#### Historic Women of Killingworth: Ruth Warner Robinson

Editor's Note: This is the fourth in a series about the Historic Women of Killingworth. In 2001 Sandy Smith proposed making small replicas of Historical Killingworth Women. Each doll was sold for \$15 as a fundraiser for the Historical Society. Five dolls were made, one for each year 2001-2005. The first, second, and third article can be found on hk-now.com. Below is the information that was included with the Ruth Warner Robinson doll.

#### **RUTH WARNER ROBINSON** FOLK ARTIST, SCULPTOR, ILLUSTRATOR, POET, STORYTELLER, WRITER OF BOOKS Our Fourth "Historic Women of Killingworth" **Christmas Doll Ornament**

Ruth W. Robinson was a lively Killingworth folk artist and is still well known to the town's old-timers for her quaint, colorful farm scene paintings and charming sculptures of farm folk and animals.

Born on Christmas Day, 1906, Ruth was the daughter of Harris J. and Florence H. Warner. She lived on a 100-acre farm in the Mount Carmel section of Hamden, CT, until her father decided to sell the farm because automobiles were taking over the roads. (Harris peddled his vegetables and dairy






products driving to New Haven on his wagon.) The 1920 census reveals the family living on a farm in Killingworth (now the Country Squire), which Ruth described "as going back in time to a generation before." To quote from her book, Tomorrow Became Yesterday: "Pa and Ma wanted no modern interference in their rearing of us. They felt fortunate

to have found a farm for sale in a community so far removed from the changing cultures becoming so evident in the more urbanized areas."

Ruth's memories of both farms are captured in her oil paintings, as



well as her short stories, books, and wood carvings. Her inspirations were simple pleasures of living the country life....the scent of flowers, plowing, haying, berry picking, the birds, and farm animals. Quoting from Chapters From My Childhood: "I like to scoop up the memories of my childhood, as though in my hands, allowing the little hardships and unhappiness's to sift away through my fingers, saving only the memories worth retaining to be relived over again."

In the late 1920's Ruth met her future husband, Frank G. Robinson, while staying with her aunt and uncle in Vermont. Later, they were blessed with a beloved daughter, Emogene, and settled in Killingworth in 1938.

This year's doll is a replica of a child character (could she be Ruth herself?) from one of Ruth's many books. Dressed in dark stockings, boots, apron, and braids, we put "Ruth" on a swing to express the great joy that lived inside her. She is signed and dated on the bottom of the swing.

#### Official Statement by Rep. Christine Palm Concerning Reg. 17 BOE

(July 23, 2021) The recent nomination of the three Republican candidates for the local Region 17 Board of Education is cause for grave concern. To be clear: fair representation on boards of ed is best achieved by having citizens of all political party affiliations serve. So, my objection is not to their party per se, but to their character and conspiracy theories they espouse. Based on information they have posted on social media, along with objec-tive media accounts, I believe these three individuals are unfit to serve the best interest of our children.

According to their own Facebook accounts, two of these three individuals attended the illegal and profoundly damaging insurrection on Jan. 6 in which an armed crowd at-tacked the U.S. Capitol, impeded the lawful swearing in of President Biden, attacked uni-formed Capitol police officers, threatened the lives of elected officials, defaced our Capi-tol and, most serious of all, caused several deaths. This insurrection was traitorous and runs counter to

#### In Response to Rep. Christine Palm's Objection to HRTC BoE Candidates

Representative Palm,

I must say that I find it disturbing that you claim to know someone's character and beliefs without having spoken a word with them. You take the word of a disgruntled few to declare people you have no idea about unfit to serve in the best interest of children. Before making such a declaration, you should have the courtesy to at least make an attempt at conversation. Since that seems beneath you, allow me to introduce myself.

My name is Chris Page and I am, and will remain a Republican Candidate for RSD17 BOE. I am a husband of 20 years, a father of two boys, 9 and 16. I have built telecommunications systems for 26 years. I served on the Board of the Silver City Quarter Midget Club as an Open Board member, Safety Director, Vice President, and Assistant Regional Director. I have lived my life trying to better the lives of children, both my own and others. I plan to continue doing so.

These individuals have also posted troubling support for the debunked "Q Anon" theories, are encouraging parents to defy science by "unmasking" their children, and have implied they will work to make sure teachers do not teach about racism as part of U.S. History classes.

