# Officials Hold Deer Lake News Conference to Rally Support

Until now, the push to preserve and protect Deer Lake as an open space has been a local movement, led primarily by activists and advocates. But that changed Thursday, January 27, with national support from a forceful public figure.

U.S. Sen. Richard Blumenthal joined a coterie of local and state dignitaries on a frigid afternoon at the 255-acre Deer Lake property, promising to seek funding to keep it "a pristine treasure," as he called it, and prevent its sale to a private developer.

"To allow it to go the way of development," he said, speaking at an outdoor news conference, "would be unconscionable."

That message was echoed by others, including State Sen. Christine Cohen, State Rep. Christine Goupil, First Selectwoman Nancy Gorski, former First Selectwoman Cathy Iino and representatives from Save the Sound, Connecticut Audubon, the Connecticut Forest and Park Association, Killingworth Land Conservation Trust, Save Deer Lake and the Trust for Public Land.

"I am not anti-development," said Cohen. "I am anti-developing this property. We need to make sure that we preserve this land."

With the future of Deer Lake uncertain, the appearance of Blumenthal, as well as state and local officials, comes at a critical time. Owned by the Connecticut Yankee Council of the Boy Scouts of America, the property has been for sale since last fall – with two offers currently on the table. One is

# Haddam Volunteer Fire Company Performs Ice Safety Drills

The Town of Haddam is overflowing with more than two dozen bodies of water, from the Higganum Reservoir, to Hidden Lake, to Bible Rock Brook, Candlewood Hill Brook, Black Shop Pond, Higganum Creek, and of course, the Connecticut River.

During the winter months, such waterways may partially or completely freeze over, leaving at-risk surfaces for hikers, ice skaters, fishermen, or others participating in wintertime wayfaring.

"Even if the ground feels solid, there's always a chance of encountering soft, melted areas which may lead to someone falling through the ice," said HVFC Captain Dan Casey. "It's important to be aware of your surroundings and take extra caution near, or on, bodies of water, and especially if it's snow-covered."

In the event someone does fall through the ice or into a body of water,

members of Haddam Volunteer Fire Company are ready to come to the rescue. If a victim cannot be assisted by a rope and life preserver, firefighters will use a rescue sled to access the patient.

On January 17, firefighters participated in an annual ice rescue training on the Higganum Reservoir. During the drill, firefighters—who donned specialized cold-water rescue suits and protective equipment—took turns sliding a rapid transport sled across the ice to where a "victim" had fallen in the ice. The rescuers helped pull the victim from the icy water and relied on fellow firefighters to pull the sled, victim, and the rescuer to shore. In a real scenario, emergency medical technicians would immediately treat the victim for potential hypothermia.

"Since ice rescues are rare incidents, it's crucial that our members practice gearing up and learn, hands-on through this training, how to quickly help someone trapped in the ice," Captain Casey said.

### **HHS Receives CT Cultural Fund Operating Grant from CT Humanities**

Connecticut Humanities, the statewide nonprofit affiliate of the National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH), has awarded the Haddam Historical Society a \$12,800 CT Cultural Fund Operating Support Grant (CTCFOSG).

The grant is critical in allowing the Haddam Historical Society to continue operations and the Thankful Arnold House Museum to remain open. In addition, funding will help us to keep staff in the museum for visitors, research, and collections care. Funds will also be transformational by allowing the society to update its online presence and present more virtual programs and tours and to share the community's important and inspiring stories with a wider audience.

Executive Director, Elizabeth Malloy noted that this grant is critical to the survival of the Society during these difficult times and that for the past two years they have had to cancel most programming and fundraisers. The funding will allow the Society to improve its virtual exhibits and programs and maintain its ability to serve the community and public.

The Haddam Historical Society was one of 624 organizations in Connecticut that were awarded CT Cultural Fund support totaling \$16M from CT Humanities. The CTCFOSG are part of the \$30.7M of support allocated to arts, humanities, and cultural nonprofits through CTH over the next two years by the CT General Assembly and approved by Governor Ned Lamont. The CTCFOSG will assist organizations as they recover from the pandemic and maintain and grow their ability to serve their community and the public.

