Oct. 18, the Haddam Killingworth High School Boys and Girls Cross Country teams competed at the Shoreline Championship meet at Cromwell High School. Coming in as the underdog to the heavily favored Old Saybrook team, the H-K Girls Varsity team ran an

race to earn the upset victory and win their 4th Shoreline championship in the past five years, as they tallied 42 points to outdistance Old Saybrook with 47 points. The H-K girls, who had lost to Old Saybrook by 100 points at the Ocean State Invitational just several weeks ago, earned their victory by racing as a pack to reclaim the title that they had lost last year.

Leading the way for the Cougars was sophomore Ava DiMatteo, who had the race of her high school career thus far, by placing 6th in a time of 20:07 for the 5,000 meter course. She was quickly followed across the line by her teammates, senior Lauren D'Amico 7th (20:19), senior Julia Callis 8th (20:26), junior Meara Bodak 9th (20:28) — all of whom earned First Team All Conference honors. Freshman Isbael Berardino rounded out the scoring by placing 12th in a time of 20:45 to earn Second Team




The Boys Varsity team also came away with the victory and the Shoreline Championship which was their 6th consecutive Shoreline title and 9th out of

the past ten years. The boys were led as they have been the entire season by junior Matt Jennings who was the Shoreline individual champion as he won the in a time of 15:47 for the 3.1 mile course. Senior Chris Uzwiak had a phenomenal race to place 3rd in a time of 16:07, then there was a pack of Cougars who all finished within 1 second of each other: sophomore Caleb Freeman 7th (16:40), junior Fisher Harris 8th (16:40) and junior Sean Rutledge 9th (16:41) to round out the team scoring. All five of the boys earned First Team All Conference honors on their way to leading the team to a score of 28 to outdistance runner up East Hampton with 49 points and the rest of the Shoreline field.

Also contributing to the championship was junior Julian Spector 19th (17:27) who earned Second Team All Shoreline accolades and senior Griffin Robinson who placed 21st (17:33).

Not to be outdone, the H-K Boys and Girls JV teams not only came away with team victories in their races but did so in dominating fashion. In the girls JV race, H-K swept the first three places on their way to scoring a low tally of 22 points to easily outdistance the rest of the conference. Leading the way was JV race champion sophomore Charlotte Selmer who placed 1st in a time of 22:23. She was followed by senior Jasmine Adelberg who in her last cross country race ever for H-K was runner up in a time of 22:44 and then was followed by third place finisher junior Kathy Melgar in a time of 23:05.

Finally to cap off the successful afternoon, the boys JV squad put on a clinic of pack racing to sweep the race by scoring a perfect score of 15 points. The JV team swept the first 8 places in the race and then had 15 out of the top 16 finishers overall. First to cross the line for H-K was freshman Mason Gorham who was the individual JV champion in a time of 17:10. He was followed by fellow freshman Jack Insalaco who had an outstanding race to be runner up in a time of 17:18. Then there was a pack of H-K runners and a sea of yellow and blue jerseys all within 12 seconds of each other: senior Owen Howes 3rd (17:25), senior Luke Sodergren 4th (17:27), sophomore Tyler Robinson 5th (17:28), junior Max Cozean 6th (17:30), sophomore Lucas Kamoen.

in a home per day from 2012 to 2016.

"It's so crucial that families make an escape plan in the event of a fire," said Firefighter and Fire Prevention Week Chair Franklin Pierce.

Firefighters taught the children the importance of calling 9-1-1, using the back of their hand to feel for a potentially hot doorknob, crawling low to see

under smoke, and stop-drop-and-roll.

They also dressed in gear and offered the kids

"If there's a fire and you're trapped, and you see one of us, don't be scared. Don't hide. Come to We are there to help you," Pierce said.

Following the program, participants received fire prevention materials and a plastic firefighter helmet.



