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# Haddam Resident State Trooper Milardo retires

As of Oct. 1, Haddam Resident State Trooper Enrico "Rico" Milardo will be retiring from the Connecticut State Police, but continuing in law enforcement as a Police Constable for the town of Westbrook. Milardo, born and raised in the Middletown area, has been Haddam's Resident Trooper since 2010. He became a State Trooper in 1998, after volunteering as a Middletown Police Auxiliary Officer for three years. Prior to becoming Haddam's trooper, he served both Troop K and then Troop F.

While in the State Police Academy, Trooper Milardo received 1400 hours of classroom training, including accident reconstruction and investigation, penal code, criminal

investigation, DUI investigation training and certification, conflict resolution, firearms training, self defense, patrol techniques, and report writing. It also included many hours of physical conditioning, water rescue, and emergency vehicle driving. Troopers also have annual requalification training in firearms, Tas-

er training, basic emergency medical, and other areas. Trooper Milardo has also been a certified D.A.R.E instructor since 2011.

Trooper Milardo received an Exemplary Service Award from the Hartford Police Department in 2001, and Unit Citation Awards in 2001, 2004, and 2010. He received the Meritorious Service Award for assisting in the capture of two suspects involved in an Old Saybrook robbery incident in 2013, that led to the shooting and wounding of a

state police detective. He has also been a Connecticut State Police Field Training Officer since 2003.

"I would like to thank Trooper Milardo for all of his hard work and dedication to the town," said First Selectman Lizz Milardo. "He will be missed."

While in Haddam, Trooper Milardo was involved in Haddam-Killingworth Youth & Family Services, and the Healthy Communities/Healthy Kids Coalition, which is a collaborative effort to control underage drinking. He was also involved with the Juvenile

Review Board, which is an alternative to the Juvenile Justice System. The main objective of the JRB is to provide an alternative for juveniles age 16 and under who are in conflict at home, in school, in the community, or are first time offenders.

"Officer Milardo is one of those people who 'gets' people," said Laurie Ruderfer, the Executive Director of Youth & Family Services of H-K since the summer of 2018. "Over the past year we have had

# HKHS teams place well at Suffern, Valley invitationals

On Saturday, Sept. 21, the Haddam Killingworth High School Boys and Girls Cross Country teams split their squads and competed in two different states. While the Boys and Girls Varsity squads traveled to Suffern Invitational at Bear Mountain, NY, the remainder of the team traveled to Cromwell to compete in the CT River Valley Invitational.

The Varsity teams competed on a challenging 3 mile course against over 70 schools from New York and New Jersey. Both teams placed third in their Varsity "C" race as the boys scored 79 points to finish behind Mount Academy and North Rockland of NY while the girls scored 97 points to place third behind Valley Central and Monroe Woodbury, both of NY.

The boys were led by junior Matt Jennings who placed 3rd in a time of 16:18. He was followed across the line by senior tri-captain Christian Uzwiak who placed 8th in a time of 16:43, then juniors Sean Rutledge 19th (17:45) and Fisher Harris 23rd (17:32) then a trio of tightly packed Cougars led by sophomore Caleb Freeman 26th (17:47), junior Julian Spector 27th (17:47) and senior tri-captain Griffin Robinson 30th (17:56).

The Girls Varsity squad was led by junior Meara Bodak, who placed 7th in the race in a tmie of 20:37 for the 3 mile course. She was followed by senior tri-captain Julia Callis 24th (22:02), sophomore Brianna Minervino 26th (22:12), senior tri-captain Lauren D'Amico 27th (22:18), and sophomore Ava DiMatteo 30th (22:51).

At the CT River Valley Invitational, the rest of the Cougar squad competed in the JV boys and girls races against 15 other teams from CT. The girls JV team placed 2nd as a team and were led by race winner Isabel Berardino who placed first in a time of 22:31 for the 5,000 meter course. Other top 10 finishers were senior Jasmine Adelberg who placed 4th in 24:09 and junior Kathy Melgar who finished 7th (24:19). The boys JV team won their race and were led by sophomore Greyson Merola who was runner up in a time of 17:39 for the 3.1 mile course. Following him across the line was senior tri-captain Luke Sodergren 3rd (17:41), sophomore Tyler Robinson 4th (17:44), senior Michael Coleman 6th (17:58), freshman Mason Gorham 8th (18:06) and sophomore Andrew Hedges 10th (18:06).

#### Edith Hanson Pawlicki (Democrat)

I was born and raised in Higganum, and grew up playing in the woods with my three older siblings. My Girl Scout troop learned cross-stitch at the Thankful Arnold House, the root of my embroidery passion. I rang out in fifth—I was one of the sixth grades that was bussed to Burr Elementary School (BES) because the schools were overcrowded. In 7th grade, I was the Wicked Witch in the HKMS Wizard of Oz, and then a Governor's Scholar in 8th grade. At HKHS, I ran all three seasons and had the mixed blessing of being coached by my brother Ross Hanson.

