Motivational Speaker John Halligan Visits H-K High School

Motivational speaker John Halligan presented his story to the entire school body in two sessions at the Haddam-Killingworth High School on April 27, 2022. Sponsored by the Nathaniel B. Field Memorial Foundation, Inc, his program addressed bullying, mental health awareness, and suicide prevention.

John lost his son Ryan to suicide on October 7, 2003. At the time of his death, Ryan was a 13-year-old middle school student in Essex Junction,

Vermont. It was revealed in much greater detail after Ryan's death that he was ridiculed and humiliated by peers at school and online.

John's powerful and positive message emphasized the importance of achieving suicide prevention through self-advocacy and advocacy for others. John talked about being an up-stander and not a bystander when someone is being bullied. Get involved, don't participate in bullying, and don't be afraid of apologizing if you owe one. Students feeling depressed or bullied should turn to their family, friends, or trusted adults for help because You're Worth It.



Haddam Volunteer Fire Company responded to a reported structure fire at 7:05 p.m. on May 1, on Plains Road in Haddam. A neighbor on Plains Road, who is a dispatcher for Valley Shore Emergency Communications, overheard the 911 call and immediately went to the scene to help. He and the homeowners used a garden hose to begin extinguishing a fire that started in the grill and spread to a deck, railing and shrub.

Upon arrival, firefighters used a line off Engine 1-13 to fully extinguish the fire and tore many burning boards off the deck. Crews overhauled the scene and then used a thermal imaging camera to detect any additional hot spots under the deck. Crews were on scene for about an hour.

Mutual aid was provided on scene by Chester Hose Company. Middletown South Fire District, Killingworth Volunteer Fire Company and East Haddam Fire Department also were dispatched and cancelled en route.

This was the third structure fire in Haddam in the past 11 days. At 10:35 p.m. on April 27, crews responded to an appliance fire that evolved into a structure fire on Earl Roberts Road. And at 2:20 p.m. on April 21, 2022, firefighters responded to a structure fire, also on Plains Road.

natives, which dahlias decidedly are not. But here's why they're safe to plant: Dahlias are the national flower of Mexico, where they originated, so they're hot-climate plants. Mexico is Zone 8, while we're still only 6b, so the plants can't overwinter, and a plant that can't survive the winter can't become invasive. Of course, native plants are always preferable as food sources for local insects, but bees and other pollinators will still feast on dahlia pollen—IF you include collarette (daisy-like) varieties. The big fluffy varieties are useless as a food source; no insect can penetrate all those layers. The good news is they're apparently uninteresting to deer, too. Every summer I plant my dahlias around the outside of my vegetable garden fence, and so far the deer have ignored them.

Dahlias have thickened roots called tubers. They look somewhat like discouraged potatoes, and that's not too far off, because the Aztecs, besides using the

860-345-RUGS (7847) 207 SAYBROOK RD. • HIGGANUM roots to treat epilepsy and the hollow stems as water pipes, also ate them. Europeans tried following suit, but dahlias for dinner never really caught on.

The flowers did, though. In a move repeated throughout botanical history, European explorers brought the new (to them) plants back home, discarded their native names in favor of a European botanist (the Swede Anders Dahl, whose research on pollution from fish processing plants led to the first legislation restricting the release of industrial waste into the groundwater), and immediately started hybridizing. The results were stunning, thanks to dahlias' remarkable botanical make-up. While most plants have only two sets of homologous (paired) chromosomes, dahlias have eight, which allows for a seemingly infinite amount of what scientists call 'morphological variation' but we know as simply astounding differences in size and shape, in every color except blue (but they're working on it). Today there are 82 species (estimates vary) and many thousands of varieties, with a hundred more added every year. Tiny, near-perfect spheres of pompon or ball dahlias, 1-2 inches wide; spiky spider shapes or my favorite, the graceful waterlily style, midsize with 6" flowers on 3-4' plants; smooth- or wavy-petaled or multicolored, all the way up to giant "dinnerplate" dahlias a foot across, growing on plants that can sometimes reach six or eight feet tall. Like peonies, dahlias set buds in sets of three, with a pair of small buds flanking the larger, central bud. For really big flowers, remove the twins, so that the plant will direct all its energy to the central bud. I'm not a fan of the dinnerplates, which are so big and heavy they tend to droop, but there's no denying the impact of a single huge bloom in a centerpiece or bouquet.