This grant was administered by CT Humanities (CTH), with funding provided by the Connecticut State Department of Economic and Community Development/Connecticut Office of the Arts (COA) from the Connecticut State Legislature.

The mission of the Haddam Historical Society (HHS) is to preserve, collect, interpret and promote the history and heritage of Haddam for present and future generations in order to instill a pride of place, respect for the community and encourage broad public engagement. The Haddam Historical Society provides numerous activities including

programs, events, exhibits and services for both adults and children, which help them discover an understanding and respect for the town's heritage and previous generations. The group is also active in local preservation issues and documenting significant historic structures.

HHS operates the Thankful Arnold House Museum and Haddam Shad Museum and is a member of the Connecticut Women's Heritage Trail and Connecticut's Historic Gardens.

including presentation of opposing views, devoid of conflicts of interest and supported by research.

Any graduating senior who is a resident of Haddam or Killingworth, a member in good standing of his/her student body, a participant in extra-curricular activities and who has performed community service during his/her high school career is eligible for this scholarship. from a private developer. The other is from the Trust for Public Land (TPL), a non-profit organization designed to preserve and protect land.

A decision on its future was expected at the Connecticut Yankee Council's board of directors' December meeting. But it was postponed until this month ... and then postponed again. According to president Rudy Escalante, one of two members of the Connecticut Yankee Council who attended Thursday's news conference, a February board meeting -- with a potential sale announced -- almost certainly won't happen, either.



The reason: Blumenthal's involvement could bring additional sources of revenue. So the board can wait.

"We would love to keep it as open space," Escalante said of Deer Lake. "That would be great. But (TPL) has to have a reasonable offer."

It is unknown what the two offers are.

In the meantime, local and state politicians stepped forward to voice their support for preserving Deer Lake – with Gorski opening the news conference by reading a letter the Killingworth Board of Selectmen sent the Connecticut Yankee Council earlier this month on behalf of the town's Open Space Committee.

"The Killingworth Open Space Committee finds that the Deer Lake Scout Reservation is a crucial part of the state greenway that runs through town," she said. "As such, it should be a priority for preservation as open space, in keeping with Killingworth's Plan of Conservation and Development."

Six speakers, including Blumenthal, followed, all with the same plea.

"For all of us," said Blumenthal, "(Deer Lake) represents some of the best of Connecticut. It is part of the ecological lifeblood of this region. If we lose it, there is no way to recover. Open space is not something that you lose, then recover somehow. Once it's lost ... once it's developed ... once it's gone ... it's gone forever."

The most poignant moment occurred when Goupil, whose family has camped at Deer Lake, read from her son's Scouts handbook, turning to a page where he scribbled down the names of habitats and wildlife he witnessed on hikes there.

"I truly feel that development needs to take place in areas of existing infrastructure," she said, "and we need to focus on areas of conservation where they already exist and preserve them ... At this point, we're just hoping that we have enough momentum to help support some of the non-profits so we can get the funding in place to purchase the property. Some sort of partnerships are what we need at this point." The question, of course, is how that can be accomplished – especially if TPL's offer falls short of the competition. Blumenthal said he planned to seek relief through the Great American Outdoors Act, a bill passed in 2020 authorizing billions in funding through two major park-related needs, the National Park Service deferred maintenance service backlog and the Land and Water Conservation Fund.

Promising "to go to the federal government, pound on doors and pummel officials," Blumenthal said he would seek "whatever resources" he could find through the Land and Water Conservation Fund.

"There's nothing novel about what we're trying to do here," he said. "There's nothing imaginary or obtuse. It's been done before. These kinds of preservation efforts succeed because of the advocates and actions at local levels."

Nevertheless, it is the Connecticut Yankee Council that decides the future of Deer Lake, and it wasn't heard Thursday. However, it should be soon. After the news conference, Escalante said he plans to schedule a meeting with Blumenthal to discuss the property.

