Six HKHS Athletes Are Going to the Outdoor Nationals in Oregon

(June 16, 2021) — The National Scholastic Athletics Foundation (NSAF) will host the Outdoor Nationals, presented by Nike to be held June 30 to July 3, 2021 at the University of Oregon in Eugene, Oregon this year. Five of our Haddam Killingworth High School athletes have qualified: Kedarjah Lewis (senior), Matthew Jennings (senior), Eamon Sweeney (senior), Kevin Cavrell (junior), and John Kowal (senior). Max Cozean (senior) will attend as an alternate for the relay team.

The last time HKHS sent athletes to the National Championships was in 2016 when it was held in Greensboro, NC. They sent a girls and boys distance medley relay team, and the boys 4x800 relay team.

According to the NSAF website, "Wednesday

will be Throws Day, followed by Jumps Day (Thursday), Sprints/Hurdles Day (Friday) and Distance Day (Saturday). The relays and multis will be interspersed throughout the weekend."

Kedarjah Lewis will be competing in the long jump at the meet. Kedarjah qualified with her jump of 19'1" which won the State Open Championship last week and also broke her own previous school record. Kedarjah also won that event at the Class M State Championship meet and at the Shoreline Championship meet won the 100/200/long jump & triple jump. Kedarjah will be attending Iona College next year where she will be playing soccer and running track.

Kedarjah started playing soccer when she was 9 years old on the HK travel soccer team. "From there I moved my way up to premier and regional soccer," said Kedarjah. "I played three years of high school soccer where I went All State twice, [and] I was awarded the gold boot award twice."

Jason Lonergan met Kedarjah when she was in about 4th grade, when Kedarjah became friends with Jason's daughter at Haddam Elementary School, and they started playing sports together. Jason coached soccer. "Once she was on the field, it was clear she was special," said Jason. "[She was] usually the fastest player on the field for starters. More impressive to me, she was a hard worker and always looked to help the team. She would look to make a pass to set up a teammate before shooting the ball herself."

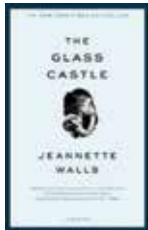
One Tin Bakes by Edd Kimber

The other day, my oldest son, Toddler Boy and I were pretending to be detectives. Specifically, we were "sleuthing," as we like to call it: attempting to find buried toy treasures (or old cereal and the inevitably squished-dried-out-squished again fruit snack) throughout our home. The locations for such finds cover a range – corners of couches, inside the ottoman, or underneath the Mommy chair. On occasion, we discover blocks or construction men near the milk and juice in the fridge. Even the kitchen stockpot serves as a stopping point for Toddler Boy's cars and trucks. This practice of sleuthing is a great activity because parent and child can play it both inside and outside – it is a classic all-season game, if you will. That said, I have not yet begun applying points or the concept of winning money for the yields of detective work. Rather, the joy comes from two things – the game itself and the tangible reward of the find...of course, the once-lost toy!

As we were playing, Toddler Boy said to me, "Mommy, I need a flashlight to find the toy...moon is a flashlight." I looked at him and paused for a moment. I thought to myself, "Moon is a flashlight, huh?" And then I smiled at him and exclaimed, "Yes, that is it! The moon is God's flashlight. If you need to find something when it is dark, the moon will help light your way." He said to me, "Sun is light during day, Mommy." Talk about a lightbulb moment. For this Mommy-Toddler sleuthing team, it was clear: the sun is our day light, the moon is our flashlight.

I imagine that many of us are dealing with the lingering effects of springing forward, as we once again wake during the dark and yet find it staying lighter later. The staying lighter later part is key here – that is the reward for this Spring season. When we discover renewed energy and alertness with our families, our friends, our communities, those are the finds. And these discoveries both occur in and because of, God's day light and His flash light.

Rep. Joe Courtney Hosts Zoom Session with Town Officials to Discuss Infrastructure Projects

(June 11, 2021) This morning at 10:00 a.m. Rep. Joe Courtney held a Zoom conference to discuss infrastructure projects that will benefit several Connecticut communities, including Haddam and East Haddam.

