Killingworth Girl, Age 9, Tackles a **Grown-Up Issue: Save Deer Lake**

Of the more than 700 donors who contributed to save Deer Lake from a private developer, one stands above the rest – which is ironic, considering that donor stands no more than four feet high.

Meet Maeve Browne. She's 9 years old, a thirdgrader at Killingworth Elementary School and the unlikely face of a local fundraising campaign to protect and preserve the Deer Lake Scout Reservation as open space.

"I'm so proud of her," said her mother, Katie

She should be. It was Maeve who, against all odds, last week put into action an idea to contribute to the Save Deer Lake campaign, wound up raising \$2,659 and became the star of a Channel 8 newscast about the property's future.

In fact, when a group of fundraisers met shortly after that broadcast aired, it didn't open by addressing the progress of donations. It talked first about Maeve Browne and the impact she made with one TV appearance.

"The kids were proud of her, too," said Dennis Reed, principal at Killingworth Elementary School. "They thought she was a celebrity."

Maeve lives within walking distance of Deer Lake but had no connection with the 255-acre property outside of occasional walks there with her family and two rat terriers. But those hikes made such an impression that when she first heard Deer Lake was for sale, she admitted "shock" and resolved to do something.

The only question: What was that something? "One of those things that's bigger than us"

"I never thought that such a pretty property could actually be getting sold," she said. "So, maybe a week later, we were in the car coming home from an activity, and I asked my Mom, 'Could I do a fundraiser to save Deer Lake?"

She hadn't done one before. She had to do one now. Her mother agreed.

"It's like one of those things that was bigger than us," Katie Browne said. "It had gotten to the point where I felt so hopeless about it that seemed like

observing the methods and tools of the slaves in the cotton fields, developed the "planters hoe" and convinced his brother, Hezekiah to go into business with him. The innovative design of the Scovil Hoe, a self-sharpening tool with a softer outer edge over a harder steel core, allowed the business to flourish. The Scovils thrived in business by achieving success in mass production, labor relations and marketing. years, supplying markets in the south and South America. The Scovil Brothers also produced gun barrels for muskets, carbines, rifles and pistols, as well as, ramrods.



At 1:45 p.m., crews were first dispatched as mutual aid to Middletown for a multi-acre brush fire near the intersection of River Road and Aircraft Road. The fire had started on River Road due to a downed power line. Due to strong winds, the fire quickly spread to approximately 250 acres throughout the day. At 2:45 p.m., HVFC was called to assist with a bus vs. power lines on Thayer Road. The bus driver and five students aboard the bus exited the vehicle from the back emergency door.

At 2:50 p.m., HVFC was toned out again for a fire alarm at The Village plaza on Killingworth Road. Crews returned to the same location at 6:55 p.m. for another fire alarm.

At 5:40 p.m., HVFC was dispatched to a three-car motor vehicle accident on Killingworth Road near Haddam Fire's Station 3. Two patients were transported to Middlesex Hospital with minor injuries.

At 11:50 p.m., Haddam Fire was requested back to the brush fire in Middletown, as flames began to spread southeast of Freeman Road and headed toward Higganum. Crews were on scene working to control the fire until approximately 3:30 a.m. Personnel from DEEP, South Fire District, and other protective agencies will continue to monitor the area throughout the day.

BOS May 9, 2022 Meeting

This regular meeting of Haddam's Board of Selectmen on May 9, at the Haddam Town Hall was called to order by First Selectman Bob McGarry at 6:30 p.m. Also in attendance were Selectmen Sean Moriarty and Kate Anderson and Administrative Assistant JoAnn Ricciardelli. First Selectman McGarry opened the meeting with a moment of silence in memory of Ann Riebold who had passed away this very morning of May 9. He pointed out that Ann had been a longtime employee of the Town and had only recently retired.

The minutes of the regular BOS meeting of April 11th and April 14th were both unanimously approved. During Public Comment Scott Larson, President of the Haddam Volunteer Fire Department, requested that an administrative assistant be hired because of the amount of paperwork that is needed to run the Fire Department. He pointed out that the officers of the department volunteer to be fire fighters not paper handlers.

In his Selectman's Report to the town, McGarry stated that there has been no change in the status of the Rossi property and that the environmental study is in the process of being completed.

McGarry remarked that there was a good turnout for the open house at Scovil Hoe on May 11 and that the Sec. 8-24 Review by PZC stated this project is in full compliance with the Town's Plan of Conservation and Development. McGarry pointed out that the Scovil Hoe Project will go before a Town Hearing on May 11 which will be followed by a town meeting on May 18 along with the Town Budget for approval.

McGarry also stated that the sidewalks on Bridge Road have been marked out and that the work will

proceed soon. Work on the Haddam Center sidewalks is expected to start by late May. The work on the Rte 154 bridge just south of Coyote Blue, a state project, is expected to start soon and be complete by Nov 30th. It will involve alternating one-way traffic at times during his project. The Beaver Meadow Road culvert project has been delayed because of the need for Frontier to move the power lines across the street so that the work can commence.

McGarry stated that he would be on vacation May 19-27.

The Covid daily-case rate has been increasing recently; of particular note, was that some people in the town hall and election officials who were at the RSD17 referendum had come down with positive tests. The number of reported cases has gone from 58 in February to 14 in March but back up to 62 in April.

The DOA seized 10 dogs from a single residence in Haddam.

The Town has applied for a Federal Lands Access Program Grant for \$315,000 to repair Pinebrook Road in Haddam Neck. FLAP Grants are used to improve transportation facilities that provide access to, are adjacent to, or are located within Federal lands. In this case it involves the Silvio O. Conte National Fish and Wildlife Refuge which is partly in Haddam Neck.

