Beautifully Born Doula Services

Merriam Webster dictionary defines a doula as "a person trained to provide advice, information, emotional support, and physical comfort to a mother before, during, and just after childbirth."

Jessica James of Haddam became "passionate about pregnancy and childbirth after having my own four children," she told us. "Each pregnancy and birth was so unique, but my fourth was an incredibly positive experience because I was able to birth naturally, with the support of my wonderful husband. This experience, along with attending the labor of a close friend who was using a doula,

awakened in me a desire to see more women with a birth experience."

Educator so that she can teach Childbirth Education classes at a local hospital. There are over 80 organizations that certify doulas in the United States.

Before spending 10 years at home with her kids, Jessica was an elementary teacher and a chiropractic assistant. "I feel as though both of those jobs prepared me well for my role as a doula," said Jessica. She and her husband, Joshua, have four kids ranging in age from 3-10 years old. She has been homeschooling them for five years.

"Doulas utilize physical comfort measures and offer emotional/mental support and encouragement," explained Jessica. "The role of a birth doula is also to provide evidencebased information to expectant parents during pregnancy, in order to help them feel educated and prepared to make decisions during labor and delivery, which can typically be a very overwhelming process."

The doula doesn't just help the expectant mother. "Besides being an advocate for the mom-to-be, a doula can also be a huge benefit for fathers, who may feel a little unsure of how to help during the process," said Jessica. "Having a birth doula has many proven benefits for mom and baby, as it lessens the chances of having a C-section or other interventions, shortens the time of labor,

According to centerforhealthjournalism.org, "the benefits are greatest for low-income women, women of color, and those who face cultural or language barriers — in short, women at highest risk of complications during pregnancy and childbirth."

Family grateful for community support after farm stand robbery

Mary and Charlie Rickert run a family-owned and operated farm stand that's easy to find in Killingworth. Just drive north on Route 81, pass the Congregational Church and look to your right. There you'll see a wooden red cart just off the road, with a sign that reads "Leightsinger Farm."

You can't miss it. Except now you can.

The sign is gone. The "Open" flag that flew above it has been removed. And the bins are empty. There are no vegetables. There is no corn. And there is no Mary or Charlie Rickert.

In short, the stand is closed.

The Rickerts on Thursday were victimized by their fourth robbery since Memorial Day weekend, with thieves ripping a secured cash box from their stand and stealing upwards of \$250 in cash. Charlie Rickert made the discovery early that evening and reported the incident to police.

The impact was immediate. The Rickerts closed the stand permanently, notifying the public in an emotional Facebook post.

"It was extremely devastating," said a distraught Mary Rickert.

Almost immediately, there was a response – with dozens of local residents taking to the internet to express their outrage, sympathy and support. As of Saturday evening, there were nearly 250 "likes" of the Facebook post and 106 comments, with more than a handful of concerned individuals offering to make donations.



doula services in maternity coverage. The March of Dimes has also called for increased access to doula care.

Though at this time Jessica is the only doula in her business, she does have a back-up doula if an unexpected situation comes up. She meets with the client at her house or theirs, and when they go into labor, she joins them at their home, the hospital, or a place of their choosing for the birth.

"Childbirth is one of the most significant events in a woman's life, and unfortunately, many women have traumatic experiences surrounding birth," said Jessica. "I'm hoping to use my skills and passion about pregnancy and childbirth, to help normalize birth as the physiologic process that it is and reduce the fear behind birth to help women have a more positive birth experience."

During this study, it was found that new mothers expected their nurse to spend over half of their time offering support, but only 6-10% of the nurse's time was actually engaged in labor support activities. This study showed that "The evidence suggests that it is likely more than the emotional, physical, and informational support doulas give to women during the birthing process that accounts for the reduced need for clinical procedures during labor and birth, fewer birth complications, and more satisfying experiences during labor, birth, and postpartum. The

doula empowers decisions that are made in the best interest of both the mother and her child."

"Being a teacher greatly influenced my ability to relate to people of all ages with compassion and patience," said Jessica. "Teaching also produced in me the ability to relay information in a clear and understandable way." She went on to say that in addition to her degree in education, she also worked as a chiropractic assistant for many years, and took Anatomy and Physiology courses. "I believe all of these skills will greatly enhance my work as a doula."

"I became a birth doula with the hope that I can use my education, passion, and personal experience to support other laboring moms," said Jessica. *Photos provided by Jessica James*.



