Killingworth Artisan Market at Parmelee Farm: September 10

The Parmelee Farm Artisan Market will be held at Parmelee Farm on Route 81 in Killingworth on September 10th from 10:00 a.m. until 4:00 p.m., rain or shine. I had a chance to speak with Karen Milano one of the people who started the market in 2014 along with her good friend Susan Hotkowski. Susan now runs the popular Chester Sunday Market. Linda Dudek joined Karen as her partner a year later.

Linda and Karen were both members of what was originally called the "Parmelee Farm Steering Committee," a group of appointed volunteers who were dedicated to the resurrection of the farm as a gathering place for the community. The goal of the market was to raise funds to support the ongoing work at Parmelee Farm. The market originally began as a monthly summer event and over time evolved into a yearly event that is loved by all of Killingworth and the surrounding towns.

Karen and Linda work independently throughout the year to assemble the market. They enlist a large group of friends, civic groups, and the

> rest of the current Parmelee Farm Committee to help out on market day and throughout the year to assist in their efforts.

vendors, there is "something for everyone." All artisan ware is hand-made by quality artisans, some of whom are our neighbors right here in Killingworth. You'll find woodcraft, cutlery, jewelry, pottery, soaps and lotions, clothing, furniture, pet products, alpaca products, candles, local honey and florals, wreaths, glass art, paintings, photography, handbags, farm produce, jams and sauces, and so much more. Literally "something for everyone."

Also represented are the nonprofits that do so much to help the community: the Lions Club, the Killingworth Women's Organization (KWO), HK Backpack Program, Save Deer Lake, and Helping Hands Food Pantry all will have a presence at the market. The Killingworth Volunteer Fire Company will be selling breakfast sandwiches, hamburgers and hot dogs all day to raise funds to support their efforts. Tee-Shirts to celebrate the 75th Anniversary of the Fire Company also will be available via their Auxiliary.

The market is pet-friendly, and Rover is welcome; he must be well-behaved and be on a leash at all times. Free parking, free admission. When the Parmelee Farm parking lot is full, you can park at the HK Middle School next door; there is a short, marked, and easy-to-walk trail from the school to the market grounds.

recommends they attend the Cadet Field Leader Course where Cadets learn how to fit into a team and develop critical thinking skills.

"Phase I (of the Ranger Course Program) is designed to expose Cadets to challenging situations designed to test and develop their skills in extreme leadership, teamwork, self-reliance. The skills they learn are designed to be used and built upon the rest of their lives. By the end of Phase I, Cadets must work as a self-sustaining team to plan, train, execute, and debrief missions." If a Cadet completes Phase I, they earn the right to wear the Cadet Ranger Tab. Upon completion of Phase 2, the Cadet receives the "Cadet Ranger" beret.

Cadet Ranger School is the toughest and most intense of their programs. This training is reserved for young men and women who are driven to excel within a military training environment.

HK Mentoring Program Seeking Mentors and Mentees

Youth and Family Services of Haddam-Killingworth Executive Director Tyree Hughey, Regional School District 17 and HK Mentor Program developers Ray Galloway and Patty Coletti would like the residents of Haddam and Killingworth to have an increased awareness of a recent initiative, namely, the HK Mentoring Program. The HK Mentoring Program is a partnership between RSD 17 and HKYFS. The primary goal of the program is to match a trusted, caring adult with a student from the HK community who could benefit from having a relationship with a responsible adult. Mentees may be nominated for the program by a teacher, school staff member, or parent. Mentees and mentors meet weekly at school during the school year. Adult mentors will provide student mentees with attention and friendship. Mentors will also provide opportunities to engage mentees in fun activities that build confidence, optimism and positive relationships with others.

In collaboration with the HKYFS Executive Director, two volunteers from our communities with an interest in renewing an earlier mentoring program, Ray Galloway, who is now Chairperson of the HK Mentor Program Advisory Council, and Patty Coletti, who is now HK Mentor Program Coordinator, began developing the current program in 2019. It began as a pilot program, with nominees coming from the second and third grades in RSD 17 schools. Currently, students from grades 2 to 6 have participated; eventually, we enthusiastically look forward to including students from all grade levels. Ray and Patty have collaborated

with HKYFS staff and have had the privilege of having as their mentor and trainer, the founder of the very first mentoring program in Connecticut, Dr. Susan Weinberger of Norwalk. The current program was ready to launch and train new mentors in March 2020; however, Covid 19 necessitated a change to those plans. Accordingly, Patty and Ray shifted gears as a direct result of COVID restrictions and, as an alternative to in-person/in-school meetings, arranged for mentees and mentors to communicate as pen pals and later to meet virtually. After several months, a few mentors and mentees had the opportunity to meet in-person, as long as either the parents or another responsible adult was nearby.

