#### RSD #17 celebrates Veterans in our HK Schools

Approximately 40 veterans participated in the Haddam Killingworth Middle School's Veterans Day celebration on Friday, Nov. 8. First, they held an Appreciation Breakfast, then a Veteran visited each of the classrooms to speak with the students about why they chose the military, how that experience impacted their life, and what makes them proud to be a veteran, among other things. "We hoped to honor the work and sacrifices of the

veterans in our lives, and teach our students the importance of serving one's country," said Dolores Bates, HKMS Principal.

Eric Larson, Principal of Haddam Killingworth Intermediate School, gave a call to service using both Ted Williams, the famous hitter for the Red Sox and a marine in WW2 and Korea as well as his father, a Captain in the Navy, as examples, at the assembly they held at HKIS on Friday, Nov. 8. The HKIS chorus sang a medley of

patriotic songs, finishing with the Star Spangled Banner. Also, the staff and students of HKIS acted out a dramatic reading of "The Wall" by Eve Bunting, about a father and son looking for the name of their grandfather at the Vietnam War Memorial. According to Mr. Larson, they finished by reading the names of each veteran or current service person present at the assembly and their connection to the student or staff member of the school.

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#### Steady Habit Brewing Company breaks ground in Higganum

On Thursday, Nov. 14, Steady Habit Brewing Company (formerly of 95 Bridge Street, Haddam) held a Groundbreaking ceremony at what is to be their new location in Higganum on Saybrook Road/Route 154 (next door to Dunkin' Donuts).

Before the opening ceremony began, I met with owner Jim Venditti and he was kind enough to take the time to answer some questions. Seeing the massive amount of square footage, the new building offers, I was curious to know how this would impact his business.

One thing he expects is an increase in flow of people due to the excellent location. Being along a major state road and not far from the exit & entrance to CT 9, is an advantage because many people pass by daily. The building is spacious and there are many windows along the front wall giving it a feeling of openness. The new location has 6,000 square feet


of space; much larger than the previous one which only had 3,800 square feet. It will house a 15-barrel brewing system allowing them to increase their beer production from 125 barrels per year to 700 per year. Steady Habit's talented Master Brewer, Scott Cross will surely enjoy the new space, and he will be quite busy I am sure.

An architect's design of Steady Habit Brewing Company (see photo at left) available for all of us to view, was quite impressive. It depicted an incredible outdoor patio with seating and propane fire pits. It will be 25' by 80' in dimension, with enough room for 10 tables for people to sit and enjoy tasty beer and food with friends. There will be a pass-through window on the back wall to serve patrons on the patio. Food trucks will also be on site, and they will be partnering with local restaurants to provide items which will be delivered to hungry patrons via "runners."

The interior left side of the building will have an office, rest rooms, and a 3,200 square foot taproom with tables for patrons. In the left rear corner, there will be a stage for performers. Double doors along the back wall lead to the outdoor patio area. The farright side of the building will be home to the brew-

ing system and storage room. In addition, there is a second storage room where supplies can be kept on an upper level.

When asked how he came to the decision to open in the new location, Jim explained, "The plan began with Lizz Milardo and Robin Munster trying to make sure I kept the business in Haddam. Then they began looking all over for just the right location. When I saw this building, I knew it was the place. The location is perfect."

While we were speaking about the future of the brewery, First Selectman Lizz Milardo, First Selectmen elect Bob McGarry, Selectmen elect Kate Anderson and Sean Moriarty along with the President and members of the Middlesex Chamber of Commerce arrived to share in the celebration.

Despite the cold weather, there was a strong sense of warmth in the space. As we prepared for the ground-breaking ceremonies, one item was missing, the "traditional shovel." As people scurried around looking for one, Michael Fallon from the Middlesex Chamber of Commerce found a snow shovel. Just when we thought it might have to suffice, a "proper" shovel was located, and the ceremony proceeded.

First Selectman Lizz Milardo, thanked all the

people who were involved in helping to keep Steady Habit in Haddam. She remarked, "It will be a catalyst for the Village, drawing people from around the area into Haddam. It's been hard work, but I am happy to be sharing in the effort – thanks to all who made it happen, this will be a place where people can have a great time."

