Beaver Meadow Road Re-Opens

After months of work on a culvert project, Beaver Meadow Road is now fully re-opened to traffic. The road, a main artery between Routes 154 and 81, was first closed in April of this year to repair a culvert, the components of which began to arrive in mid-August. Traffic had to be detoured around the site for several months.

The manufacturing of the needed box culverts at United Concrete was delayed because of other projects going on around the state that took Haddam's place in line at the manufacturer. But once the components were installed, the wing walls that direct the stream into the culvert could be formed and poured and the final grading of the area was able to be done. There had also been a delay in getting a power pole relocated. Frontier had to move the pole, and Eversource was responsible for moving the power lines.





I do not mail out bills for the second installment for Real Estate or Personal Property. If you need a copy of your bill, visit Haddam.org and search under Pay Taxes Online. You can print a copy of your original bill, pay a bill or see when a payment was made. You can always call, email or stop in for a copy.

If you bought a house, paid off your mortgage, or changed escrow companies after July, please confirm with them regarding who is going to be paying the January installment. Please do not assume I have the most current information. If you receive a bill for a vehicle you no longer have, contact me immediately. Once interest has accrued it cannot be removed.

Credit Card payments can be made in the office or online. I do not take payments over the phone. A service fee of 3% for payments made with a credit or debit card will be applied to all card transactions. An electronic funds transfer can be set up online from a checking account for a flat fee of \$1.50. Please put the current bill number on the memo line; it makes it easier for me to find with online checks from your bank.

If you are paying online, you will receive an email confirmation that your payment was made. If you do not receive one, or you're not sure if your payment went through, please give your bank or the Tax Office a call before you try again. Online payments have to be manually processed in the office and will not be reflected on our website for a few days.

Any payments postmarked after February 1, 2023, will start to accrue interest at a rate of 1.5% a month from the original due date of January 1, 2023. To help keep interest down, partial payments can be made at any time.

If you would like to have a receipt mailed to you, please include a self-address stamped envelope and include a phone number and mail the payment to the Tax Office at 30 Field Park Drive, Haddam CT 06438 or use the drop box located to the right of the front doors. Please make checks payable to: Town of Haddam.

The Tax Collector's office is open to the public: Monday-Tuesday 8:30 a.m.-4:00 p.m., Thursday 8:30 a.m.-6:00 p.m., and Friday 8:30 a.m.-12.00 Noon. Wednesday is reserved for appointments only.



One Year Later: Food Scrap Waste Program Ready to Grow!

December 8, 2021 was the opening day of Haddam's Food Scrap Compost program located at the Haddam Transfer Station. A large sign was made and located right next to the Swap Shack, telling people where the Blue Earth Compost 32- gallon bins would be located. Post card mailings announcing the new program went out to residents of Haddam, Higganum and Haddam Neck in November 2021. The Town purchased 100 starter kits, consisting of a six-gallon transport bin, a two-gallon countertop bin and included a roll of 25 Biobag compostable bags to line the countertop bin with. They all sold out and 50 more kits were ordered, as well as more of the Biobags.

You do not need a starter kit to participate, but if you want one, there are about 14 kits left at the Town Office Building. Stop by the Tax Collector's office, the Assessor's office or the First Selectman's office to

get one for a donation of \$25. Extra Biobags at \$5.00 for a roll of 25 are also available at the Town Office Building. This program is free to all residents who have a transfer station pass. You can participate even if you have a private trash hauler as there are free Food Scrap Only passes you can obtain at the Town Office Building.

How did we do in our first year? As of November 30, 2022, we have removed 41,755 lbs. or 20.87 Tons of food scraps from Haddam's Municipal Solid Waste! Congratulations to everyone who participated! We average filling seven or eight Blue Earth Compost bins, but have had a few times when we have filled nine bins and had a record ten bins filled on the weekend after Thanksgiving. If we consistently fill twelve bins, we can go to a two-yard dumpster.

Thank you to the Haddam Board of Selectmen and to Chris Corsa, the Assistant Director of Public

Works, both of whom have been highly supportive of this program. Special thanks go out to all the Transfer Station staff who monitor the bins and wheel them in and out of the shed where they are stored.

Members of the Haddam Sustainability Committee also volunteer their time to pick up the leftover food scraps from the luncheons at the Senior Center on Mondays, Tuesdays and Thursdays and bring them to the Transfer Station.

John Stuart McCurdy

September 29, 1942 - November 28, 2022



A light on Earth has dimmed. John Stuart McCurdy of Killingworth, CT died at home November 28, 2022 at age 80, surrounded by family. John was the consummate gentleman, who was always well dressed, the life of the party and a fantastic dancer (which many ladies can attest to). Friends remember him for his charm, out-going nature, intelligence, wit, generosity, sportsmanship,

and leadership, as well as his ability to put people at ease. John was always friendly and full of life. He loved to tell a good story or joke and had that perpetual "twinkle in his eye" as he saw humor in so many situations. There is a new star in the heavens.

