In HK first, boys, girls track both win Shoreline title

On Wednesday, May 26, 2021 at Old Lyme High School the Haddam Killingworth High School boys track & field team captured the Shoreline Championship for the second year in a row and 6th title in program history, while the HKHS girls track & field team took the title for the 10th time in program history and first time since 2014. The is the first time ever in HK

track history, since 1979, that both the boys AND girls team captured the title in the same year.


For overall score, HKHS Boys had a score of 202.5. The nearest team to them was Coginchaug, who had 108. The HKHS Girls had a score of 164.5, and the nearest team to them was East Hampton, who had 150.5.

Goodspeed Tattoo thriving in Higganum

The word "Tattoo" can conjure up a host of images in people's minds, including sailors, bikers, teen-age girls, ancient Egyptians, and Maori warriors.

The oldest known example was found on a male mummy on the Italian-Austrian border. Carbon dating suggest he lived some 5,200 years ago. Others have been found in Egypt, Chile, Peru, Siberia, North America, China and Japan. Throughout history human beings have often made tattooing a part of their culture. There seems to be a need within people to tell their

story through imagery on their bodies.

In a move to learn more about this "ancient artform", I paid a visit to Goodspeed Tattoo in Higganum Center where I met the owner and artist, George Smith.

As I entered the building, I was surprised to see what looked like a General Store out of the 1940's. The walls were adorned with artifacts including the original sign from the first store on the premises. A large upholstered carved chair occupies one corner of the room. I counted at least 9 carved



faces on the arms, legs and back of the frame.

A bookcase displays items from the past, including old oil cans, funnels, and tins. Metal signs advertising various products and messages such as "Welcome," and "Tattoos Free Tomorrow" adorn the wall. They also tell a story about the owner of the shop who carefully selected them in order to make his customers feel comfortable and safe.

As we settled in to talk, George remarked that his partner, fellow tattoo artist Jeremy Gish is an exceptional artist. They enjoy working together, and it is obvious to their clients, "People want to see people working together, no egos, good friends." He won't tolerate working "with people who do not want to get along."

One of his goals was to create a friendly atmosphere, a place where even children are happy visiting. A large toybox sits on one side of the room, and each child is encouraged to choose a toy of their own to take home.

George takes pride in the fact that he does not run a business that is centered around making money and getting people in and out without establishing any kind of relationship.

When a new customer calls for an appointment, before any work is done, he has a meeting with them. He feels it is important to "get to know the person." A doctor's letter of approval is required if the person has a medical condition which could put them at risk.

A stencil of the design a person selects, is created on carbon paper and then transferred onto clean skin. The carbon outline doesn't impact the inks that are applied, it is simply an outline of the design.

"Requests largely follow trends," said George. "At one time it was popular for women to have a tattoo placed on the lower back because the style of jeans was low-rise. Fashion and even fame can dictate what becomes the latest trend in tattoo design and placement. After the film From Dusk to Dawn, starring George Clooney hit the screens, demand for full arm tattoos like the one George had exploded."

George said that sometimes the reason a person decides to get a tattoo is highly personal. They may have had surgery that was disfiguring and are depressed and feel a sense of loss. A tattoo can give them a "sense of hope and confidence," and their healing can begin on an emotional level.





Some people choose to get a tattoo to remember a loved one who passed. At times, the stories George hears from his clients are so moving that he will not charge them for his work. He feels that if he can help someone who is deeply suffering, that is reward enough.

At Goodspeed Tattoo, they use StarBright pigments. "You have to buy the best. You get what you pay for." George has used the same company, StarBright for 20 years. https://www.starbritecolors.com/tattoo-inks-info/history.html

To get a license to give tattoos, "You have to be certified by the Red Cross." They are trained to save a life in the event of a medical emergency. In their initial appointment with a new client, they ask people to be honest about their health. If necessary, they will speak with a person's MD to get a better understanding of a person's condition. They want to make sure the person is safe before any work is done.

George is cautious and takes pride in looking out for the well-being of their customers. Before an appointment, all equipment is sanitized, tools sterilized, and the chairs are cleaned with a chemical called MataCide which is noted to be an effective bactericide, virucide, germicide, and fungicide. Alcohol is used as a final wipe down for the tattoo table the client will rest on.

The Tattoo work is done with an electric device referred to as a "machine." The needles that are used come in a variety of styles and sizes. Some are used for outlining and some are used like a paintbrush to lay in color and can have a number of needles on one piece.