Middlesex Chamber President Larry McHugh commented, "This will be a terrific facility. Thank you Lizz for supporting businesses. This will create new jobs for the community." Indeed, that is true, the

> old location employed 9 people, mostly parttime, whereas the new location being much larger, will employ 7-8 full time employees and 10-12 part-time employees. President McHugh thanked Haddam Town Planner, Bill Warner for his dedication and hard work in helping Haddam to move forward. "You are lucky to have him working for Haddam," he exclaimed. He then stressed the importance

of communities having businesses which attract people to the town. "Towns need a destination – it's why people come to a town. Jim did his research on finding the right site, and this is a good one."

Steady Habit Brewing Company serves more than just our small town of Haddam; they distribute their beer to 200 bars, stores, and restaurants in Connecticut. They also have plans to begin direct distribution to New York, Massachusetts, Pennsylvania and New Jersey.

Looking forward, Steady Habit Brewing Company is planning to be open for business in the first two weeks in December. The plumbing is in and they are hoping to have the floors poured next week. They plan to have the Tap room open first while the work continues in the remaining space which will hold the equipment for brewing the beer.

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Anemia- It's not about your skin being pale!
Anemia is caused by a decrease in the number of Red Blood Cells (RBC) that carry oxygen to cells in your body and carry carbon dioxide to your lungs to have it leave your body. This decrease occurs due to: increased blood loss, internal destruction of RBC's, or decreased production.

There are many diseases including infection, inflammation, or cancers that have an association with anemia. Anemia is one of those conditions, much like a fever, that your doctor may want to investigate further. Albeit mild anemia may just be watched versus treated, your doctor must be the professional to combine their knowledge and experience to make this decision.

Nutritional causes for anemia include iron deficiency, vitamin B-12 deficiency, and folic acid deficiency, along with starvation and general malnutrition.

One external skin indicator your doctor will consider is the color of the creases in your palm, and if they are as pale as the surrounding skin, as this may indicate a drop in your hemoglobin concentration, which is one measure of anemia. Hemoglobin is the component of the blood that binds to oxygen. Other laboratory tests the doctor may order include: Hematocrit- which is the amount of RBC's; Mean Corpuscular Volume (MCV)-which measures the average volume of RBC's; and Mean Corpuscular Hemoglobin (MCH)- which measures the amount of hemoglobin per RBC. There are other lab tests as well.

Iron, Folic Acid, and B-12 deficiencies are diagnosed by lab tests, but a thorough physician exam will highlight the patient fatigue. All adult men and post-menopausal women with low iron should also be screened for GI issues as well.



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#### In & About The Haddams: November 1919- National News

Selected from the pages of The Middletown Press and lightly annotated by Sally Haase

National Coal Strike. Washington, Nov. 03, 1919: The full effect of the coal strike was felt today. Officials of the United Mine Workers of America claimed that few of the miners who obeyed the strike order had gone back to work. There was no change in the situation in the great Pennsylvania bituminous fields as 14,000 non-union miners were reported at work. Union officials at Columbus declared that the 40,000 organized miners who obeyed the strike order in Ohio would remain out. Not a mine working was the word from Springfield, Ill. Plans are underway for a great legal battle when the federal injunction against the officials of the United Mine Workers comes up at United States court at Indianapolis.

Wilson Receives Election Results. Washington, Nov. 05, 1919: President Wilson's condition was so greatly improved that Dr. Grayson permitted his patient to receive the [Congressional and state] election results in his sick chamber last night. The returns were relayed by messenger to the sick room where they were read to Mr. Wilson by Mrs. Wilson.

Women Plan Big Sex Fight For Equality. New York, Nov. 06, 1919: War - sex war - by women upon men for equal control in political, economic and social matters, is to be waged with bitter relentlessness beginning in the presidential campaign for 1920. The National Woman's Party asserted that women will force the reforms they want by the sex vote—the women for women candidates only. They foresee in the next 25 years a revolution through "moral" force. "Rarely have men candidates fulfilled their pledges when once in office," said their official. "One of woman's chief weapons will be her sex. Marriage will be made a more lovely thing, women will take her rightful place in government, and she shall have her say. No system of government can be called civilized where the cry of women for herself and her children is unheeded. Man has always been in control. He has taught women to be good slaves. Too many of us love our chains," she said.