Rep. Courtney's Member Designated Project requests included in the Houses infrastructure funding package are:

- \$1.2 million in support for the Coventry Main Street Sidewalk Project, sponsored by the Town of Coventry
- \$4.9 million in support for the New London Pedestrian Bridge and Public Access Project, sponsored by the Connecticut Department of Economic and Community Development
- \$5 million to complete the East Haddam/Haddam Swing Bridge Rehabilitation Project, sponsored by the Connecticut Department of Transportation
- \$2.4 million to complete the Essex River Road Bridge and Sidewalk Project, sponsored by the Town of Essex
- \$2.3 million for Pedestrian Safety Improvements along CT-195 (Storrs Road), sponsored by the Town of Mansfield
- \$2.2 million to revitalize the Quinebaug River Trail in Plainfield, sponsored by the Town of Plainfield

The following members joined in and were allowed to speak about their town project addressing the needs and benefits of the projects:

- John Elsesser (Town Manager, Coventry)
 - Mary Ann Chinatti (Planning & Zoning Supervisor, Plainfield)
 - Tony Sheridan (President, Chamber of Commerce, ECT)
 - Ryan Aylesworth (Town Manager, Mansfield)
 - Bill Warner (Town Planner, Haddam)
 - Norm Needleman (First Selectman, Essex)
- Haddam Town Planner, Bill Warner spoke to Representative Courtney about how funding to

refurbish the Swing bridge will greatly benefit both Haddam and East Haddam.

He emphasized how State and Federal partnerships can be of great aide to local communities. For

examples, he cited the problems in Tylerville which have prevented the area from thriving. He stressed that infrastructure spending can improve the lives of people highlighting the gains from funding we received for the Tylerville water project. As a result of the financial aid from both State and Federal governments, the people in Tylerville now have clean drinking water from their taps. This has been a tremendous improvement in the area and changes are already beginning to happen.

He also addressed the dangerous conditions created by vehicles speeding through the intersection of Saybrook Road and CT 82 in attempts to avoid bridge closures. When it is closed for boat traffic it creates a lot of congestion in the area. When it is stuck no one can get across the river and the whole transportation network shuts down.

Other examples of future projects and improvements he spoke about include:

- Refurbishing the 100-year-old East Haddam/Haddam Swing Bridge.
- Building sidewalks along CT 82 from Saybrook Road down to the railroad crossing.
- Construction of a cantilever bridge to allow pedestrians to cross over the river safely.

CT Department of Transportation's East Haddam Swing Bridge Project initiative will improve safety, access, and operations for vehicles, pedestrians, and bicyclists traveling on Route 82. This requires major refurbishing of the bridge to extend service life and improve roadway ride-ability for the public. Additionally, it will improve swing span operation reliability thus reducing the number of closures due to mechanical problems.

"One by one we are taking care of issues," Warner told Courtney. Haddam applied and received a TAP grant from the Federal Government to construct the sidewalks along Bridge Road from Saybrook Road to the railroad tracks. The job is slated to go out to bid in the fall and will be under construction next

year. When completed we will be one step closer to having a safe way to walk towards the river and it will help connect things in the area together.

Warner added "we applied for Federal Build Grants for 3 years to create a pedestrian walkway on the bridge." The money we receive will pay for the sidewalks to continue from the railroad tracks at Goodspeed Station in Haddam, up to the bridge, giving access to a cantilever sidewalk which will be added to the south side of the bridge. On the East Haddam side, another access sidewalk will continue from the bridge to the delivery driveway at the Goodspeed Opera House.

People on both sides of the river have expressed their desire to be able to bicycle or walk across the bridge to enjoy the amenities both towns offer. The improvements will allow actors at Goodspeed in East Haddam to safely walk over and shop in Haddam, and Essex Steam Train passengers and Riverhouse guests can walk over and visit Goodspeed and East Haddam Village.

The estimated time for the project to be completed is three years beginning in the Spring of 2022 through Fall 2024. For more information on the East Haddam Swing Bridge project go to: www.easthaddamswingbridgeproject.com

As a result of the infrastructure improvements, a multi-family apartment complex (80 apartments) will be built in Tylerville. People who will live there will have access to the sidewalks where they can walk to river. Another 40 units development is in the planning stages and P&Z will address this next month. These two housing developments will be our largest taxpayers.

The improvements in infrastructure in Haddam, such as providing clean drinking water, or building sidewalks have drawn the attention of private sector investors. Warner emphasized that "when the government makes the investment the private sector

Seeing Red-

We are getting to that time of year when the red eyes are out! When associated with sneezing or discharges, it usually something that is a momentary attack of allergies or a dip in the not fully chlorinated swimming pool, a quick trip to the doctor is in order. But, because this symptom can be severe it takes a doctor to make that differential diagnosis. Many of the most serious occurrences of red eye do not have a discharge, and typically the presence of a discharge is more an indication of conjunctivitis, which is not life threatening.