George demonstrated a machine he uses that is attached to a foot pedal, similar to a sewing machine. Pressure on the foot pedal controls the power to the tattoo instrument. When the tip is inserted into an ink pot, ink is drawn in and it gets applied to the skin by the movement of the needles and the direction the artist moves the tool.

When asked what the youngest and oldest people were who requested tattoos, he said that he sometimes gets clients as young as 16, but parental consent is needed. He also had a lady "well in her eighties." She wanted a butterfly. When asked why she wanted a tattoo, she explained, all her life she always did what people expected. It was now her time to do what she wanted to do.

When asked what his favorite design has been, he paused for a split second then said, "They are all my favorite."

When asked if business has picked up since he moved to Tylerville, he responded, "It hasn't slowed down!" and he showed me his calendar. "This is a good spot. We already had people from East Haddam, Salem, and now we are here and getting customers from this area."

Goodspeed Tattoo has customers who travel from MA and MD because of the service they have received. Satisfied customers often send him letters of praise, and he is deeply moved by them.

"Our values are different from other tattoo businesses; some take people's money and don't care about their clients; we care."

KAA Announces 2021 Scholarship Winners

(May 26, 2021) — For the third time in the past four years, five Killingworth seniors – including four from Haddam-Killingworth High School — are recipients of Killingworth Ambulance Association scholarships.

Haddam-Killingworth's Jasmine Byrne, Thomas Perry and Ryan and Sam Luther received their 2021 awards Tuesday evening at the school's Seniors Awards Night, while Mercy's Kayla Fordyce was honored May 20 at a celebration for seniors at the Middletown school.

Perry and the Luther brothers are the first male recipients in the past three years.

The KAA annually grants scholar-

ships to high school seniors who meet the following criteria: They must reside in Killingworth, have been accepted to a two-or-four-year college, plan to major in the medical, emergency services or allied fields, participate in community service and have GPAs of 3.0 or better.

JASMINE BYRNE - As a high-school freshman, she attended a Crime Scene Investigation Program at the University of New Haven and immediately set her sights on attending the school. And so, she will - studying forensic science, with a concentration in biology. "Going to college was never a choice," she said, "but a next step for me to take in order to lead a life where I could be happy and fulfilled." An active member of the Spanish Honor Society, a math and science tutor for younger students and the National Anthem singer at the annual Killingworth Road

Race, Jasmine accumulated an astounding 500 hours of community service while at HKHS.

RYAN LUTHER - When he was hospitalized five years ago, Ryan was struck by the kindness shown him by doctors and nurses at Yale New Haven Health. "It reminded me that I wanted to be a doctor since I was young," he said. So, he will attend St. Anselm College and pursue that dream, with biology his major. Ryan volunteered with his twin brother, Sam, at the Killingworth Land Trust, helped raise \$10,000 for the JDRF Type One Diabetes Walk and, until the pandemic, played a sport every year.

SAM LUTHER – Ryan's twin brother, Sam helped with the Diabetes Walk and Killingworth Land Trust, too. And, like Ryan, he volunteered to help with the elderly, played a sport every year until the pandemic struck and will attend St. Anselm. But unlike his

brother, he will pursue a degree in nursing ... a pursuit he followed when he helped to look after Ryan following his hospitalization. "He knows that I know ... and I know that he knows ... I want to help people," he said.

THOMAS PERRY – Some people dread AP Biology. Not Thomas Perry. It awakened his love for science and reminded him how much he loved experiments. "Not only that," he said, "but I loved the learning and every bit of information we were required to obtain." Thomas will take that passion to Middlebury College where he plans to major in biology and maybe, just maybe, pursue a career as a physician. Thomas has also worked at the Killingworth

Land Trust and helped to feed the homeless in New Haven.

KAYLA FORDYCE - Kayla was always interested in biology, but it wasn't until she attended the Inspiring Women in Engineering and Medicine workshop at the University of Connecticut that she found her passion: orthopedic surgery. "(It) increased my already motivated self," she said, "to proceed with my study of medicine and opened my eyes to the world of orthopedic surgery." Kayla will attend Providence College where she plans to pursue a major in biology and a career in medicine. She completed 213 hours of community service at Mercy, including 95 as an assistant athletic trainer and 53 as a Mercy Ambassador.

It is important to remember to apply sunscreen to lips, as 70% of people fail to do this. The legs are the site for most common melanoma in women, as it is easy to forget the back of knees, and the back is the overall most common site to develop melanoma, and basal cell carcinoma.

