing we need right now – millennials and non-millennials alike.

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Haddam Plastic Recycling initiative information

Thank you to all the residents of Haddam for your participation in our community project to recycle plastic bags. Through our partnership with TREX we have been able to remove 4373.90 pounds of plastic that would have gone to our landfill.

We began collecting plastic bags last November with a goal of collecting 500 pounds every six months. Needless to say we smashed that goal. As a thank you, TREX has supplied the town with a TREX bench for each collection period. One has been placed outside the Fire house and the other is on RT 81 by the center.

Here is a recap of the life cycle for recycled plastic bags in Haddam. We have several drop-off locations around town. The Town Office Building, Transfer

Station, Nutmeg Pharmacy, River Provisions and the Brainerd Library have agreed to be locations for collection. The bags are weighed and stored, usually at the Town Office Building, until someone takes them to a distribution center. These distribution Centers are located at select Stop and Shop, Big Y, Kohl's, Price Chopper, Whole Foods and Target. Melissa Oddo, a Haddam resident, put together this list which contains all the stores that accept material along with contact information. The complete list can be found on our website under the sustainability page.

In town, we are required to show the State that we are making progress in reducing our bulky waste, and Municipal Solid Waste annually. One of the ways we are accomplishing this is by recycling over two ton of plastic bags. Plastic bags cannot be put into

the regular single stream recycling. This program allows us to find a way to recycle this material and reduce our bulky waste.

This program was set up as a community based project. Other than the Transfer Station employees storing bags, the town crew is not involved. We are looking for volunteers constantly. When the shed behind the Town Office Building is full, we have to wait to receive any more donations or back up from the Transfer Station. If you are headed to one of these stores, please stop by the shed and grab a few on your way.