John McCurdy was born in the Chelsea Naval Hospital, Boston. He was raised in Scarsdale, New York, graduated from the University of Notre Dame, and attended New York University. He joined the U.S. Navy in 1964, serving aboard the USS Shasta and retired after six years as a full Lieutenant. He continued his love for the sea through his membership at the Larchmont Yacht Club where for over 40 years he sailed the waters of New England and the Atlantic

In 1966 he joined Dancer Fitzgerald Sample advertising in New York City and for the next 11 years had management positions in consumer product marketing and advertising agencies in Virginia, Baltimore and, in New York City, as a Vice President on the staff of Richard K. Manoff Advertising.

In 1977 Mr. McCurdy married Kathleen Acheson Thompson of New York City and Central Valley, New York. They moved in 1980 from Larchmont, NY to Madison, CT after he founded McCurdy and Partners Inc, a one-man advertising agency in New Haven. Over the following 35 years his staff of some two-dozen people served national and local consumer, business and industrial accounts.

John McCurdy was drawn to volunteer work that served the needy, the displaced, his community, and his church. A devout Catholic, he was a member of Saint Joseph's Church in Chester, CT and Saint Lawrence, in Killingworth where he was active in a number of ministries. He was also a member of the board of the New Haven United Way in 1997, and later served a term as president of the Killingworth Lions club during which time he inaugurated the Killingworth Youth and Family Services, the town's first human services agency. For 10 years he served as Chairman of the Board of the mid-Connecticut Workforce Development Board entrusted with the annual approval and distribution of several million dollars of federal funds to human services agencies for misplaced disabled and challenged men, women and children. In support of his leadership, the board established in 1997 the John McCurdy Institute of Youth Studies.

Surviving John is his wife of 45 years, Kathleen; his daughter Julia McCurdy of Thibodaux, Louisiana; his son Patrick McCurdy, wife Christine, and two grandsons of Pleasant Valley, NY; and his daughter Heather and husband George Chamberlain of Essex, CT, and their daughter Lily.

A celebration of John McCurdy's life will be held at Saint Lawrence Church, Hemlock Drive, Killingworth, CT, on January 21, 2023 at 10:00 AM.

NASA: Orion Spacecraft Returns Safely to Earth

On December 11, the Orion spacecraft returned safely to Earth, making its splashdown at 12:39 p.m. ET in the Pacific Ocean off the coast of Baja California.

"The splashdown of the Orion spacecraft – which occurred 50 years to the day of the Apollo 17 Moon landing – is the crowning achievement of Artemis I. From the launch of the world's most powerful rocket to the exceptional journey around the Moon and back to Earth, this flight test is a major step forward in the Artemis Generation of lunar exploration," said NASA Administrator Bill Nelson.

Orion landed in stable upright position via three large orange and white parachutes. Upon entry into the water the vessel was supported by 5 bright orange flotation balls.

Approximately 5 miles away, the U.S.S. Portland awaited the splashdown. Two Navy helicopters were deployed to assess the spacecraft. After circling repeatedly, they indicated there appeared to be no damage to the spacecraft and no signs of fuel leakage.

The U.S.S. Portland crew had to wait for the ammonia boiloff before approaching Orion. Ammonia is used to keep the interior of the capsule cool and will help future astronauts as they travel to the Moon in 2023 for the Artemis II mission.

NASA Administrator, Bill Nelson Nelson remarked, "Orion exceeded the expectations. The heat shield worked beautifully. Parachutes had to work, and they did. This is a defining day, a whole new technology, for a whole new breed of astronauts."

The Mission which began on November 16, 2022, took 25 days and 10 hours total time from start to finish.

Over the 25 days NASA reported the following information:

Orion performed two lunar flybys, coming within 80 miles of the lunar surface.

Orion traveled nearly 270,000 miles from our

home planet

Orion endured temperatures about half as hot as the surface of the Sun at about 5,000 degrees Fahrenheit

Within about 20 minutes, Orion slowed from nearly 25,000 mph to about 20 mph for its parachute-assisted splashdown

During the flight test, Orion stayed in space longer than any spacecraft designed for astronauts has done without docking to a space station

While in a distant lunar orbit, Orion surpassed the record for distance traveled by a spacecraft designed to carry humans, previously set during Apollo 13

What's next for Orion?

Special teams will work to secure Orion for the journey back to the Kennedy Space Center in Florida. Several payloads will be unloaded including Commander Moonikin Campos, the space biology experiments, Snoopy, and the official flight kit. Next, the capsule and its heat shield will undergo testing and analysis over the course of several months.

"With Orion safely returned to Earth we can begin to see our next mission (Artemis II) on the horizon which will fly crew to the Moon for the first time as a part of the next era of exploration," said Jim Free, NASA associate administrator for the Exploration Systems Development Mission Directorate.