Introducing HKYFS's New Prevention Coordinator Matt McEwen

To the HK Community,

I am truly grateful to return to the HK community as the Prevention Coordinator for Youth and Family Services. As a 2010 HKHS graduate, I feel honored to give back to the community that prepared me to face the challenges of today's complex world. Over the past few months, I have enjoyed connecting and reconnecting with so many friends and neighbors in the community. And, as we move into another school year, I look forward to meeting even more of you!

As Prevention Coordinator, I am tasked with coordinating a community coalition that supports specific projects related to youth mental health promotion and the prevention of alcohol, tobacco/ vaping, marijuana, prescription drug misuse, and other illicit drug use—especially among our community's youth. The HK Community Coalition, therefore, will work together to implement evidence-based community-level programs aimed at addressing these issues head-

The substance abuse epidemic became personal to me in 2018, as it has with countless others across the country, when I received word that my best friend and college roommate succumbed to the disease of addiction and died as the result of an overdose. I have felt the pain of losing a loved one to a preventable disease. Unfortunately, the HK community also struggles with this epidemic.

According to data from a survey administered in 2021, 21% of HK youth in grades 7-12 reported using alcohol once or more in the last 30 days. Furthermore, 18% of our youth reported riding (once or more in the last 12 months) with a driver

who had been drinking. These figures are startling and deserve our attention as these are some of the predictors of additional risky behaviors in the future. Fortunately, the field of prevention provides an answer and a reason to be hopeful.

Today, we have the tools to prevent tragedies like this from occurring. Preventative practices became more sophisticated as the country collectively grappled with the consequences of the drastic rise in substance abuse from coast to coast. However, a significant caveat remains: the success of these efforts depends on the willingness of a community to work together to achieve a common goal. A diverse coalition that represents all sectors of the HK community is absolutely key. It is for this reason that I am reaching out to ask you to volunteer to help your community by serving on the coalition.

I have tremendous faith in our community. I know that together we can rise out of this

pandemic and work to create a healthier community. A community that works to tackle the issues our youth face head-on and prepare them to reach their full potential. Needleman Update: Covid-19 and Broadband benefit information

Connecticut Implementing CDC Recommendations on Third COVID-19 Vaccine Dose for Immunocompromised

Over the weekend, the state implemented recommendations released last week by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention regarding administration of third doses of COVID-19 vaccines to individuals who are moderately or severely immunocompromised. The emergency use authorization for the Moderna and Pfizer mRNA vaccines allow for individuals including recipients of organ transplants and others with conditions leaving them potentially susceptible to the virus, specifically the more virulent Delta variant, who have received two vaccine doses to receive a third dose of the Moderna or Pfizer vaccine. This guidance does not apply to the Johnson & Johnson one-dose vaccine, though it is expected more information will be made available.

Individuals meeting criteria for an additional dose can make appointments or attend walkin clinics at any provider location including pharmacies, federally qualified health centers or doctors' offices. Individuals unsure of whether they meet the criteria should consult with their health care provider.

CDC Recommends Pregnant Women Receive COVID-19 Vaccine Amid Increased Infections, No Evidence Vaccines Impact Fertility

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention this week recommended pregnant women and women planning to get pregnant should receive one of the COVID-19 vaccines amid increasing numbers of infections nationwide, with expectant

women running higher risks of severe illnesses and pregnant complications if they are infected. The CDC added that 2,500 women who received the vaccine in a study showed no increased risks of miscarriage when receiving a COVID-19 vaccine, with analysis showing the women's outcomes were the same as women who did not receive the vaccine. Previously, the CDC encouraged pregnant women consider the vaccine; now, it fully advises them to take it on the strength of the new study.

Emergency Broadband Benefit

If your family, or a family you know, may require support in paying for broadband internet service – which remains an important tool during the pandemic for employment, education and entertainment – the Emergency Broadband Benefit may be able to help. This Federal Communications Commission program provides federal assistance to households struggling to afford internet service or electronic devices. It provides up to \$50/month discounts for broadband services, up to \$75/month discounts for households on qualifying Tribal lands and potential one-time discounts of up to \$100 for laptops, tablets or desktop computers purchased through participating providers.