As of February 2022, and as a result of RSD 17 relaxing its COVID restrictions, our current mentors and mentees began meeting in-person and in schools. This was a very important and exciting stage of the program's development! In March 2022, three new mentor/mentee pairs were matched and also began meeting in schools weekly. This past school year there were 8 mentee/mentor matches meeting among Killingworth Elementary School, Burr Elementary School, H-K Intermediate School and H-K Middle School. Ray and Patty have both had mentees, starting as pen pals and have continued their friendships, now meeting in person during the school year. Ray and Patty highly recommend becoming a mentor. It is a very rewarding and beneficial experience for both mentors and mentees. We anticipate having 3 new applicants ready to be matched soon; they all seem eager to start! We hope to match each of them with a mentee this

We are always looking to nominate new mentees and to recruit new

mentors as well. Mentees are most often nominated by a teacher or school staff member. Typically, a member of the school staff contacts parents to share the idea of nominating their child for the program prior to proceeding. If the parents wish for their child to participate in the HK Mentoring Program, they are asked to sign a permission form. Students are nominated for a variety of reasons, yet the common thought for each student is that he or she would benefit from having another caring, attentive, adult friend. Ray and Patty conduct periodic informational sessions for those interested in learning more about the program. Prospective mentors must complete an application, must provide references, agree to a criminal background check screening, and attend a two-hour New Mentor Training Program before being matched with a student mentee. Once a mentor begins meeting with their mentee, mentors are asked to

participate in on-going training. In addition, mentors are monitored by the Program Coordinator and School Liaison throughout the school year.

HKYFS and the HK Mentoring Program would like to extend much gratitude to The Middlesex County Community Foundation and the Killingworth Community Foundation for providing a generous grant. The grant ensured continued development of the program and helped us to eventually reach an intended and very important goal, namely for mentors and mentees to meet in-person at the student's school each week. We would also like to thank our wonderful mentor volunteers, parents and mentees, as well as the RSD 17 Board of Education and staff members, inclusive of Superintendent Jeff Wihbey, teachers, principals and support staff, HKYFS Board of Directors and staff, for supporting the program.

Nurse Case Managers: Helpful or Harmful? By Attorney Alexander J. Sarris

Injured employees typically are assigned a nurse case manager at the onset of a new workers' compensation claim. The purported purpose of a nurse case manager is to act as a liaison between the injured worker, medical treaters and insurance company to ensure seamless treatment and a speedy recovery.

So how is this a problem? First of all, the nurse case manager is compensated by the insurance company (or even employer) and not the employee. Thus, because the insurance company and employer have a financial incentive to keep medical costs down and return the injured employee back to work as quickly as possible, so too does the nurse case manager. This approach may be at odds with the injured worker's best interest – particularly if it involves a lengthy recovery. Keep the following in mind:

- You have the right to choose if you want a nurse case manager at all.
- You have the right to enter a medical examination room without a nurse case manager present if you so choose.
- You have the right to attend a medical examination without pressure from a nurse case manager for the doctor to speed up your timetable to return back to work before it is medically advisable to do so.

With all those factors in mind, if you are feeling overwhelmed and need some guidance on whether a nurse case manager is helping or harming your case, please contact us right away.

Agreement Near on Preserving Deer Lake Property

Deer Lake is one step closer to being saved. Nearly one year after the 300-acre property was listed for sale, a contract for purchase has been signed between Pathfinders, Inc., a local nonprofit dedicated to preserving and protecting it from development, and Deer Lake's owner, the Connecticut Yankee Council of the Boy Scouts of America.

That news broke on September 1, when Pathfinders posted a release on Facebook, announcing the deal to buy the tract is for \$4.75 million and that a September 15, 2022 closing is scheduled.

The post also indicated that the agreement covers the entire acreage of Deer Lake, its buildings and all improvements connected with the Deer Lake Camp. It said that Pathfinders will continue to operate the summer camp and Wilderness School and plans to

work with the state and Town of Killingworth "to ensure that the land is protected in perpetuity."

"We are relieved to report that the beautiful and ecologically crucial Deer Lake property can be protected forever," said Pathfinders president Ted Langevin in a prepared statement.

However, a spokesman for the Connecticut Yankee Council challenged the report, saying news of a sale is premature and asking that "we all remain unified" until the deal is complete.

"We just signed a purchase agreement," said Bob Brown of the Connecticut Yankee Council. "The property has not closed yet. I would ask that you refrain from reporting. Until you buy a house, nothing is solidified until you sign a paper, the deal is signed and the terms are all set with the banks and the lawyers doing their things."

Nevertheless, Brown confirmed that a contract has been negotiated and that a September 15th date for closing is the target. He also termed Thursday's development "encouraging" for all sides.

"It is encouraging, that's for sure," said Brown. "I think we are all unified. But we don't want to pop the Champagne, if you will, until the deal is closed."