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October 1919: News from the Haddams and the nation

Selected from the pages of The Middletown Press and lightly annotated by Sally Haase

Wilson Not Good. Washington, Oct. 02, 1919: The condition of President Wilson is "not at all good this morning," Rear Admiral Grayson, the president's physician, declared today. [President Wilson's 27 day train western tour was cut short when he became ill. On September 26th the train headed straight to Washington from Wichita.] Dr. Grayson asserted that there was absolutely no cause for alarm.

New Alien Laws. Washington, Oct. 03, 1919: Passports for all immigrants is the chief provision of a bill soon to come from the house immigration committee. It is expected that the bill will either prohibit all immigration for a period of years or will carry other restrictive features ... so as to make admission most difficult. Witnesses have alleged ... that hordes of Japanese are coming in under passports issued by Japanese officials or are being smuggled in.

Haddam, Oct. 7, 1919: Sheriff Bert G. Thompson was elected first selectman at the town election here yesterday. The republicans made a clean sweep of the other offices also.

Haddam Neck, Oct. 7, 1919: A power boat will be at the Cyprian Brainerd dock to carry free of charge all who wish to attend the Welcome Home Celebration. Many of our people who have never visited Field Park will be delighted with this charming spot.

Newspapers Still Barred. Washington, Oct. 08, 1919: [President Wilson's physician] pointed out that if his patient should gain strength too rapidly there would be a possibility ... [that he] would suffer a relapse. Newspapers are banned and the patient is kept in

The World Series. Chicago, Oct. 10, 1919: The Cincinnati Reds are world champions at baseball winning the deciding game against the Chicago White Sox by a fierce battle. The series of 1919 was a hair raiser, a spine tickler, a thriller and beyond. There is not the shadow of doubt that the better team won. [Note: In August of 1920, fans would read that eight Sox players had thrown the series. The fix became known as the Black Sox Scandal.]

Denies Wilson Has A Cerebral Lesion. Washington, Oct. 13, 1919: The president's condition remained practically the same as it has for the past several days, according to the official bulletin issued from the White House, [but denies] the president was suffering from a cerebral lesion, Rear Admiral Grayson declared: "If such a thing had occurred, the press would have been informed." [Hmmm. A cover up?]

Haddam, Oct. 13, 1919: Great Welcome to War Heroes! The boys never felt more delighted after capturing a German trench than did they with the warm "Put her there" that came from every citizen as a glad hand was extended to them.

First in line was the 6th Regiment Band followed by the Boys in uniform and the veterans of the Civil and the Spanish American Men. Three floats were followed by citizens in autos tastily decorated. [Speeches, lunch and athletic games followed at Field Park.]

100 years ago, much has changed and, then again, nothing has changed.

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


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Thirty Mile Island Cemetery presentation Nov. 2


Candy corn, pumpkins all a-fright...yes; it is that time of year. Ghosts, goblins, and ghouls abound. Is that a mucket you hear? Or is it just the eve of Halloween drawing near? What about a bit of centuries-old history right here in Haddam? How about some good, old-fashioned cemetery research? How about some or all the above?

As it turns out, this past July, the Old Burial Yard at Thirty Mile Island Cemetery Association decided to "move forward with a project" on the namesake cemetery, according to Cindy MacNeil-Sola, the association's President. MacNeil-Sola is a published genealogist (author of My Patchwork Quilt) as well as owner of Spirit and Balance, LLC in Higganum, Conn.

Questions swirl around the Thirty Mile Island Cemetery, such as "there is an area that does not have many stones, are there people buried there?" Or "are there burials closer to Route 154 where the stones are moved back?" MacNeil-Sola explains. In a first step to pursue answers, the association hired a company owned by a historical & landscape architect, Tom Elmore, who is founder of Suffield, Conn.-based GeoNav Group, LLC. Elmore's company will "utilize cutting edge technology to document buildings, landscapes headstones and other features above ground," MacNeil-Sola says. In addition, the company will "work side by side with Waltham, Mass.-based Radar Solutions International, Inc," which "will be doing the ground penetrating radar." This GPR (ground penetrating radar) tool "will show us any soil that has been disturbed below ground. It detects and reflects signals from the subsurface objects and changes in material properties to show voids and cracks, which is where the graves would be." The companies will "work together to sync GPR & LiDar data to create a single data that includes both above and below ground data and pictures in a single file. This will be shown as if looking at the cemetery from above."