Eligible households include those with incomes at/below 135% of the Federal Poverty Guidelines; receiving benefits under free or reduced-price school lunch or breakfast programs; receiving Federal Pell Grants; experiencing substantial loss of income due to job loss or furlough since February 29, 2020; or meeting eligibility criteria for providers' existing low-income or COVID-19 programs. In order to apply, families can call 833-511-0311 or visit GetEmergencyBroadband.org.

From the Desk of Bob McGarry: Haddam Update

I hope you're enjoying your summer. It's been a while since I last wrote about what's happening in town so it's time for an update. I'll start with projects.

Rossi Property – The environmental analysis of the property continues. Rossi Lumber Co is remediating the areas that were identified in the Phase 2 analysis. They're doing further investigation into the historic fill the property is built on and testing nearby wells for any sign of pollutants that may have come from the property. Our environmental consultants are monitoring their work. We have a developer who is interested in purchasing approximately two acres of the property along Saybrook Road for retail development.

Scovil Hoe – We've applied for a \$1.8 million brownfields grant from the Department of Economic and Community Development (DECD). DECD is in favor of our project but before they award the grant we need to have a developer partnering with us to develop the property after it's cleaned. We put out a notice asking interested companies to send us their qualifications and experience with brownfield projects. The responses are due September 1st. I've already had a developer express interest in the Scovil project.

Community Septic – We received a \$128,205 grant from the Department of Public Health to fund the design of the community septic system at HES. Three engineering firms responded to our RFQ. The Board of Selectman met on 8/18 and selected Jacobson and Associates, Inc. to do the design. We'll have a public hearing and town meeting in September to create a Water Pollution Control Authority (WPCA). State law requires us to have a WPCA if we have a community septic system.

Bridge Road Sidewalks – CT DOT has approved our design for the sidewalks on Bridge Road. We'll be putting the project out to bid shortly. Expect construction to begin next spring and be completed in the fall.

Swing Bridge Rehabilitation/Tylerville Roundabouts – These are two CT DOT projects

that are currently in the final design phase. The Swing Bridge Rehabilitation construction will start spring of 2022 and take three years to complete. The roundabouts construction will start in the spring of 2023 and continue until the fall of 2024. More information on these projects can be found on our website.

Commercial Projects - There are three commercial projects that will have significant impact on the town. Two of them are multi-family housing in Tylerville. One is on Brookes Court and has been approved for 56 units. They expect to break ground for first of three buildings in September. The second apartment complex is a 40-unit development planned for 105 Bridge Road. The third project is the Hope Garden Wellness Center going into the office building at 7 Island Dock Road. The developer plans to start the \$3.5 million conversion of the building this month.

American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) – We received the first of two annual payments under ARPA. We'll get a total of \$2.4 million. I'm waiting until the Treasury Department finalizes the guidance on how the funds can be spent before we start discussing how to best use the money. Ultimately, that discussion will include the Board of Finance and quite possibly a town meeting.

McCane Property Purchase – The voters at the July 15th special town meeting approved purchasing the McCane property next to the Higganum Cove for \$21,000. The purchase furthers our efforts to preserve the cove.

Covid-19 – I'll end with what's happening with the pandemic. Fueled by the Delta variant, cases are rising throughout Connecticut, Middlesex County and Haddam. On July 14th there were 30 Covid patients hospitalized in Connecticut, on August 18th there were 348. In town we had a 65-day period with no new cases reported. That ended on July 19th. We've had 17 cases since. Please be careful and get vaccinated if you can. Nutmeg Pharmacy is still offering vaccinations and testing.

Again, have a good summer. The Haddam Neck Fair is coming up on Labor Day weekend and River Days later in September (tentatively 9/18). Get out and enjoy some of the festivities we missed last year!

Haddam receives Affordable Housing Plan Technical Assistance Grant

"Congratulations !!! On behalf of Commissioner Seila Mosquera-Bruno, we are pleased to inform you that: Town of Haddam has been awarded the Affordable Housing Plan Technical Assistance Grant in the amount of \$15,000."

On August 18, 2021, Bill Warner, Haddam Town Planner, posted the above information on social media.

Public Act 17-170 and Statute 8-30J established a requirement that all Connecticut municipalities adopt Affordable Housing Plans. The initial deadline is June 1, 2022 to adopt each municipality's initial Plan,

and then they will need to update it every 5 years after that. The State allows the plans to be updated concurrently with the Plans for Conservation and Development.