If and when that happens, it will end months of drama and speculation that began last September when the Council announced that Deer Lake was for sale. More important, it will have kept the property from development.

"Honestly, I'm thrilled with this news," Killingworth First Selectwoman Nancy Gorski said.

Though details of the agreement were not revealed, it is known that the purchase price includes at least \$1.7 million in what Langevin referred to as "lowinterest loans." However, it also includes more than

\$3 million in donations, the result of an ambitious grassroots campaign launched by Pathfinders in mid-March.

"We are extremely grateful to the generous donors who have made this purchase possible," said Langevin, "and to the lenders who have provided low-interest loans that allow us to complete the deal on a timetable acceptable to the Boy Scouts."

The settlement punctuates a long and arduous effort by Pathfinders, as well as concerned preservationists, conservationists and state politicians, to "Save Deer Lake," as yard signs throughout the area urged.

"To allow it to go the way of development," U.S. Sen. Richard Blumenthal said at a January 26, 2022 news conference, "would be unconscionable."

The Pathfinders' drive began after the Boy Scouts announced in February that they had accepted a \$4.625 million proposal from a private developer, Fortitude Capital LLC. However, in an extraordinary move, the Scouts also said they would entertain superior offers until a March 31, 2022 deadline.

That's when Pathfinders stepped in, launching an aggressive fundraising push, and negotiations between the group and the Connecticut Yankee Council began. It's also when Connecticut State Attorney General William Tong intervened, pushing the deadline back to May 1st.

"I hope this time will allow all sides to work together on a positive resolution," Tong said then. It did. But not without its hiccups.

Most notable was a court action filed this spring by a local environmental attorney seeking to protect a bird sanctuary on the Deer Lake property. That halted negotiations until the Scouts filed a counter suit, and the complaint was withdrawn.

"Deer Lake is a beautiful, undeveloped property," Tong said in a statement released on Friday, September 2, "where generations of Connecticut children have spent memorable and impactful summers. I am pleased that all parties were able to work together to find a way to preserve this Connecticut gem. Over the past few months, I have heard from former campers, community leaders and advocates who all shared a strong desire to preserve



Deer Lake. I thank the Boy Scouts and Pathfinders for taking the time to reach this positive resolution."

End of story? Not exactly. As Brown pointed out, there is still a closing that must be held. However, those close to the situation do not anticipate obstacles that could prevent that from occurring.

Furthermore, as Langevin pointed out, the purchase of Deer Lake includes considerable loans ... and those loans

must be repaid. That means a second, and equally aggressive, fundraising campaign is necessitated – one that could include state and local assistance.

"Once these loans are repaid,"
Langevin said, "Pathfinders will be able to put a permanent conservation easement on the property. We must continue our fundraising efforts in order to repay these loans. We are confident that the people who recognize the vital importance of protecting Deer Lake will step up to this challenge."

Fall Arts Classes Begin at Oddfellows Playhouse in Middletown: September 17

Registration is now open for Fall Classes at Oddfellows Playhouse Youth Theater, located at 128 Washington Street in Middletown. Beginning September 17, classes in theater, dance, circus, music and visual art will be offered for ages 3 – 20. Teenagers are invited to audition for our fall mainstage production.

Teen Repertory Company (ages 14 – 20) will hold auditions for Journey to the West on September 12 & 15, 2022 from 6:30 – 9:00 p.m. Teens are asked to pre-register for one of the two audition evenings, to arrive on time, and plan to stay for the entire time. Everyone who auditions and commits to the rehearsal and production schedule will be cast in the show. Regular rehearsals will be Mondays and Thursdays, 6:00 – 9:00 p.m. Performances will be November 10 – 12 & 18 – 19, 2022.

Circophony Teen Circus (ages 12 – 20) offers fall circus training in preparation for a winter mainstage production. Acro Focus! will be held on Tuesday evenings 6:30 – 8:30 p.m. and Juggling+ on Wednesday evenings 6:30 – 8:30 p.m., culminating in a Fall Circus Showcase on December 2, 2022. Students may register for one or both classes. No previous experience is

required. Classes run September 20th – November 30th (10 weeks).

For our youngest Oddfellows, Saturday Classes feature Circrobatics (ages 3 – 5 and 6 – 8) combining circus, acrobatics and creative movement. Other classes include Faerie Tale Theater (for ages 3 – 5), as well as Circro-Balance (ages 6 – 8) with a focus on stilting, unicycling, rolling globe, tightrope and spool. Classes start September 17, 2022 and continue through November 19th (10 weeks).

Middletown Public School students may complement their class experience with Oddbridge, an extended day program that provides transport from Middletown schools to the Playhouse, a snack, and supervised arts activities, games and homework help before classes start. This year Oddbridge will extend throughout the school year, providing special programs and field trips on early dismissal days or on days when regular Oddfellows classes are not in session.