"(The Boy Scouts) deserve credit for being good stewards," said Blumenthal. "All we're trying to do is carry on that tradition of being good stewards that the Boy Scouts so ably reflected. Certainly, we'll be in touch with them and ask what their intentions are."

Escalante liked that.

"I thought it was great," he said of the presentations. "We love this place. We've been stewards of it for the last 50 years. So, it's not like we don't have an emotional commitment, as well. We just hope to be successful when we work with him on it."

He's not alone, as Thursday's news conference demonstrated.

"The goal," said Blumenthal, "is to preserve and protect. Think of it as the lungs of our state. If you fly over our state, you see areas of open space. They help us breathe. Literally. The goal very simply is to stop development ... and make (Deer Lake) fully accessible to all the people of Connecticut."



Susan Perkins Jarrell died Monday, January 24, 2022, at the Saybrook at Haddam an assisted living facility where she was a resident. She was 105.

Susie is predeceased by her husband, Oscar W. Jarrell, and survived by her daughter Peggy of New York City; a son Timothy and his wife Holly of Haddam, and son Kent and his wife Patricia of St. Petersburg, Florida. She is predeceased by her daughter

Stephanie. Susie has nine grandchildren and eight great grandchildren.

Before moving to Haddam, Susie was a pianist and organist on Nantucket Island, Massachusetts. She was the first teacher at Nantucket Community Music Center when it opened in 1974. Susie created the Nantucket Organ Crawl to highlight the historic and unique pipe organs of the Unitarian Universalist Church, First Congregational Church, St. Mary's Church, the United Methodist Church and St. Paul's Episcopal Church. The event features both internally renowned and local organists.

Susie was active in the Unitarian Church where she served as music director and organist after her move to Nantucket. She was especially honored to play the historic Goodrich Organ at the church and played a prominent role in its preservation.

Born in Plainfield, New Jersey, Susie graduated from the Hartridge School. Her father lost his job on Wall Street during the depression when Susie was a teenager. She babysat and gave piano lessons to help support the family. She attended New College then part of Teachers College at Columbia majoring in education. In the summer of 1938, she studied in Berlin witnessing first-hand events leading up to World War II. Two close friends were a prominent American journalist and a British secret service agent who used her as cover to attend events as part of their intelligence gathering. The British spy was later captured and executed. After she and other students were sent home abruptly out of safety concerns,

Susie left school and accepted a teaching job in a mining camp in Ecuador. After a two-week boat trip to Guayaguil, an overnight boat ride along the coast and an 8-hour trip by mule through the jungle she arrived in Portovelo. There she met her future husband, Oscar W. Jarrell, a mining geologist. For several months, the couple worked in separate camps and continued their courtship by shortwave radio over a public frequency. The two were married in 1940 in Guayaquil and honeymooned in Peru.

After leaving Ecuador, the couple lived in Cuba, Washington and New York as Oscar worked on mining projects for the war effort including the Manhattan project. Susie taught music at Riverside Church and The Browning School. After the War, the couple lived in Cyprus, Los Angeles and New York City before they settled in Needham, Massachusetts. Susie was the junior choir director of the Needham Unitarian Church and was one of the first teachers in the Head Start program in Boston. She was a strong supporter of METCO, a newly established program creating opportunities for children from the inner-city schools by bringing them to suburban schools.

After Oscar died in 2002, Susie enjoyed island life and extensive travel with Nantucket resident Bill Hance.

Even as she turned 100 and beyond, Susie continued her musical passion by offering piano lessons and playing in small musical quartets. On her 100th birthday, the Nantucket Inquirer Mirror noted that she was working on an organ duet with Unitarian Church music director Diane Lehman. It was a piece by noted Jazz composer Joe Utterback. "This is modern jazz on an 1831 organ," Susie said. Even in assisted living, Susie played the piano accompanying the facility's holiday choir.

Susie summed up the secret to her long life and adventures to "men, music and Manhattans."