After graduating as valedictorian in 2008, I studied Computer Science and Japanese at the University of Rochester where I met my husband. After graduating, I taught English in Japan until getting married. I then moved to Seattle, where he worked, and earned my Masters in Teaching. I went on to teach AP CS, high school math, and CS engineering.

In 2016, I was blessed with twin sons, Gil and Cae. I very much wanted to raise them near family, so we moved back to Haddam in 2017. They are the reason I am running for board of education.

I want to protect our public schools for them and for our town's children. I have a strong background in education, not only through my own experiences but also because of the many education professionals in my family, including my mother, Gail Hanson, who retired in June after 25 years of teaching, mostly in RSD 17. As my sons and nephews will soon start at BES, I am deeply committed to the quality of our schools. As a tutor of a local student and volunteer at HKMS, I have been concerned by the placement of teachers in the district. Several young, talented teachers have been fired while experienced teachers have been moved from

their established subject to ones they were not comfortable teaching, prioritizing budget over the education of our children.

It is important to examine the school budget rigorously and make sure it is manageable for the towns, but we should not do so at the cost of quality instruction. The materials I have read show integrated elementary and middle schools are correlated with increased disciplinary issues, and I am concerned about the integration of the fourth graders into HKMS.

As for the closing of HES, I was disturbed by the lack of data shared, as well as the rushed timeline when the community asked for more information. As BOE member, my goal will be to communicate consistently and openly with the town regarding major decisions and to prioritize our children's education over internal school politics. I hope we can improve the district's administration so that our teachers are supported and free to do their jobs to the best of their abilities.

When I think of Haddam, I think of family. My Manning grandparents moved to Haddam in 1950 and my Hanson grandparents in 1963. My parents and several of their siblings chose to raise their children in town, so their children could benefit from the great public schools here as well as the state forests and parks nearby. Haddam has been a wonderful home for my sonsthey love the Tony Bondi Playground on Jail Hill Rd, visiting their Manning uncles' cows and vegetable garden, the wonderful children's department at Brainerd Memorial Library, canoeing on Miller's Pond and (their all-time favorite) the HK Dairy Barn. It is a blessing to be take them to the Memorial Day parade where I marched in the school band and show them the bricks outside the Veteran's Museum with their great-uncles' names. Every morning when I walk into our backyard, listen to the birds calling, and every evening as we look up at the stars, and hear the crickets chirping, I feel so grateful to be able to raise my sons in this beautiful area.

I love this town, and I passionately believe that education changes lives. I hope you will give me the opportunity to represent our community on the BOE so that I can use my skills and knowledge to ensure the quality of our schools for our children. I would listen to the community concerns and do my best to keep the BOE transparent and accessible. At this critical time for the district, as we hire a new superintendent and new middle school principal, I want to make sure our community and its values will be preserved.


in the next academic year so I have a deep, personal commitment to ensuring that what happens in our district is in the best interests of our children.

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## LEGAL NOTICES

#### LEGAL NOTICE TOWN OF HADDAM, CONNECTICUT

A Personal Property Declaration must be completed, and sworn to, according to law, between October 1, 2019 and November 1, 2019 by certain individuals, and all businesses, located/ operating in Haddam, Connecticut as of October 1, 2019.

Those failing to submit declarations will require the Assessor having to estimate the assessment of the personal property and the owner being charged a 25% penalty against their personal property assessment. Penalties cannot be waived nor can they be appealed to the Board of Assessment Appeals.

Personal Property consists of unregistered recreational vehicles (RV's) and truck campers, snow mobiles, all-terrain vehicles, unregistered motor vehicles, unregistered personal watercrafts (not including boats), farm equipment, horses, commercial equipment, furniture and fixtures used in the operation of a business, construction equipment, farming and mechanics tools, leased equipment, cables, conduits and pipes of gas, electric and water companies.

It is not necessary to declare real property and/or motor vehicles that are registered with the Connecticut Department of Motor Vehicles. But, vehicles that are garaged in town for more than 60 days that bear out of state registrations are considered unregistered and must be declared to the Assessor on a Personal Property Declaration.

Personal Property Declarations are mailed out to all persons or businesses that declared personal property last year. All new owners of Personal Property must either request a Personal Property Declaration from the Assessor's Office or retrieve one from the Haddam website at www.haddam.org.

All Declarations are due to the Assessor's Office on or before November 1, 2019 A penalty will be assessed to declarations received late; declarations that are incomplete, or those are not received at all. Declarations returned with "Same as Last Year" or "No Changes" will be considered incomplete. Assessed values for property that is omitted from a returned declaration will be estimated by the Assessor and a penalty applied.

If any personal property owners have changed their address in the past year, please alert the Assessor's Office. Regular office hours are Monday through Wednesday 8:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.; Thursday 8:30 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. and Friday 8:30 a.m. to 12:00 noon.