Therefore, their adherence to debunked and dangerous theories, along with their admittedly proud participation in the Jan. 6 insurrection leaves no room for doubt that they are unfit to ensure that school policies and procedures reflect the values of the com-munity they serve, in compliance with state and federal laws.

The third individual, owing to public revelations of past criminal charges brought against him for alleged domestic violence, has withdrawn. He is to be commended for doing so. I hope you enjoyed the weekend. I'm pleased to share that new state investment was approved for several projects in our area including \$132,000 for the Deep River Elementary School's roof replacement project. Take a couple minutes to read below about this new funding to support the needs of our students and communities.

#### New State Funding for Deep River, Haddam, and **East Hampton**

I'm happy to report that state funding has been approved to advance projects in Deep River, Haddam, and East Hampton that will improve important town resources. First, Deep River Elementary School's roof replacement project will receive \$132,000. This funding will support ongoing work on the building's roof to repair several leaks, with the end goal of fully replacing it for long-term use.

Also, the Brainerd Memorial Library in Haddam will receive \$759,375 to continue its renovation project. The project includes the creation of a new parking lot with disabled-accessible parking spaces, a new lower-level entry plaza and public entrance, refurbishment and repositioning of public restrooms, a lower-level lobby and new exterior

The commission's approval of these bonds will allow our towns to offset taxpayer costs to make

much-needed repairs and renovations to both properties, which provide vital services to our children and their families.

In addition, \$60,000 was approved for a dam design for Hurd State Park in East Hampton. I'm pleased to see continued investment in the park, which supports the recreational and community needs of town residents and visitors.

#### **Governor's Summer STEM Challenge**

A new statewide initiative encourages students from elementary to high school to take on challenging hands-on design projects to engage with learning. Developed out of a partnership between the Governor's administration, the Office of Workforce Strategy and the Yale School of Engineering and Applied Science, web-based STEM challenges for students from grades 3-12 will be available online at www.ct.gov/SummerSTEMChallenge.

Each week will bring a new challenge incorporating the four tenets of STEM, science, technology, engineering and mathematics, and each challenge will include virtual instruction with Yale student organizations and building projects with everyday materials. Challenges will be released on Mondays and be due the following Friday; a panel of judges will choose weekly winners based on creativity and design. Each challenge winner will receive a prize and at the end of six weeks, all winners will be eligible for a grand prize.

#### **New Discoveries in Science**

#### **News from NASA**

July 21, 2021 - NASA's agency officials announced that the Perseverance rover is preparing to collect its first samples on Mars, a milestone that could happen within the next two weeks.

Perseverance launched on July 30, 2020 and landed in Jezero Crater, an ancient lakebed on Mars on February 18, 2021. The mission, to explore and scour the planet for signs of ancient life. To do this, the rover was designed to collect and store samples of Martian material to be returned to Earth by a mission in the early 2030s.

A permanent human presence on and around the moon may be established by NASA by the end of the 2020s, via a program known as Artemis. That may eventually include radio telescopes on the moon's quiet far side and possibly off-Earth science facilities.

"Under the Artemis program, humanity will explore regions of the Moon never visited before, uniting people around the unknown, the never seen, and the once impossible. We will return to the Moon robotically beginning next year, send astronauts to the surface within four years, and build a longterm presence on the Moon by the end of the decade." (NASA Administrator Jim Bridenstine)

#### **Paleontology News**

In the July 22, 2021, Scientific Reports, researchers report that Pterosaur hatchlings may have been able to fly as soon as they broke open their shells.

A fossil analysis shows the hatchlings had a stronger bone crucial for lift-off than adults.

Pterosaurs were a diverse group of ancient flying reptiles that lived alongside dinosaurs from the Triassic to the Cretaceous periods, 228 million to 66 million years ago.

#### Neuroscience News

A November 23, 2021, report in Nature

Neuroscience concluded that a hungry brain craves food, and a lonely brain craves people. Scientists used functional magnetic resonance imaging to measure neural responses evoked by food and social cues after participants experienced 10 hours of mandated fasting or total social isolation.

#### Catnip repels insects

A whiff of catnip can make mosquitoes buzz off, and now researchers know why.