In 2020, the state announced availability of grant funding on a first-come, first-served basis to support municipalities preparing the Plans. A second round of funding was announced in 2021 with an application deadline of August 31. The funds will become available on October 1.

"We will need to decide how to proceed," said Bill. "I would like to use the funds for more out-ofthe-box ideas rather than the same old same old recommendations."

Common Injuries to Watch Out For with Children Involved in a Collision By Attorney Sylvia K. Rutkowska

- 6. Psychological injuries Crashes are often traumatic events and emotional trauma can arise hours or even days after.

Family grateful for community support after farm stand robbery

In fact, one already has.

When Mary went to the stand Friday morning to clean out what was left, she found a business card from Bob and Kathy Tobey of Hollow Tree Farm, with a substantial donation attached. The Rickerts have never met the Tobeys and know little about their farm, one reason Mary was overwhelmed by the gesture. But the other was the hand-printed message on the back of the card.

"Please don't give up," it read. "We are all behind you."

That response has been repeated over and over by others, either through texts, e-mails or Facebook comments, and it has Mary Rickert thinking about reconsidering her decision to shutter the stand

"I was surprised at how many people good people there are," she said. "Instead of focusing on the bad that happened I was overwhelmed by the good people of this town and the surrounding towns."

That attitude is a marked departure from her initial response. When she first was learned of the robbery, she was crushed — breaking down in tears as she told her husband to close the stand permanently. She and daughter Jessica had started it seven years ago, and Jessica made her promise to keep it open before succumbing to cancer four summers ago at 42.

And she had. Until now.

"It's very emotional because of my daughter," said Mary. "The farm was started because of her. So the first thing that came to my mind when this happened was Jessica. It was a flashback to me."

But there was another flashback that was nearly as meaningful. When someone asked Mary how her late grandmother would advise her – the same grandmother after whom Leightsinger Farm is named - she knew the answer. And, suddenly, what seemed like a logical decision became more complicated, demanding time before a resolution was made.

"My grandmother would say, 'Get back on the

horse," said Mary. "She used to say that all the time: 'Don't be afraid of that. Get back on the horse.' A lot of people said, 'Please do not shut down the stand.' So I would like some time to think about it and consider my options."

Nevertheless, she already made one decision: She's asking persons interested in making donations to show their support instead by appearing at Leightsinger Farm on Saturday, Sept. 11, 2021 between 10:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m. to buy a combination of hamburger and corn. It will be the

Rickerts' last sale of produce for the year, though they plan to participate in the Nov. 13 Killingworth Farm Tour.

"I want to thank everybody for supporting us," Mary Rickert said, "but I don't want to make this a sympathy thing. I think it's important to have clean food, and it's my way of giving back to the community in my daughter's name." Photo by Clark Judge.

On the road with Haddam Historical Society: The Ezra Kelsey house

On August 5, 2021 Marge DeBold, owner of the historic Ezra Kelsey house in Higganum, hosted the 4th great-granddaughter of the building's original builder. Sarah Wyeth of Baltimore, Maryland and friend, Arthur Mahon of Madison, CT drove to Higganum for the afternoon to visit the family ancestral home and learn more about the Kelsey Family and area.

Mrs. Wyeth, who was working on her family genealogy, googled Ezra Kelsey and came across a description of his house which listed the current owners. She wrote to Marge asking if she could stop by for a visit and Marge, the consummate hostess and gracious person she is, said yes. Sarah and Art spent a lovely afternoon touring the house and grounds.

The main block of the Ezra Kelsey House, which was built in 1815, was occupied by the Kelsey Family for four generations until Marge and her husband, Richard DeBold, purchased it in 1964. Ezra Kelsey was a blacksmith who had

a shop at Higganum Landing where he supplied the shipbuilding industry. The rear ell of the house may be considerably older and is thought to have been moved to its present location from the river's edge. From the 1940s to early 1960s Burnette Kelsey ran a private kindergarten in the house. Highlights of the visit included viewing the Wedgewood plaques set into the fireplace surround and the door jamb at the front entrance with many height markings of the Kelsey Family and friends going back over 100 years.

The town of Haddam, including Higganum and Haddam Neck, has many wonderful historic buildings and homes which have significance not only locally but to people across the country. I have had numerous descendants of former owners stop by my home to share photos and stories. Sarah and Art enjoyed their visit with Marge so much, they plan on returning very soon.