For all their drama, dahlias are surprisingly easy to

grow. Wait for the soil to warm up—about mid-May, and dig a hole in a sunny spot with rich soil and good drainage. If yours is one of the larger varieties, add a sturdy stake now, because it's all too easy to spear the roots if you wait until later in the season. Lay the tuber on its side, and cover with a few inches of soil. Don't water until you see green sprouting above the surface, unless there's a really dry spell. Once the plant sprouts, though, be generous and consistent with watering. Weed by hand, since any chemical that kills weeds will also kill your plant. (And bees, insects, and birds. And possibly you.)

If you're growing plants that are midsize or larger, pinch the stems back to a pair of leaves once the dahlias are 18" tall. You'll get a well-branched plant, with more flowers and sturdier stems for cutting. Don't forget to enter the best ones at the Haddam Neck Fair, which falls at peak dahlia season.

To save your dahlias for next year, wait until a week after they turn black and shriveled after the first frost. Then dig them up. Don't be intimidated: the roots are only a few inches below the ground, easy to lift. To avoid mutilating the roots, dig gently, feeling your way toward the stem. LABEL THE TUBERS, let them cure in the sun for a few days, then store in a cool dry spot, such as your basement.

Or just leave in the ground, and plan to replenish your stock at next year's plant sale. You're on your way to a happy addiction.

Scovil Mill Plans Subject of Public Hearing May 11

On May 11, a Public Hearing was held at the Firehouse Community Hall to discuss the purchase, environmental remediations and sale of the Scovil Mill (former CTDOT garage) at 11 Candlewood hill Road.

First, it is important to note that the Planning and Zoning Commission recently met and issued a report indicating that this project is in full compliance with the Town's Plan of Conservation and Development which has the goal "Support the redevelopment of the Scovil Hoe Mill Complex by working with State agencies, especially Conn DOT and DECD. Focus on environmental remediation of the property to get ready for reuse"

Specifically, the topics discussed at the hearing will be agenda items for approval at a Town meeting to be held on May 18 at 6:30 p.m. at the Firehouse

• To approve the acquisition of real estate and authorize the First Selectman to enter into purchase and sale agreement with CTDOT for the purchase of the Scovil property for \$326,000, subject to Town's receipt of funding from a State Financial Assistance Agreement for \$1.8 million for the Scovil Mill Remediation Project.

The State's appraisal of this DOT (Department of Transportation) property is \$325,000 plus a \$1,000 administrative fee leading to a total cost of \$326,000 which is in the capital budget. The source of the funds is from the federal American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 so that this purchase is not using town tax dollars.

• To authorize the First Selectman to enter into, and execute all documents necessary to have the Town receive the State Financial Assistance Agreement for \$1.8 million for the Scovil Mil Remediation Project

In order to receive this \$1.8 million grant from DECD (Department of Economic and Community Development) the town is required to engage with a developer for the environmental remediation of the property to ensure that the project will be completed, and the buildings will be used as envisioned. The state will hold a mortgage and a 'negative' pledge which requires that the developer not flip the property within 10 years or use it for a purpose not agreed. This project has been approved by the Department of Energy and Environmental Protection's Municipal Brownfield Liability Relief Program which gives the town liability protection from any unknown environmental conditions when the town purchases the property from DOT. Tighe and Bond (the town's environmental consultant) has prepared the Remedial Action Plan which is the basis of the \$1.8 million cleanup estimate.

• To approve the sale of real estate and authorize the First Selectman to enter into purchase and sale agreement with PB Projects VIII, LLC for the sale of the Scovil property after PB Projects VIII, LLC expends \$650,000 improving property for future use

The developer Parker Benjamin will need to invest at least \$650,000 to bring the buildings up to code and secure Certificates of Occupancy. PB will not take ownership of the buildings until this happens at which time the town will turn over title to PB. At this point the town will begin receiving taxes on the buildings.

• To approve the acquisition of two (2) parcels from Haddam Volunteer Fire Company including the Town Community Center, which adjoin the Scovil property. (no change in use proposed)

This will clear up the title on these properties.

• To approve acceptance of use of Town Green for Town (WPCA) owned and operated septic system serving Scovil property and Town (Community Center) property

The community septic system will include the Town Green and two parcels on the HES property to service the tenants at the Scovil Mill property and the possibly Town Community Center and Veterans Museum. This will be operated by the WPCA (Water Pollution Control Authority) which was established by the town.

Cam Garrett threw a 2-hit shutout, striking out nine to get the win. Todd Butler and Dylan Coon each had a hit for HK.