Some serious Red Eye Conditions-

- 1) **Corneal Ulcers-** most commonly occurs in patients who sleep overnight with their contact lenses, but not necessarily. Patients present with blurred vision, pain, and sensitivity to light.
- 2) **Herpetic Eye-** This occurs mainly in patients with a history of cold sores, lid vesicles, or in patients on immunosuppressant therapy. The doctor will inquire as to presence of symptoms prior to red eye forming, such as pain, numbness or tingling of the eye.
- 3) **Acute Angle Closure-** This is a very severe condition that results in very high intra-ocular pressure, which has potential to threaten vision. You might notice that eye feels hard when pressing against it with lid closed.

So by now, you should have made the mental note. If you get red eye- good opportunity to see the doctor, but remember the symptoms.

recover. She eventually got out there and started breaking records.”

“Originally Track was supposed to be a way for me to stay in shape for soccer,” said Kedarjah, “but as the season went on, I fell in love with the track atmosphere. Everyone was super nice and supportive of each other. I love being able to compete on my own because it meant that I had to take full responsibility for my bad performances just as much as my good performances.”

Kedarjah was voted MVP twice. She holds the school record for the 55m dash (7.24), 300m (42.0), 100m dash (12.43), and the long jump (19’1”). “Long jump is my favorite event so I was pretty pumped when I qualified for Nationals,” said Kedarjah. “I’m very excited to attend Nationals. I’m even more excited to see my teammates compete.”

“Watching [Kedarjah] fall in love with a sport she was trying out for the first time last Indoor season has been a tremendous experience to be a part of,” said Asst. Coach Evan Woicik. “Her very first meet, she jumped 14’11”, so to have won State Open with a jump of 19’1” is pretty incredible, considering there was no spring season or much of a winter season this past year [due to COVID]. This accomplishment, along with her many others, is a testament to her drive and determination in pursuing something she became passionate about.”

“Coaching is the easiest job in the world when you have kids that have not only an incredible amount of talent but also put their heart into doing everything that is necessary to succeed,” continued Asst. Coach Woicik.

Eamon Sweeney will be competing in the decathlon at nationals, Outdoor Track Coach Matt Diglio told us. “Decathlon is 10 different events held over 2 days: 100m, long jump, high jump, javelin, 110 hurdles, 400m, shot put, discus, pole vault and 1500m. Eamon is the State Open champion in the 110 hurdles (14.42) where he set the school record and at the Class M State Championships he won the javelin and 300 hurdles to earn All State honors.” Eamon also holds the school record for 300 hurdles

(39.67). Eamon will be attending the University of Maine and will be competing on their track team.

Eamon has been on the Track and Cross Country teams for all of high school. “I am excited about Nationals because it really is a once in a lifetime opportunity and I am glad that we have the chance to represent H-K out with the best of the best,” said Eamon.

On Wednesday, June 16, 2021, Eamon finished the CIAC (state) Boys Decathlon Championship in first place, with a score of 6365 (the nearest competitor had 5507 points). To see the scores/distances from the individual events, please click [HERE](#).

Matthew Jennings will be competing in the 800 meter run where he is currently ranked 9th in the country with his time of 1:51.07, Coach Diglio explained. “That time placed 2nd in the State Open Championships last week. Matthew also won the 800 at the Class M State Championship meet to earn All State honors and he also broke his own school record in that event.” Matthew will be attending Yale University next year, studying Ethics, Politics, and Economics where he will also be a member of the Division 1 cross country and track teams.

“I started running alongside my mother when I was very young, just to stay in shape for other sports (soccer and basketball mostly),” said Matthew. “As I moved through middle school, I began to fall in love with competitive running, and I knew I wanted to continue on that path into high school. Freshman year, I was a member of the Varsity Cross Country team that had a lot of success — winning States, 5th at State Opens, New England Qualifiers — which cemented my love of racing.”

“As I moved through high school, I’ve been lucky enough to find success in the sport — mostly thanks to the expertise and unyielding support of Coach Matt Diglio,” continued Matthew. He holds school records in 5k, 800m (1:51.07), 1600m (4:14.79), 1000m (2:28.80), SMR (3:29.20). “After Indoor Track Nationals got cancelled my junior year due to COVID-19, I’ve been hungry to get another qualifying standard and compete against the best in

the nation. In Eugene, I’ll have the opportunity to do that, and take a shot at some of the loftiest goals I’ve set for myself.”

The boys sprint medley relay team of John Kowal, Kevin Cavrell, Eamon Sweeney and Matthew Jennings with an alternate of Max Cozean also qualified for the National Championship meet on June 13 at the Danbury Dream Invitational. “Their time of 3:29.20 crushed the previous school record of 3:45 and missed the CT state record by 2 seconds,” said Coach Diglio.

