HKHS Baseball Players Win Championship on Cape Cod



Liam Gordon and Callen Powers, both entering their senior year at Haddam Killingworth High School, have been playing baseball together since their Little League days. This past summer, they were chosen to represent the state of Connecticut on an elite baseball team called the "Young Bucks" and to compete in the Firecracker Sports 2022 Underclass National Pro Showcase on Cape Cod, where the Young Bucks played against teams from all over the east coast and Canada.

Gordon and Powers, along with the rest of the team, won the championship with a 6-4 win over

the Metro Senators, a team from Virginia. Both boys were crucial assets to the team's victory. Powers, a power hitter and pitcher, had 7 RBI's and scored 4 runs throughout the weekend; in the semi-final game, he pitched 6 innings, with 0 earned runs and 7 strikeouts. Gordon, a pitcher only, pitched 5 innings in a qualifying round game, for a 2-hit shutout with 5 strikeouts, and pitched 2 innings to close out the game for the Young Bucks in the championship game allowing no hits, and had 4 strike outs. Both boys have also been starting Varsity players for Coach Mark Brookes at Haddam Killingworth High School since their sophomore year.

Spotted! Have You Seen Them?

Have you seen them? They are here in Haddam. Oh yes, the whitetail piebald deer have been spotted in the Jail Hill Road area and perhaps other parts of our town. Many in our neighborhood have seen them. "So, what are piebald deer?" you ask. The word piebald refers to spotted animals like pinto ponies or cocker spaniels for instance. The meaning of "pie" is, in short, "mixed up." And "bald" refers to the white patches.

We know that a deer's coloration is its camouflage in the woods. They startle us when we see them on



The Two Lives of Jonathan Cone

Jonathan Cone was born in Haddam in 1726 and was the great-grandson of original proprietor, Daniel Cone. He grew up in a large family with ten siblings and was a member of the Congregational Church.

In 1759 he married Elizabeth Smith of Haddam and they had two sons, Samuel and Oliver, and two daughters, Hannah and Zillah. Jonathan was a seaman by profession and sailed the coastal waters of the English Colonies. His wife was pregnant with their fifth child when he left port in New London in the fall of 1765 for a voyage up the east coast toward Maine.

His ship was wrecked off the Isle of Shoals, near Portsmouth, New Hampshire and it was reported that Jonathan Cone died at sea. His death was recorded in Connecticut Death Records and a gravestone in the Tylerville/Shailerville Cemetery states that Jonathan Cone was "lost at sea" in 1765.

His wife, Elizabeth, was pregnant with their fifth child, a son, Jonathan who was born in May of 1766. This boy never knew his father.

However, it appears that Jonathan did not perish at sea and actually landed in Portsmouth, New Hampshire and settled in the town of Campton, New Hampshire. In 1773 he married Elizabeth Bartlett of Newbury, Massachusetts, eight years after he disappeared from Haddam. He and his new wife had four children including a son named Jonathan born 13 years after his other son Jonathan was born in Connecticut. It is possible that Jonathan, Sr. never knew he had another child in Connecticut as a namesake.

Jonathan's widow in Connecticut never remarried and lived to age 73 never knowing her husband had started a new life in New Hampshire.

Why did Cone disappear? Why did he leave his family behind?

One possible answer is that he had a number of

outstanding lawsuits and judgments against him for owing money. The local sheriff had been granted permission to take Jonathan into custody for owing considerable sums to Humphrey Lyons and Elijah Ackley of East Haddam. His widow, Elizabeth, ultimately had to sell off property to pay his debts.

Was Jonathan ever concerned he would get caught? Possibly not, as communication was very poor and Campton, New Hampshire was far away from Haddam. The fact that both wives were named Elizabeth may have added to the deception.

the side of the road or tiptoe through our backyards. A piebald, however, sticks out like a sore thumb, giving an advantage to its predators while amazing us with its unique beauty.

There are many myths surrounding the piebalds. Native Americans thought their ghostly white patches represented deer in the process of leaving for the spirit world. European hunters who brought down a piebald either thought it would curse their hunting going forward or, worse, they would die within in a year.

Piebald deer are not albino. They are not totally white and do not have pink eyes. Rather, they possess a recessive gene that controls the amount of melanin responsible for their pigmentation. The amount of melanin or lack of it determines just how spotted the animal is. An internet search claims that 1 in 30,000 or 2% of whitetail deer are piebalds.

Albinos produce no melanin, resulting in white hair and pink noses. Melanistic deer are colored dark to black, having excessive amounts of melanin. Piebalds are more common than albinos, while melanistic deer are extremely rare.

In upstate New York, the former Seneca Army Depot located on 7,500 acres is a sanctuary for the Seneca white deer. They are neither piebald nor albino, but leucistic deer. Leucism pigmentation is somewhere between albinism and piebaldism. Unfortunately, the herd has diminished due to poor wildlife management and lack of funds.

I spoke to Andy LaBonte, a wildlife biologist with DEEP and the go-to person on deer in Connecticut. He said there is no way of knowing the population of piebalds in the state or if there is a concentration of the animals in any one area. When the state operated the hunting check stations, they saw them more frequently. Haddam's Animal Control Officer, Daun Kowalski, echoed his response and added that generally the calls she receives are either complaints or lost pets.

A piebald is produced when both parents carry the gene. Even then, only about 25% of the newborns will show symptoms while the other offspring will just carry the gene. I asked Andy LaBonte how the piebald population builds up its lineage. He told me that previous- year offspring are forced out of the herd by their mothers in the spring. Often the female offspring will stay with the herd while the males wander off on their own. With more piebald females, the lineage perpetuates in these herds.


So, do we hunt them? Sadly, the piebald gene causes more than a variation of pigment. Other genetic defects may include one or more abnormalities such as short legs, an overbite, an arched back (scoliosis), and deformed internal organs. All these symptoms make life more difficult for the piebalds and shortens their lifespans. While hunting them is prohibited in some states (not Connecticut), they are not an endangered species, but are only a genetic mutation. Hunt them? Only the hunter can answer that question.

Although, I keep watching my backyard, the only whitetails (gene carriers or not) that I see are the ones unapologetically eating my Hosta.