Million and Half On Strike. Washington, Nov. 06, 1919: President Wilson's call for a new industrial

conference cannot be longer deferred. With an army of strikers estimated at 1,500,000 and another 1,500,000 putting forward demands and threatening to strike, the administration is determined to act. Official figures are unknown, but it is known that there has never been in the history of the United States greater unrest than at present. Higher wages and improved conditions are fully behind 90 percent of the walkouts. The next disastrous strike which threatens the country may be looked for on the railways.

Wilson Will Accept Reservations. Washington, Nov. 07, 1919: President Wilson will accept reservations (conditions) to the treaty of Versailles which are "acceptable to the friends of the treaty and which will not nullify the League of Nations." Senator Hitchcock, who spent half an hour with the president, said the president appears to have undergone "considerable suffering...although he discussed the treaty in a very decided manner."

Wilson Writes With Two Hands. Washington, Nov. 07, 1919: President Wilson is ambidextrous. Roughly speaking, Mr. Wilson signs his name to 15,000 documents in addition to personal correspondence and autographs. As the burden of signing his name grew he began to notice a sharp pain in his right hand - neuritis. He was recommended to rest [it.] So, unknown to his doctor, he commenced to practice writing with his left hand. President Wilson retains his ability even in the present serious illness and recently signed pardons for six men confined in Federal prison with his good left hand.

Bodies Arrive From Russia. Hoboken, N.J., Nov. 13, 1919: Before a tragic little congregation of weeping relatives, the nation today gave final tribute to 103 young American heroes who had paid their last full measure of devotion on the battlefield amidst the frozen wastes of northern Russia. The coffins, draped with the flags almost hidden beneath the heaped up roses, held the mortal remains of the youthful American soldiers who had fallen in action against the bolsheviks on the Archangel front. These soldiers, members of the 339th infantry, had been called from their peaceful homes to fight the Germans, but were ordered into Russia from their training camps in England. All had perished since

the signing of the Armistice on November 11, 1918.

Want Our Dead Brought Home. Washington, Nov. 13, 1919: Ambassador Wallace at Paris has been instructed to urge on the French government early action permitting the return of the bodies of dead soldiers to the United States. In reply to a questionnaire sent out to the next of kin on the 65,000 American soldiers who are buried in France requests have been received to return 40,000 of the bodies.

**Espionage Law Dies When Treaty Passes.** Washington, Nov. 14, 1919: Revolutionary agitators are waiting the ratification of the peace treaty to launch a great campaign for the overthrow of the government according to information in the possession of the justice department. The espionage law, part of the trading with the enemy act, becomes ineffective with the proclamation of peace. Vast amounts of bolshevik and other radical literature are now being held for importation into the United States upon the ratification of the treaty. The department of justice has learned that more than 50 new radical publications have appeared within the past few weeks and these are devoted to anarchy and communism. Reports of a new paper started by the International Workers of the World under the name of "Das Klassenkamp" or "class struggle," published in German, has reached the department.

Treaty Of Versailles Dead. Washington, Nov. 20, 1919: At the close of one of the most dramatic sessions the senate has ever seen, that body adjourned sine die (indefinitely) after turning down the peace treaty. The next move must come from the White House. It was announced that the president will not take any action or make any comment for the present, allowing a few days to allow public opinion to crystalize. He is said to be confident that the country is behind him. The peace treaty is to become effective Dec. 1, it was decided today in Paris, despite the action of the United Sates senate. [Note: The treaty gave the League the power to declare war. If one nation was at war, all the League members were at war.]

100 years ago, much has changed and, then again, nothing has changed.

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

# Middlesex Health raises funds

Middlesex Health employees and volunteers raised \$175,000 this year to support many health system programs and services, including the Helping Hands Assistance Fund.

The donations were made as part of an annual employee and volunteer giving campaign, and the amount raised was \$9,500 more than last year. The \$175,000 includes contributions from 892 employees and volunteers, many who donate one hour's pay to the campaign each month.

The annual campaign was started in 1990 and has become tradition.

Since that time, donations have totaled \$2,797,271 and supported every major Middlesex capital project, including new facilities and investments in new technology. The money also helps programs that support people facing a crisis or major medical issue.

In addition, employee and volunteer donations go to the Helping Hands Assistance Fund, which helps both employees and patients who face critical needs and are suffering financial hardships due to circumstances beyond their control, such as a fire or severe illness. Grants from the fund can help pay for items not covered by health insurance, special dietary supplements, groceries and gas. The Helping Hands Assistance Fund also supports select community programs that impact health.