John Kowal told us that he started his athletic career in third grade playing soccer, which continued until his senior year. He ran Cross Country in 5th and 6th grade, but was back to soccer for 7th and 8th grade. “I started Track my freshman year and competed every season except my junior year due to COVID,” said John. “Our soccer team won Shoreline finals this year. I was captain for Outdoor Track this season. I competed in various events such as the 100m, 200m, 4x100, 4x400 and long jump.”

“It’s hard to believe six kids from Higganum are going to Nationals,” continued John. “At the beginning of this school year we didn’t know if we were even going to have seasons for sports [due to COVID] and now I am walking away from my senior year with two Shoreline titles and a States title, along with the unforgettable memory of going to Nationals. For most of us going, this is a once in a lifetime experience.”

Kevin Cavrell has been playing football and running track since his freshman year of high school, he told us. “This year I started the season fresh off of shoulder surgery so I wasn’t really where I wanted to be until the last stretch of the season during the championship meets,” said Kevin. “I definitely feel like I am peaking at the right point in the season, with my times improving steadily every meet.”

About the season as a whole, Kevin said, “In hindsight I feel as though this year played itself out better than any of us could have imagined, with both the Boys and Girls winning Shorelines, the Boys team going on to win States for the first time in 33 years, and capping off the year by sending six athletes to Nationals. I am definitely excited to go to Nationals.”

Beth Gagliardi, a teacher at Haddam Killingworth Middle School has set up a GoFundMe page to help the athletes and coaches afford the travel and accommodation expenses while competing in Oregon.

The Seven Sea Dogs of Tylerville

1583 Saybrook Road — David Tyler House

(June 15, 2021) — The Tylerville Section of Haddam has a long history associated with shipbuilding and the maritime trade. Many members of the Tyler Family were sea captains, sailors, or shipbuilders. Simon Tyler who lived in the area at the time of the Revolution was a successful privateer who captained the ship Success and captured a number British cargo vessels. Simon and his wife had seven sons and at least two daughters. All seven sons worked in the maritime trade either shipbuilding or sailing and became known as the Seven Sea Dogs of Tylerville. Their names were Daniel, Samuel, Simon, Selden, David, Warren and Heman. Four of the “Sea Dogs” built homes which remain standing in Tylerville.

1557 Saybrook Road is the Warren Tyler House built around 1825. Warren was the second youngest of the “Sea Dogs” and was a master carpenter by trade having worked on several vessels including the Florida, Manchester and Susan M Tyler (named for his daughter.) The Tyler’s were savvy business men and would invest in building brigs and schooners which they sailed to New York and sold at a nice profit. This house remains a private home.

1583 Saybrook Road is the David Tyler House built circa 1808 at the time of his marriage to Dolly Clark. Two of his seafaring sons died young with one dying at sea, his body wrapped in tar and sent home

to Tylerville for burial. The other boy, took ill at sea but was able to return home to die. This property is the former location of the Merchant House.

1588 Saybrook Road is known as the Simon Tyler House and was built around 1800. Simon was a ship captain like his namesake father and was active in the river trade. He later sold the house to his brother Selden, also a ship captain. This building was later the home of Connecticut Valley Arms and is now professional offices.

1610 Saybrook Road is the Daniel Tyler House which was built around 1805 at the time of his marriage to Charlotte Barrett. The house remained in the family until 1900. The building has also been converted to commercial use and many may remember it as the Country Store and Restaurant or Wheatmarkert. It is now home to the Cooking Company.

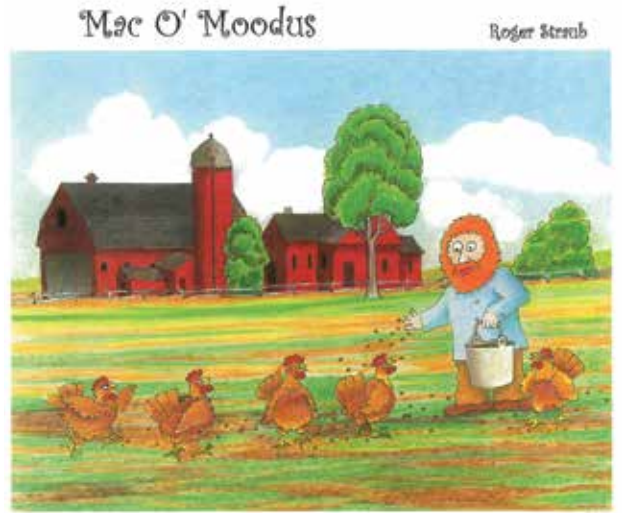
Tylerville is experiencing a wave of development including new sidewalks, roundabouts and