The FDA does not have time to review manufacturer data, which raises the importance of the Consumer Report list-this year, 60 products were tested, and 23 tested less than half of their labeled SPF number. In absence of the list, you should think about using a SPF of 50, so that even if the manufacturer overstates the concentration, you will probably have enough for sufficient coverage.

Haddam Annual Budget Town Meeting Results and New Mill Rate

The Town of Haddam held its Annual Budget Town Meeting on May 26th in person at Haddam Fire Station #1. There was a nice turnout to vote on

two budget items. The first was the Capital Improvement budget totaling \$1,021,991 which passed unanimously with no discussion. The second item was the Town Budget recommended by the Board of Finance for the fiscal

year July 1, 2021 – June 30, 2022. This also passed unanimously without any discussion.

The Town Meeting was adjourned, and the Board of Finance convened to set the mill rate for fiscal year 2021-

2022. After 4 years of no rate increase, the Board voted to approve an increase of 0.47 mills setting the new mill rate at 32.16 for the upcoming fiscal year which represents a 1.49% increase.



Haddam: May 21, 2021 Covid-19 Update

(May 21, 2021) — It's about time for an uplifting Covid-19 announcement. A year ago, there were about 2,000 Covid patients hospitalized in Connecticut, we worried about overloading the medical system. After a difficult month, month and a half the weather warmed, we got outside more and the daily case count dropped dramatically. It stayed low through the summer. The fall brought a second wave with much higher daily case counts than the first wave but fewer deaths. We've learned how to better treat the disease. In December the vaccines arrived and the cases began to drop.

Today 50% of Connecticut's population is fully vaccinated, another 10% have gotten their first shot. There are only 141 Covid patients in Connecticut hospitals. Masks are no longer required, with some exceptions, for fully vaccinated individuals. (I'd suggest a mask burning party but the fire danger is high in the spring.) The New York Times published an article today titled "The pandemic may now be in permanent retreat in the U.S." which included the graph to the left.

Cases in town are declining as well. We've come a long way. The pandemic isn't over, the variants may present a problem but the future is certainly brighter than it was a year ago.

DPH Releases New Guidance Document Regarding Mask Rules in Connecticut

The Department of Public Health released a new document today updating guidelines regarding COVID-19, mask rules and social distancing, among other significant standards put in place during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Mask-wearing rules are relaxed as of May 19 for residents and visitors to Connecticut who are fully vaccinated, meaning those who are at least two weeks past their second dose of the Pfizer or Moderna vaccines or the single-dose Johnson & Johnson vaccine.

"Toward Zero Deaths" Campaign Launched By Department of Transportation

The Connecticut Department of Transportation has launched the "Toward Zero Deaths" campaign, part of the 2021 Strategic Highway Safety Plan. This national strategy, adopted locally, aims to reduce serious injuries and deaths in Connecticut that are traffic-related with an ultimate goal of reaching zero. The campaign matches the highway safety plans, which aims to improve education, enforcement, engineering and emergency response initiatives to enhance safety on the roads. This comes as 2020 saw 308 lives lost on Connecticut roads and highways, the most in a decade.

Carole is a self-professed "type A" personality. Before she retired, Carole held many jobs, including as

an estimator for a book-binding company, a nationally certified hypnotist, counseling people on weight loss, and a partner in a graphic design firm, while raising her two sons. She was also a speaker on "how we create our own reality." Now she is writing books, learning how to market them through Facebook and Amazon, and she also paints and adds to her gallery on fineartamerica.com.

Amazon's list of books that comes up from a search is the product of an algorithm. Authors who receive good "verified" reviews get closer to the top of the list, so if you read one of Carole's books and feel inclined, leave a comment on Amazon. Her books are available on Amazon in print, as well as Kindle. "I'm working on getting them in bookstores," said Carole. "I'm constantly in a learning

curve to accomplish visibility."

After "Who Took Hannah," readers asked for a sequel so they could find out "what happens next," but she decided to take a break from that series and publish "Secrets of Skinny" because "I've watched people struggle with weight and dieting and wanted to pass on what I learned." So she completed this book in three months.

"Secrets of Skinny" is a thin volume, and it doesn't contain any recipes. It does, however, talk about the most popular diets out there, and exercise. But it's not really exercising; it's more about moving, according to Carole. She also talks about attitude and how important it is. She makes a pretty good argument. If you want to learn more, you know where to look!