The Association will present on the project – free and open to the public - on Saturday, Nov. 2 at 2:00 p.m., at the Haddam Brainerd Memorial Library. MacNeil-Sola notes that the presentation is for "sextons of other cemetery's, archaeologists, historical societies, the Connecticut gravestone network, along with the Association of Gravestone studies and the public to see what we have been working on and what we will be moving forward with."

MacNeil-Sola outlines future components of the process: "Our next step is to raise money to reproduce the original fence and enclosures on the fami-

lies burial plots." Looking ahead, MacNeil-Sola says, "in the spring

we are bringing a company in to show us how to clean the headstones, and at that point we will raise money to repair and restore so many headstones a year until it's complete." Eventually, "the information will go into the GIS system at the Town of Haddam," and "we will be bringing it over hopefully to the [Haddam] Historical Society; we have to work that out, but it will have public access. I'm a published genealogist, so it's very important to me to be able to have people find this information."

We are planning a few future fundraisers, along

with creating friends of the cemetery." Elizabeth Malloy, Executive Director of the Haddam Historical Society, says "I think the project is very exciting, and I look forward to hearing about the team's findings."

Mark your calendars for Nov. 2 and hope to see you at the Brainerd Memorial Library for a bit of historical digging...pun intended.

Q: What is Epilepsy?

Epilepsy is a medical condition that produces seizures affecting a variety of mental and physical

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functions. It's also called a seizure disorder. When a person has two or more seizures, they are considered to have epilepsy.

A seizure happens when a brief, strong surge of electrical activity affects part or all of the brain. One in 10 adults will have a seizure sometime during their life.

Seizures can last from a few seconds to a few minutes. They can have many symptoms, from convulsions and loss of consciousness to some that are not always recognized as seizures by the person experiencing them or by health care professionals: blank staring, lip smacking, or jerking movements of arms and legs.

Q: What are Seizures?

A seizure happens when the electrical system of the brain malfunctions. Instead of discharging electrical energy in a controlled manner, the brain cells keep firing. The result may be a surge of energy through the brain, causing unconsciousness and contractions of the muscles.

If only part of the brain is affected, it may cloud awareness, block normal communication, and produce a variety of undirected, uncontrolled, unorganized movements.

Most seizures last only a minute or two, although confusion afterwards may last longer. An epilepsy syndrome is defined by a collection of similar factors, such as type of seizure, when they developed in life, and response to treatment.

There are many different types of seizures. People may experience just one type or more than one. The kind of seizure a person has depends on which part and how much of the brain is affected.

Q: How do doctors treat epilepsy?

Mostly with daily medication to prevent seizures. Some children are helped with a special diet.

Some people may be helped by a brain operation, by a nerve stimulation device or complementary therapy if the medications don't work.

Q: How do you help someone having a seizure?

When providing seizure first aid for generalized tonic-clonic (grand mal) seizures, these are the key things to remember:

DO:

Keep calm and reassure other people who may be nearby.

Time the seizure with your watch.

Clear the area around the person of anything hard or sharp.



Loosen ties or anything around the neck that may make breathing difficult.

Put something flat and soft, like a folded jacket, under the head.

Turn him or her gently onto one side. This will help keep the airway clear.

Stay with the person until the seizure ends naturally.

Be friendly and reassuring as consciousness returns.

Offer to call a taxi, friend or relative to help the person get home if he seems confused or unable to get home by himself.

DON'T:

Don't hold the person down or try to stop his movements.

Do not try to force the mouth open with any hard implement or with fingers. A person having a seizure CANNOT swallow his tongue.

Do not attempt to give anything orally.

Do not keep the person lying on their back.

Don't attempt artificial respiration except in the unlikely event that a person does not start breathing again after the seizure has stopped.