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
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# Haddam Resident State Trooper Enrico Milardo Retires

benefit of his presence at events to the benefit of our agency (Pumpkin Run, Dodgeball), the community (Drug Take Back Day) and individual families (Holiday-Stuff-a-Cruiser) and he has been an active and key member of our Juvenile Review Board/JRB." She went on to say, "He has been our go-to source for information that pertains to the laws and protections as they apply to youth and families and has consistently demonstrated the unique role of the Resident State Trooper at bringing youth, families, and the entire community, together. I personally want to thank him for the welcome he extended to me over this past year and for his wise counsel. Westbrook is lucky to get him—he will be missed."

Resident Troopers respond to a wide range of calls ranging from cyber crimes and identity theft to domestic disturbances, from motor vehicle accidents to residential and commercial alarms, to burglaries and assaults, robberies and larcenies, and vandalism. They conduct traffic enforcement, direct traffic during special events, patrol town residential and business areas, conduct community events such as a mock car accident at Haddam Killingworth High School each May, educate high school students of the dangers of alcohol during prom season, public presentations, and conduct under-age drinking enforcement patrols in conjunction with the Healthy Communities/Heathy Kids Coalition.

"Rico is a critical member of the high school team," said Interim Superintendent, Holly Hageman. "We regularly communicate about students of concern, in a collaborative effort to keep kids on track. He is also our "go to" resource for event coverage. Not only does he never need guidance on where we need him; he brings humor and camaraderie to the sidelines as well. It is quite common for Rico to take time out of his day to have a conversation with a student about how their choices will positively (or negatively) impact their life path. He does this in a direct, but supportive way that is "unofficial business" but is highly effective in reaching teens at a crossroads. Rico has always been quick to respond when I needed his input or an official police action. He is always a text or phone call away and there are no "days off" when it comes to the safety of our kids. One of the best examples of this happened a few years ago when one of our students was the target of an online predator. The situation was incredibly serious and, having contacted Rico the moment after I learned of the danger to one of our girls, he and I partnered together to

get between the perpetrator and HK. Rico worked quickly with the state police in a mid-western state and within hours the perpetrator was arrested, his computer confiscated. His quick work saved one young girl from the potentially far-reaching damage of an online attack. While I am so happy for Rico in his retirement, his departure is a tremendous loss for our school community!"


"When Trooper Milardo told me about his retirement, I knew that it was a great move for him — but it would be an incredible loss to the community," said Haddam Volunteer Fire Company Chief, Sam Baber. "Milardo's knowledge, acumen, and progressive thinking have benefited the Haddam community as a whole. Haddam Fire will greatly miss the camaraderie and interactions with him."

Resident Troopers also handle numerous administrative office duties including finger printing for town residents seeking employment or pistol permits, preparing arrest warrant applications during criminal investigations, completing motor vehicle accident and criminal investigation reports, filing, and applying for grants. "Some criminal investigations can be very challenging," said Trooper Milardo. "But I still found it rewarding and satisfying whenever I solved a crime." "It has been a pleasure and an honor to work with Trooper Milardo," said Trooper First Class Joe DeAngelo, Haddam's other Resident Trooper. "During his 20 plus year career, he has gathered significant insight into what makes a State Trooper effective and how the Resident Trooper program has an intimate and direct impact on the towns that we serve. I am grateful for the opportunity to have worked alongside him."

"My favorite part of being a Resident Trooper in the town of Haddam was that you get to know many of the residents, which fosters better understanding and trust," said Trooper Milardo. "Haddam is a close knit community where people look out for each other, which is an asset to the Resident Troopers."

"I will miss seeing all the friends I have made professionally and personally over the last 10 years in Haddam, Higganum, and Haddam Neck, as well as Regional School District 17, who have been extremely supportive to me and the Connecticut State Police," said Trooper Milardo. "The positive relationship between the HK schools and the state police is very important."

Trooper DeAngelo will move to day shift, and a new night shift trooper will be chosen for the Haddam Resident Trooper office.





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What both diets agree on is that foods to be avoided or limited to once per week servings is saturated fats found in pastries, sweets, butter, red meat, and fried foods. There has been no decision as to dairy with the exception that all dairy was low fat versus a whole fat option.

Both studies have identified several important nutrients such as Vitamin E, a powerful antioxidant, which is also found in oils, nuts, seeds, whole grains and leafy green vegetables. Vitamin E attacks the free radicals that are thought to produce injury to brain cells. Vitamin B-12 is also a vitamin found to be important because as we become older our ability to absorb B-12 becomes compromised, and a deficiency in Vitamin B-12 can lead to confusion and memory problems. When combined with lower Folic Acid levels this can cause cognitive decline, and dementia. The brain has higher levels of Omega-3 Fatty Acids, and is found to be important in brain cell membranes, and in the transmission of signals between the cells. Next week, we will look at cellular inflammation, and the part that food, exercise and social interaction plays.