Selectman Kate Anderson reported that the Farmer's Market is scheduled to begin at HES on June 3. It will run every Friday into August.

Brenda Buzzi gave a report from Board of Education this month.

Tax refunds for \$14,728.48 were approved.

As a matter of new business McGarry asked the Board for a motion to issue a proclamation to honor Maurice Adams who passed away about two weeks ago. He praised Adams for his interest in positive improvements in town, the ideas he provided at BOS meetings and his being a big proponent for transparency in government.







Musings from a Millennial: Breaking Away from Hiatus Culture

"hiare – Latin verb meaning to gape; to yawn"
As we progress through spring and look toward what is traditionally vacation season (i.e., summer), the word "hiatus" comes to mind for this mama – although, it does not enter the mind of my boys. That is certain.

Even as they yawn, my Baby and Four-Year-Old remain determined and steadfast in playing "Mommy, we are not tired! as they pause, take stock of the yawn they thought I had not detected, realize their "weakness" was detected by Mom, pretend the yawn away, and run away from me before I can catch them to bring them indoors for bath time.

As I chew on this word, "hiatus," I observe ways in which a culture of "hiatus" has attempted to take hold. I will explain.

"Hiatus" has multiple meanings, including "a break in or as if in a material object; gap; interruption in time or continuity; break" and derives from the Latin verb "hiare," meaning "to gape or to yawn."

Parents know what it is to yawn. I sure do. Why? Simple. There is no such thing as a "hiatus" from parenting; it is a job you do not get to sign into or out of on your time sheet. For their part, kids do not take "hiatuses" either, but for different reasons than jaded adults long to do so. They do not fatigue to the degree or extent we do. This comparative point is not about issuing a judgment on adults. Rather, it functions as a recognition that hiatuses do not go hand in hand with the lifestyle of youth – in general.

As a matter of course, kids need rest times. They

need down time. They need moments during which the clutter of activities and duties abate. But hiatus connotes an abrupt stop, a time and space of discontinuity, of "interruption" – the likes of which may be antagonistic to conditions of consistency, continuity, routine in which children thrive and flourish.

Imagine, from a child's perspective, for example, if his activities were suspended, "interrupted" for months or years on end without warning. Wait, that happened.

Imagine if conversation, education, faith, music, sports, theatre disappeared and went away "on hiatus" for an unmarked, unspecified amount of time. Wait, that happened. We will see effects and consequences of said mass "hiatus" in years to come.

When viewed from this lens, the tangible applications of hiatus give us pause as to its merits – if any existed at the outset. Why? Simple. Kids require – indeed, demand and deserve – consistency, continuity of play, imagination, learning. The world is their classroom. When their world goes on "hiatus," when their world becomes abridged and constricted, so, too, do opportunities for knowledge-gathering, liberty-practicing, and wisdom-seeking become threatened.

Back to Baby and Four-Year-Old. They insist on playing beyond the temporal marker of bath time and engage in this active rebellion against any semblance of a "hiatus." But maybe they have it correct after all. There is a reason (perhaps myriad!) that children have boundless energy. Hiatus culture is not one of them.

nothing short of a Hallmark movie miracle could get this done.

"But I'm a true believer in that it doesn't matter how old you are ... or how rich or poor. Every person can make a difference if you put your heart into it. In my heart, I always said: No, there's always something that can be done. If she's motivated to do this, she should know that she can try to make a difference. I'm just glad she was motivated."

After considering her options, Maeve decided on a Pajama Day at school to raise money. In essence, everyone – students, teachers, administrative staff, even Dennis Reed himself – would be asked to wear pajamas on April 28 (KES Pajama Day) and consider contributing to the Save Deer Lake drive.

"Any contribution is appreciated," Maeve wrote on a hand-made poster entitled "Operation Deer Lake." After gaining clearance from Reed and District 17, flyers were sent home, pajamas readied and local news teams alerted by someone (nobody still knows whom) that a unique fundraiser was underway in Killingworth

"I was blown away by her determination," said Reed, "and how put-together her thoughts and proposals were." "This is what we teach"

Then last Tuesday arrived, and so did the news crews. Maeve's father found a note that afternoon attached to the front door of the Brownes' home, asking to interview his daughter. He contacted his wife, who drove to the school ... gained permission to pull Maeve out of class for 20 minutes ... and stood by as her daughter charmed her TV audience.

"When I picked her up," her mother said, "she said, 'Are we going to the doctor? I said, 'No, you're going to be on the news.' She said 'What?' I don't think she has a full grasp of the reach and inspiration she's had on people."

She should now.

"I didn't know that I would get that far with this,"



Maeve said of the interview. "I was kind of like ... scared ... but I was excited at the same time."

Later that day, she watched herself on TV.

"So, what did you think?" she was asked.

"I was happy and proud," she said. "Sometimes older people underestimate kids. The next day one of my best friends ran up to me and said, 'Thank you for saving my camp.'"

That hasn't happened. Not yet. More fundraising is needed before Pathfinders, Inc., a local nonprofit trying to buy Deer Lake, can be approved for purchase by its owner, the Connecticut Yankee Council of the Boys Scouts.

But Maeve Browne's work is complete. She wanted to make a difference, and she has – becoming an inspiration for a grassroots movement that one conservation director described as "astounding."

"This is what we teach," said Reed. "It's part of the fabric of our community. We teach how to help each other. We teach there's more out there than just yourself, whether you're helping a friend who's in need on the playground or taking something big out to the community and making an impact.

"What's remarkable about this, though, is the passion that's behind it. If there's one child out there with that much passion, imagine how many people feel that way about the property."
