

Killingworth Transfer **Station Permit**

Starting September 1, 2022, you must display a current, blue sticker on your vehicle's windshield to bring your trash to the transfer station.

A sticker is good for only one vehicle. Each household is entitled to stickers for two vehicles.

To obtain stickers, you must complete a Killingworth Transfer Station Permit Application Submit your completed application to receive stickers at the:

- Tax Collector's Office, Town Hall, during regular business hours. Bring current registration for each vehicle.
- The Transfer Station office, during normal hours of operation.

August 8 BOS Meeting Recap

This regular meeting of Haddam's Board of Selectmen on August 8 at the Haddam Neck Firehouse was called to order by First Selectman Bob McGarry at 6:30 p.m. Also in attendance were Selectman Kate Anderson and Administrative Assistant JoAnn Ricciardelli.

First Selectman's update: Regarding the Rossi property, McGarry stated that the town has received Opinions of Probable Cost for the remediation from the consultants that differ in some places with the town's own consultant's opinion. The differences will be negotiated with Rossi.

Scovil Hoe: The town has signed the Purchase and Sales agreement for the Scovil Hoe property and DOT has signed it. At this point the town is still waiting for the approval by the State Attorney General.

Swing Bridge: The American Bridge Company expects to start work in late August or early September on the approaches on the Haddam side of the river. There will be a ground-breaking ceremony sometime in the next several weeks. The Bridge Road sidewalks are moving along. The mailbox at 71 Bridge Road will be moved.

Beaver Meadow Road Culvert: Some work had started on the Beaver Meadow Road Culvert but is being held up because Frontier needs to move a power pole. This is no change from last month. Haddam Center sidewalks are progressing.

Former Haddam Elementary School site: State Rep. Christine Palm submitted a request to the State Bond Commission for a \$480,000 bond/grant from DECD for roof replacement/repairs, a multi-generational park and other improvements at the HES site. This has been approved. The Fiscal Year 2022-2023 Capital Budget has \$400,000 for the roof replacement. Haddam received a \$280,000 bond/grant which was submitted to the Commission by State Sen. Norm Needleman for the Higganum Cove Park. Once it is approved, this will continue the improvements to the cove per a master plan that has been drafted.

Higganum Center: The town just submitted a STEAP Grant (Small Town Economic Assistance Program) request for \$445,000 for other improvements in Higganum Center that had to be modified/clarified because of the other grants which were successful.

Community Septic: The town met with DOT and DPH on the community septic project. DOT is now agreeable to the community septic lines going under Routes 154 and 81. DPH has some concerns that will need to be resolved.

New Construction: First Selectman McGarry toured Blueway Commons (Brookes Court) with Sen. Needleman and discussed the significance to the local businesses of 88 new families in Tylerville and also the impact of the swing bridge rehabilitation and the roundabouts construction, which are impacting the businesses.

Hope Gardens at 7 Island Dock Road has received its Certificate of Occupancy and is ready to open.

Road Work: The Department of Public Works in doing drainage work on Laurel Heights and next will work on Maple Avenue. The town has a contractor doing prep work on Thayer Road from Route 81 to Thayer Road Extension. The grinding and grading on Maple Avenue was scheduled for the week of August 15 and the paving during the week of August 22nd.

Miscellaneous: The COVID reported-case rate continues to decline from 47 cases in June to 27 in July. CRAHD's contractor will be doing a second and final round of storm basin treatment for mosquitoes. There have been no new complaints of noise at Haddam Meadows State Park since enforcement by DEEP has been stepped up. State troopers have also gone through at times as well.

Greg McKenna has been selected by the Department of Public Health as Connecticut's Immunizer of the Year for his work on COVID. This award is given yearly to one person in each state. An award ceremony is being planned.

There was no Board of Education report. Tax refunds of \$8,263,79 were approved. Two requests for Elderly Tax Relief were approved. Motion was approved to hire a part-time Transfer Station assistant. Gail Reynolds was reappointed as an alternate member of the Inland Wetlands Commission. Two resolutions were approved in conjunction with the two grants discussed earlier in the meeting.

The next meeting of the Board of Selectmen will be September 12, at the Haddam Old Town Hall.

Pirates Ahoy!





Higganum Author Publishes His First Book

Every family has an interesting secret as part of their history. Often, many families spend years trying to run away from their pasts. 

The author does have a warning for anyone who reads his book: "You're going to cry. It's a beautiful story and there are a lot of intense moments. I think people will identify with the characters and the issues and see some of themselves in what they are going through."



\$20 Million Approved for Wrong-Way Warning System

New flashing beacon warning systems will be installed at 16 designated exit ramps (Connecticut has approximately 700 exits ramps) across the state after the State Bond Commission approved \$20 million for the project.

Connecticut has experienced 11 crashes this year, resulting in 20 fatalities due to drivers traveling the wrong way down a highway or a one-way road.

The new warning system includes cameras that will recognize wrong-way drivers. When a driver enters a ramp heading in the wrong direction, the cameras will trigger flashing lights to alert them.

According to authorities at the Department of Transportation, about 80% of the wrong-way accidents are due to alcohol impairment. Ten of the eleven recent accidents involved alcohol and two

involved cannabis.

One Bond Commission member questioned whether legalized cannabis might be a reason for the increase in wrong-way accidents. To date, this is unknown. When the toxicology reports for 2022 are complete, officials may have an answer as to whether it has had an impact.

According to officials, the presence of cannabis does not always indicate impairment. This is because, unlike alcohol, cannabis can stay in a person's body for weeks after it is consumed.

Connecticut State Troopers warn residents, "Do not to drive in the left lane past midnight because wrong-way drivers think they're in the slow lane when in fact they're in the fast lane."
