The Welcome to Haddam signs are back on Saybrook Road (Route 154) at the Route 9 connector and on Killingworth Road (Route 81) at the town line. Both signs were struck by cars last year. Bob Waller led the effort by the Haddam Garden Club to replace them. The Garden Club was instrumental in getting the original signs designed and installed over 20 years ago. Only one of the two drivers responsible for destroying the signs was identified. CIRMA, the town's insurance company, recovered the cost of the Killingworth Road sign from his insurer. The town paid for the other sign.

teams traveled to Totoket Park in North Branford to compete in the Floyd Parness Invitational against Old Saybrook, Lyme-Old Lyme, Valley Regional, Morgan, and North Branford.

Once again the boys team ran a controlled team race over the 3 mile course to continue undefeated in their dual meet season and improve to 10-0. They

defeated Morgan by a score of 15-50, beat Old Lyme 15-50, defeated North Branford 15-50, beat Valley 15-50 and beat Old Saybrook 25-36. H-K boys ran as a pack at the front of the race and were led by freshman Sawyer DiMatteo who placed 3rd in a time of 17:20. Crossing the line together in a time of 17:20 in places 4th thru

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
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Brewed Awakening Celebrating 10 Years in Business!



September 29, 2021 Special Town Meeting

On Wednesday, September 29, 2021, a Special Town meeting was held at the Community Room in the Haddam Volunteer Fire Company Station #1 at 7:00

According to the legal notice available on www. haddam.org and published in Haddam Killingworth News, Haddam's paper of record, the purpose for the special meeting was to "consider and vote on adopting an Ordinance creating a Water Pollution Control Authority."

First Selectman Bob McGarry called the meeting to order. The Pledge of Allegiance was recited. Dave Challenger was selected as moderator of the meeting. Scott Brookes, the Town Clerk, read the legal call to the meeting. McGarry then provided context for the meeting by explaining that state statute requires creation of a water pollution control authority to oversee implementation of a community septic/sewer system. It would also be the mechanism to oversee implementation of a water system in town.

The Water Pollution Control Authority would be in existence for as long as the ordinance remains in effect and as long as a community septic/sewer system exists. In other words, disbanding this authority would require the Town to "unadopt" the ordinance.

The ordinance passed.

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



Critical to this is removing misperceptions that are fueled by political operatives and addressing them head-on.

I have chosen to run as a petitioning candidate in Haddam while not accepting endorsements from either political party because it is the authentic me and free of influence. What you will continue to get from me is someone that will listen to the facts and make educated decisions that will benefit our students and our District and its employees. What I love most about this town is when people with various backgrounds come together for a common purpose such as what happened with our vibrant Higganum Farmers Market. I've always been known as "the glue guy" in my experiences both inside and outside work for bringing a team together and making them stronger. As such, I encourage everyone to disengage from negativity and polarization on social media and focus instead on what you and others have in common, what you both want, and how to get there. People achieve great things working together and you'll be surprised to find that a lot of us want the same things instead of only focusing only on what our differences

Joanne Nesti (Petitioning Candidate): I have lived in Haddam for 40 years and have felt very fortunate to be here. I worked as a substitute teacher when I first got out of college, then went back to school and was fortunate–once again–to land a job doing radio news, which then led to television news and a career of more than 30 years in broadcasting.

My time on the Board of Education really began once I left my job and was able to start attending meetings of local boards. I realized I had been a resident of Haddam, but never really lived here until I took more of an interest in how our town works. I ask myself that all the time and work hard to make sure my sources of information are reliable. I'm asking for re-election to the Board of Education to continue to be part of its important work for the children of Haddam and Killingworth.

Jordana Fournier (Petitioning Candidate): I have proudly called Higganum home for the last 10 years. I love the small-town feel here and the exceptional sense of community that comes with it.

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
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