The active component of catnip (Nepeta cataria) repels insects by triggering a chemical receptor that spurs sensations such as pain or itch, researchers report March 4, 2021 in Current Biology.

Catnip extracts have been proposed as a natural alternative to synthetic insect repellents such as DEET.

Determining how the plant deters insects could help researchers design potent repellents that may be easier to obtain in developing countries hit hard by mosquito-borne diseases.

#### **Unusually Large Meteor Awakens Norway Residents**

An unusually large meteor lit up the skies over Norway at 1:00 a.m. on July 25, 2021. The meteor awakened residents of the country's capital city, Oslo, with the sound of a large explosion.

Film footage shows the trail of bright flashes of light as the fireball, travelling at 43,200 miles per hour streaked across the sky. It landed somewhere in a forest near Oslo and the hunt for fragments has already begun.

#### **August 2021 Full Moon**

According to NASA, our next full Moon will appear in the sky on August 22 at 8:02 a.m. EST.

It is called a Sturgeon Moon because the giant sturgeon of the Great Lakes and Lake Champlain were most readily caught during this part of summer. Sources: www.space.com

# First "Stop the Bleed" Class of 2021 Scheduled for Aug. 14

(July 28, 2021) The Killingworth Ambulance Association resumes its "Stop the Bleed" program on Saturday, Aug. 14, with a 10:00 a.m. class at the KAA headquarters.

The course, the first of its kind this year, is open to all persons 13 years of age or older and is free of charge. However, interested persons are asked to bring protective face masks. If the class is held indoors, as it has been in the past, they will be required.

Instruction typically lasts 1-to-1-1/2 hours.

"Stop the Bleed" is a nationwide awareness campaign (www.bleedingcontrol.org) launched in 2015 by the White House and Department of Homeland Security and is designed to empower bystanders with the training to deal with traumatic events and emergency bleeding situations before help arrives.

Its value was underscored in October 2019, at Vinal Tech in Middletown when a state trooper responding to an accident there implemented a "Stop the Bleed" kit to treat what was called "a catastrophic injury" involving profuse bleeding.

Officials later said the trooper's quick thinking may have saved the victim's life.

The KAA first offered "Stop the Bleed" classes in July 2017, making Killingworth the first Connecticut town to have its citizens certified. Since then, it has conducted 22 classes and had two "Stop the Bleed" stations installed at the Killingworth Town Hall and Public Library.

(July 25, 2021) People along the Connecticut River were treated to an unusual event when a Douglas F4D Skyray aircraft floated by on a barge. Its journey began in Windsor Locks where it had been housed at the New England Air Museum. Its final destination, a new home at the Intrepid Sea, Air & Space Museum in New York City.

The decision to transport the aircraft by water rather than road was explained by the Intrepid Museum curator Eric Boehm, "It doesn't get any smaller than the way it is right now. With the wings folded, it's still 25 feet wide. You really can't truck it all the way to New York City so the best thing to do was come 17 miles that we needed to do over the road overnight." After it arrived at the Charter Oak Landing, the aircraft was loaded onto a barge in the Connecticut River by a crane.

Boehm said the trip was expected to take around 24 -30 hours and covers 177 miles. The barge passed along the Connecticut River, through Long Island Sound then down the East River, around the southern tip of Manhattan and up the Hudson River and arrived at the museum on Tuesday morning. It was to be lifted by crane and placed on board the Intrepid's flight deck where it last resided 60 years ago.

The Museum's experts will begin working to preserve the aircraft.

The acquisition was made possible by the estate of Margaret F. "Peggy" Donovan, a longtime member and supporter of the Intrepid Museum.

#### **Interesting Skyray facts:**

- The Skyray was named for its unusual wing shape which resembles a manta ray
  - They were designed to be high-altitude fleet



protector interceptors

- They went into operation with the U.S. Navy and Marine Corps in 1956
- They were designed to catch and neutralize an approaching enemy bomber flying at 500 knots
- Skyrays set many speed and time-to-climb records
- Skyrays were able to reach supersonic speeds
- The specific Skyray served in U.S. Navy Fighter Squadron 162 (VF-162)

• It deployed on Intrepid between June 1961 and March 1962 with Carrier Air Wing Six (CVW-6)


